

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Are Alumni Important?

Some of our alumni return to the campus for reunions, fund-raising dinners or occasional visits. But most often our closest contact with Dalhousie is a plea for money in the mail. But when student unrest erupted a few years ago, college administrators quickly realized that alumni could make their opinions felt. By telegrams, letters and withholding their money, alumni made their unhappiness known. Now universities are searching for ways to involve their alumni, particularly those who feel estranged from the contemporary campus by the growing gulf of manners, morals and concerns. The impact of alumni will grow as our numbers grow - and perhaps will be channeled into the following areas.

As voting citizens: As more and more of the questions of education affecting higher education are decided by elected officials, alumni will have an increasing influence as voters. In the 1980's, colleges and universities may value their alumni as much for their vote

as for their dollars.

As donors: No matter how much more they receive from tuition and from government, colleges and universities will not have enough unfettered money to do all the things they want to do. Contributions are still the best way of giving them a chance to experiment, to perform with extraordinary quality and to attract new kinds of students. As parents: Alumni will have vast influence over the education of their children. By encouraging new approaches to teaching and by encouraging their children to take advantage of them - alumni can help to broaden the structure of higher education.

As employers: Alumni influence the qualifications that are demanded for entry into many jobs. They can help eliminate some of the current educational overkill now demanded for many occupations and they can provide on-the-job apprenticeships and other opportunities for employees moving up in the system.

As citizens: Alumni can lead in efforts to make elementary and secondary education respond to the needs of all children, thereby reducing the burdens placed on colleges to provide remedial help.

As members of a changing society: Alumni can develop tolerance and understanding for change in their own colleges and prepare themselves for new opportunities in society. As educated men and women: They should hold onto their faith in learning as a hope for civilization and their faith in colleges and universities for nurturing that hope.

Mr. H. Larry Doane, Treasurer of the Alumni Association, reported that the expenses of the Association from April 1, 1972 to March 31, 1973, were \$14,291.42.

Mr. G. E. C. 'Ted' Brown, President of the Association, reported that the year has been an active one for the Association. He named as highlights:

Potpourri '73 - a well attended evening in the Arts Centre with participation from several Dalhousie departments giving a glimpse at Dalhousie now;

An Evening with Farley Mowat - a full house came out for what turned out to be quite different than anticipated, but nevertheless, could not be considered dull;

The Young Alumni Club's night on **Oak Island** with treasurer hunter Dan Blankenship - an extremely interesting evening.

Dalhousie Nurses formed their own alumni branch with Mrs. Karen Mann their first president. Their first major function was Electa MacLennan Night - a great success.





An evening was spent with the Student Council at the Faculty Club and resulted in excellent discussions on a number of topics. One of particular interest was their agreement that an alumni 'contact' for out-of-town students would be welcomed.

The Association was actively involved as a committee discussing the amalgamation of the Nova Scotia Technical College and Dalhousie University. The NSTC alumni executive hosted a social gathering to discuss the matter informally. The Dalhousie Board feels that a number of conditions must be adhered to including a central alumni office with all the records and a control over fund raising, these being the two main issues.





The Young Alumni Club has a great deal to offer and should continue with its program.

Among items discussed at Board Meetings were: An investigation by History 100 professors John Godfrey and David Crook concerning the setting up of a non-credit informal noontime seminar in downtown Halifax; and

a telethon to contact all local alumni and solicit their views and ideas concerning the Association

Bruce Irwin, Director of Alumni Affairs, reported that the Alumni population was now past the 16,000 mark, and that the Alumni program had expanded to keep pace with the increased numbers.

During the past year the most extensive reunion program ever has been attempted.

Alumni contributions from January 1, 1972 to December 31, 1972 totalled \$326,432.44. Dalhorizons currently stands at \$7,218,000. Mr. Irwin paid tribute to A. Irvine Barrow who has relinquished the post of chairman of Dalhorizons.

Only four branch meetings were held, but regular contact is maintained with the Presidents of all branches.

