


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



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News Briefs

Student locked in van by movers by Kay Lazar – Boston Herald

New England School of Photography senior Karen O'Neill yesterday nearly got taken for a ride - literally.

A beef with movers over the price to cart the 22-yearold's stuff from a Beacon Hill apartment to one on Park Drive in the Fenway erupted into a screaming match, and before it was over, O'Neill was locked in the moving van with workers threatening to take off with her in it.

"I started freaking out and screaming and pounding (when the doors closed)," O'Neill said.

The brouhaha started, O'Neill said, when the movers pulled up to her new apartment yesterday morning, with their truck full of her furniture, and demanded \$600 before they would unload it - \$150 more than the written contract they had agreed to.

"They refused to do anything until I paid the bill. They said they were going to cart the stuff away to Sudbury," said O'Neill's mom, Camille.

"They were going to hold my stuff hostage," O'Neill added.

She balked and dialed up Atra Van Lines in Sudbury, demanding to speak to the manager.

"The manager said. "You and your mom will pay for your manners,' '' O'Neill said.

Then things went from bad to worse.

O'Neill jumped up on the truck to prevent the truck from taking off. That's when, she said, they locked her in.

As Camille O'Neill watched in horror, thinking her daughter was about to be kidnapped by movers, a friend called police.

Three cruisers raced to the scene. O'Neill had been released, but the movers were still demanding the extra cash.

"The officers explained to the owner that they could not do that," said Boston police spokesman officer John Boyle.

"They (the O'Neills) had a contract and when they got there (the movers) tried to up it \$150," Boyle said. Police officer Laura Delaney demanded Atra movers back off and honor the original contract, he said.

Atra manager Lew Gamerman declined comment yesterday.

"They didn't get their tip, either, needless to say," Camille O'Neill said.

It is not surprising to find that these two establishments




have a lot in common: both have other locations downtown, both are turning profits and both believe that competition can be very beneficial.



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
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My Mission Statement

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
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Say Cheese

He had told two friends in the car that he planned to jump, said Colorado State Patrol Cpl. Sean Wheeler. But the friends didn't think he would do it, Wheeler said.

As they were driving him around, the two friends were trying to talk him out of it, he said.

"The person who jumped had been telling his friends for the last month that he needed to jump from a moving car so he could have a traumatic incident in his life so he could get a tattoo," Wheeler said.

Many neighbors in the placid neighborhood near Columbine High School were shaken by the sight of the body. The two other people in the Subaru - driver Erin Grubbs, 19, and Oscar Swansfeger, 18, both of Conifer - hugged each other for hours after the accident and cried as the State Patrol investigated.

Welford Smith said he and his wife were driving home on Weaver from a weekend in the mountains when they came upon the accident. Grubbs and Swansfeger were standing in the street, hysterically calling 911. The victim lay in a puddle of blood.

"It was awful," Smith said.

Smith and his wife went home and came back with two blankets they used to cover the body. Smith's wife took the phone from Swansfeger to talk to 911. They asked her to check the victim's pulse, but there was none, Smith said.

Soon, authorities and paramedics arrived. Smith said the teenagers were in disbelief.

"He kept saying: 'He wanted to jump out of a car. He wanted to feel what it was like,"' Smith said. "They were just hysterical. They didn't know what to do. We didn't know what to do either."

Wheeler said the Subaru was heading eastbound on Weaver when the man jumped from the car near Gray Court. Grubbs told police that she was driving about 40 mph. There is a stop sign at Weaver and Gray, but it was unclear whether the Subaru had slowed for it.

Wheeler said drugs and alcohol were not believed to be involved. Any possible charges are pending, he said.

"Nobody can really give a good explanation of why he needed to jump from a car to get a tattoo or why he needed this tattoo experience," Wheeler said. "This is the strangest thing I've ever seen. There's just no explanation for it at all."

