Dear Elisabeth:


It was a great pleasure to see you again last week in Paris.

Since last meeting you in Kingston I have been quite busy with seabed work. I have broadened beyond the genetic resources issue to start looking at hydrothermal vent conservation and sustainable use. This has brought me into contact with InterRidge and its biological committee, which is growing concerned about the threats to some of the most highly, visited sites. I have been working with them to build support within their community to develop a code of best practice to guide their research activities. They are also interested in the concept of protected areas within the limits of national jurisdiction and in the Area. The research community would voluntarily manage these.

The first step is to start defining best practice. This will start with the biologists and hopefully can be expanded to include the geologists. Mr Nandan, who spoke with me at length in Paris after my talk, has counseled me to look carefully at the draft mining code for polymetallic sulfides so that we achieve harmony.

In the early part of 2002, I hope to have more of a sense of the way forward on the code. I will keep you informed. I would also value your thoughts and advice on this.