Ross Langley, President of the Medical Alumni Association, in his report, stated that the Alumnus of the Year was Dr. Edwin F. Ross, and on his behalf, the Medical Alumni contributed \$1,000 to the Medical School to be used by the Dean of Medicine in any manner to benefit the Medical School. Other activities of the Medical Alumni were:

Sponsoring of visits to Dalhousie of premedical societies in other universities of the Atlantic Provinces:

Funding scholarships for medical students working in the Medical School during the summer; The annual reception and buffet dinner was held during the Refresher Course;

A reception and buffet for the graduating medical class was held on May 30, 1972;

Medal, the Medical Álumni Journal, was published last year, and this year's issue is now at the printer's.

CAMPUS NOTES

Major Advances by Chemical Researchers

A significant advance in the detection and measurement of minute quantities of impurities in substances has been made at Dalhousie University.

This and reports of other major developments in research and improved instrumentation are contained in the annual report of the Trace Analysis Centre.

The centre was established in 1971 by the Chemistry Department after the National Research Council agreed to support it with grants totalling \$359,000 over a three-year period.

According to Dr. Douglas E. Ryan, director of the centre and chairman of the Chemistry Department, the identification of substances and the investigation of impurities they contain is a major problem of our time; the environmental mercury scare, for example, served to emphasize the need for better and more sophisticated methods of trace analysis.

The detection, identification and measurement of trace amounts of elements at levels less than one part per million is becoming increasingly important to both science and industry.




Dental Care Program for Senior Citizens

A co-operative effort involving ten agencies - volunteer associations, dental teaching and training schools, dental professions and health agencies - has resulted in a dental care delivery program for senior citizens in one of Halifax's senior citizens' residences. The program will provide treatment for 141 persons who need it and want it, began to take shape last January when Dr. Alexander E. MacLeod, associate professor of community dentistry at Dalhousie consulted with, and received the cooperation of, the administrator of Northwood Manor and directors of various municipal agencies for the proposed project.

A team of 40 volunteers operate during each clinic session. These include the dentists, the hygienists, a rotating team of five dentistry students who do minor laboratory work, a rotating team of eight dental assistants from the Nova Scotia Institute of Technology, volunteer technicians, Red Cross volunteers who provide transportation and hostess services, the clerical staff from the dental school who act as receptionists and serve refreshments in addition to scheduling appointments and assigning specific time slots for the many volunteers.

Dr. MacLeod says that the operation has done two things: it has provided dental care for one small group of people who needed it and gently indicated to authorities that there is a larger group who need care but do not have the means to obtain it.



More than 150 Attend Assembly

More than 150 dentists, assistants and dental hygienists practicing in the Atlantic provinces attended the first Post-College Assembly organized by the Faculty of Dentistry at Dalhousie early in May.

The assembly took the form of a two-day continuing education program, alumni reunion, a teacher education session, and the dental school's convocation ceremonies and began on May 13. The featured clinician at the two-day course and the teacher education session was Dr. Maury Massler, associate dean of post-graduate and teacher education at the University of Illinois College of Dentistry. Chairman of the event was Dr. Douglas V. Chaytor who is chairman of the Faculty's continuing education committee.

Dalhousie's role in Meeting Community Needs was a theme of a one-day intrauniversity seminar held on April 12 at the Faculty Club. Sponsored by the university's committee on part-time study, the seminar was designed as a follow up to phase one of the Committee's work which consisted of making preliminary inquiries into present part-time study activities.

Keynote speaker for the seminar was Dr. J. Roby Kidd, renowned authority in the field of continuing education.

Dalhousie University's department of history in cooperation with the archaeology unit of the Fortress of Louisbourg National Historic Park, will conduct a field school in historical archaeology at Louisbourg from May 26 to August 31. The final phase of the course will see students functioning as site assistants responsible for interpretation of excavations and record keeping under the supervision of the excavation director.

Dr. Lloyd B. Macpherson, Dean of Dalhousie Medical School, received an honorary degree from Acadia University on May 7, 1973. And former Dean of Medicine, now Vice President (Health Services) Dr. C. B. Stewart received an honorary Doctor of Laws from the University of Prince Edward Island at their spring convocation.