REPO KEMPT, CHRIS LAROCHE & ALISON MURPHY Music Snobs



Metallica St. Anger (Elektra)

This is an album that, from the first moment to the bitter end, announces its hostile takeover of one's stereo and doesn't let go for over an hour. Scathingly immediate, extremely hostile, sometimes cacophonous and almost always bombastic, St. Anger's 70-plusminute running time is an unending sprawl of monster riffs, time signature trickery, hidden melodies and anger, anger, anger. Add the newest idea from the Bob Rock factory into the mix-purposely under-producing the album, which likely takes more time than regular production and is a bit like washing a new pair of jeans over and over to get that 'worn' look-and you've

got the rawest album Metallica have cut since 1986's Master of Puppets.

The controversy, other than the aforementioned production method which can be unfortunately confused with laziness, is the fact this is a VERY long album full of mid-tempo, down-tuned riffs which upon first listen all sound pretty similar. There aren't any guitar solos to speak of, either, which may put many fans off since Kirk Hammett's pentatonic leads and solos were often the only moment of relief within many of Metallica's earlier, multi-part metal epics. Outside of the first four tracks-all featuring easily memorable melodies, riffs and dynamic-stops that break up the repetitivenessmuch of the album is simply a whole lot of rage, rumbling riffery and little else. If you're not too familiar with Metallica or don't own any of their albums, start with their self-titled 'Black Album'. If you're a metal enthusiast, or have anything more than passing interest in the band, though, you might as well pick up St. Anger and feel the rage.

Led Zeppelin How The West Was Won (Swan Song)

Jimmy Page has finally outdone himself. The former axeman of the musical earthquake that was Led Zeppelin has dug deep into the vaults and released - along with an untitled DVD set-three CDs of live Zeppelin culled from two shows performed in California in 1972, just after the band released its now infamous untitled album (which has since been renamed by fans and press as Led Zeppelin IV, or Zoso). Considering Led Zeppelin has gone down in history as one of the greatest live bands of all time, How the West Was Won is a godsend to all Zepsters. Over the album's 3-CD sprawl we get treated to just about every gag Zeppelin had in their big ol' bag of sounds: acoustic folk tunes a la Going to California, driving bluesrock a la Black Dog, epic mysteriousness by way of Stairway to Heaven, a 19-minute version of Moby Dick (a legendary drum

solo bit book-ended by about 30 seconds of riffery), an imaginative 23-minute take of Whole Lotta Love (which actually includes about 3 songs proper within it), a sprawling, eastern-influenced trip into Dazed and Confused, complete with Jimmy Page destroying a violin bow against his Gibson Les Paul. Zeppelin deftly avoids doing plain old run-throughs of their standards while also veering just inches away from complete self indulgence which tends to mar 'jam band' live efforts - or at least making sure their self-indulgence is entertaining nonetheless (the insertion of a Bach piece into Heartbreaker by Jimmy Page is both horribly cliché and damn interesting-not to mention the fact Zeppelin both predates hair metal clichés and invented most of them to boot, half of them right here on this set!). So what's the caveat, you say? Well, there is none, so long as you don't mind listening to Page occasionally veer too far off course and plow through nothing but every variation of the pentatonic minor scale possible for a few minutes. Or listening to Bonham beat on drums with his hands for the same amount of time it takes to wait in the Registrar's Office line during the first week of classes. Or the hefty \$30 price. What I'm getting at, really, is that How the West Was Won is actually only for people who know Led Zeppelin pretty well already-for Zepsters, essentially-because otherwise it might just sound like a giant virtuosic rambling mess and that would be a horrible, horrible tragedy to befall anyone unfamiliar with the Zeppelin. On the other hand, I believe that everyone should be a Zepster regardless, and anyone who isn't should get a head start and buy this album immediately, along with Zeppelin's entire catalogue, you know, as a precaution. If that means you, well, get out the piggy bank and a hammer. Led Zeppelin DID win the west, after all, and the rest of the world with it. Isn't that worth a little investment? **Chris LaRoche**

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
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
