Hello George:

Thanks for your letter of ist June. Ronald Weyman and three of his production staff have been down here looking over various scenes with me, and they plan to come back in August with a full crew and cast to do the outdoor fibing filming. Interiors, including that of the local. courthouse for the long trial scene, will be shot in the Toronto studios.

You ask about my writing. George, it's still like Mahomet's coffin, suspended between earth and heaven. That is, I haven't been able to satisfy myself with any of the subjects that have been suggested, or have suggested themselves, for my mark novel.

In the course of search and research I have come across material for two by-products which eventually I intend to publish — (a) a book of true Nows Scotia sea stories, ranging from the mystery of the "Mary Celeste" (including the hitherto unpublished early history and end of her) to the murders aboard the barque "Kerbert Fuller" — and (b) a book of remarkable court trials in Canada, ranging from one involving Joseph Barss, leading Canadian privateersman in the War of 1512, to a modern knoch Arden who turned up in a Nova Scotia court in the 1930's to solve a will case — Hapley noted it at the time in his famous "Belleve it or not" cartoons.

I realise of course that books of this sort are not what Doubleday want from me; and in any case neither of them is complete -- I'm simply adding to them as the various stories appear in the course of my digging for movel material.

On the whole this histus in book production is good for me -- a chance to look back on what I've done so far, and to consider what I want to do in the future.

Dear Tom:

Thank you for your letter, and for bringing me up to date on your thinking.

On the strength of the outline which you have given in your letter, I am wondering if there isn't a full novel in the mystery of the Marie Celeste, and I think that a book on remarkable court trials in Canada would be very interesting. I do not agree that Doubleday would not consider a book of short stories. We will, in fact, consider anything that you wish to write, and if you feel that this period of reflection is good for you, then we would agree.

I would not want you to feel that I was pressing you for the delivery of a novel, and that you should proceed to write one for which you do not have full enthusiasm yourself. However, let me assure you that we will be very receptive to anything from you if and when you are ready to submit it.

Lily and I spent last week end in New York with Tom and Ida Costain, and they are in moderate good health for their age. Tom is on the last chapter of his big Napoleonic novel, but has not committed himself as to when we will be allowed to publish it.

We tried to persuade Tom to take an extensive vacation after his present project is finished, and suggested that the four of us might come down to Nova Scotia this Fall. This idea intrigued them, but the only complication as I see it, is the problem of getting them there and getting them safely home again. It could have considerable influence on Tom if you encouraged this. I am not sure whether you have his present address, which is 50 Riverside Drive, New York, 24,N.Y.

Please thank Arthur Hailey for me, for sending op the clippings. Dave Pike interviewed me for the Canadian Press, and it was rather amusing to see the various versions created by deleting this or that, according to space available. One paper said I was posted on "lonely Sable Island" as a wireless operator, and in the next sentence said I married a music teacher in "nearby Milton". Needless to say, Milton is on terra firma, and a good 250 miles west of Sable Island.

Scott Toung, writing in Saturday Hight a few years ago, pointed out that Nazo de la Roche and I were the only writers living in Canada, writing entirely about Canada and Canadians, waverdimensity and making a living at it by the publication of novels. All the others had some supplementary job or income. I mentioned this to Pike, and most newspapers using his article made a headline of it. Some made it sound like a boast. This was silly.
