staples of diet.

Labradorians traded  
~~skins~~ pelts & fish for  
what they could &  
hoped to last out the  
winters.

Short of gear & fishing  
in unseaworthy boats  
Children clad in flour  
sacks, barefooted

overcoming  
numerous  
persistent  
indefatigable

Fred Willway was the  
first doctor to winter  
on the Labrador

St Anthony - where only  
17 families lived  
in 1895

1895 at Red Bay  
Introduced co-operation  
to eradicate base poverty  
near starvation & hardship  
1902 - Lumbermill corp.

1899 return to Labrador  
wintered at St Anthony.  
Started a Hospital supplied  
X-ray equipment, dispensary  
electric light  
In 1900 he stayed 4 American  
mole

1899 Hospital begun  
at St Anthony  
Opened in 1905

TB & Typhoid  
malnutrition

1906 Industrial  
development - upshooking,  
canning, skin clothes making,  
fox farming.

1905 orphanage opened  
at St Anthony.  
Placed orphans in foster  
homes.

1899 all doctors were  
made ~~MTs~~ <sup>MTs</sup>

1902 appointed Lloyd's  
agent to combat bribery  
among unscrupulous traders

Jan 1908 Rudolph  
reindeer landed at  
St Anthony.

Patent with osteomyelitis  
lived at Brent Island  
in Hare Bay.

When rescued humbled  
apologetic

1912 - Sailor's Home  
opened in St John's

Clarence Bursaye  
managed a fox farm  
in Sandwich Bay. Saw  
a native thrusting new-  
caught trout into a snow

bank. Later saw them  
thawed & still fresh.  
- Returned to USA to  
start the deep freeze  
industry

Okak, Labrador  
lost all but 39 of its  
pop of 270 in the flu  
epidemic

Before the Grenfell nursing  
huspundland had no  
social services

1932 Grenfell's last  
summer Labrador voyage  
- central base markaga

Rival religions destroying  
community spirit

Greenfell made Labrador's  
name ~~world~~ known  
throughout the world

Lady Greenfell died ~ 1938

Crossed the Labrador in  
1939

Died after a game of  
croquet in Oct 1940