Dr. Murray D. Nixon of Saint John, N.B. has been appointed assistant professor and director of extramural programs in Dalhousie's Division of Continuing Medical Education. In addition to carrying out some duties in the Faculty of Medicine's Family Medicine Teaching Centre, Dr. Nixon will be responsible for supervising the Maritime community-based hospital education programs. At present this consists of six programs per year in each of the 40 communities served by the Division of Continuing Medical Education.

For a number of years, Dalhousie University has offered a widening selection of courses in various disciplines related to Africa. For the first time, beginning in September, the university will offer a BA program to undergraduates with a specialization in African studies. The program will offer

students the opportunity to integrate courses from a number of disciplines around the focus of a major world region

Dr. Arnold J. Tingley, formerly head of the Mathematics Department, has been appointed Registrar of Dalhousie University. He succeeds Dr. H. J. Uhlman, who has been Registrar for the past five years and who will continue as Dean of Student Services and professor of education. Dr. Tingley will continue as chairman of the Mathematics Department until a successor is named.

Dr. W. J. Archibald has been appointed Dean of Freshmen. He is a former Dean of Arts and Science and will continue his duties as professor in the Department of Physics.

Dr. B. K. Doane has been appointed Assistant Dean of Medicine (Inter-Departmental Affairs and Research). He will continue his duties as associate professor of psychiatry.

Other recent appointments include: Peter Fletcher as professor of music and chairman of the Department of Music; Dr. M. J. L. Kirby as professor in the Department of Commerce and director of the Government Studies Program; Sonia Jones as acting chairman; Department of Spanish.



Dean of Law, Ronald St. J. MacDonald

ALL'S WELL AT WELDON Highlights of a special report by Dean Ronald St. J. Macdonald

The Dalhousie Law School continues to be a vigorous and dynamic part of the university and an important institution in the national landscape, and those who have been involved with it could take pride in the school's development, says the Dean of Law, Ronald St. J. Macdonald. Dean Macdonald made the remarks in a special report he prepared just past the halfway mark of his first year in office at Dalhousie. The report was presented to a joint meeting of the executive committee of the Board of Governors and the Senate

While he painted a generally bright picture of the law school, its activities and its development, Dean Macdonald made no bones about reporting on the not-so-rosy aspects of the problems facing the law school.

Major points of his report:

All those who are qualified and want to study law should have the opportunity to do so, regardless of the job market, and should take the world as they find it when they graduate;

Forty applicants a year for seven annual Sir James Dunn scholarships (each worth \$2,500) was on the low side and efforts to remedy this should be made;

The Law Library, standing eighth of 17 in Canada on its collection is largely a practitioner's library and much is needed to be done to make it a well-rounded unit: The expansion of graduate programs will mean that more highly qualified graduates will enrol in the future;

New programs, including law-and-health and cooperation in other disciplines are underway; the school has also applied for four Soviet scholars to make a two-month visit to Dalhousie;

The school is moving rapidly to develop a more effective continuing education program;

A major problem - and one that faced the Canadian academic community generally was the attraction and retention of talented professors who could be persuaded Halifax was a good place to live and work in.

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HUNDREDS OF HALIFAX ALUMNI PARTICIPATE IN POTPOURRI '73

The use of multi-media - video tapes, films - plus rap sessions and happenings - all to teach history?

It was organized by the Alumni Association with the co-operation of the university departments involved, and began with a reception and buffet followed by demonstrations by the Theatre Department, Music Department, a visual presentation by the Institute of Public Affairs, demonstrations by the School of Physical Education, Department of Education, dances by members of the Russian Department and demonstrations by Outreach Tutoring and History 100.



A. Irvine Barrow lauded for splendid job

A. Irvine Barrow. Chairman of Dalhorizons

The Board of Governors of Dalhousie University has acknowledged the "splendid job" A. Irvine Barrow has done as general chairman of Dalhorizons, the five-year capital fund-raising campaign launched in 1969. The Board paid tribute to Mr. Barrow at its March meeting when it accepted the formal resignation of Mr. Barrow as the Dalhorizons general chairman.

The President, Dr. Henry D. Hicks, told the board that Mr. Barrow, a chartered accountant and a member of the Board for many years, gave unstinting service to the university during the campaign, travelling across the country on his own and with others to seek financial support.

The campaign's target is \$11,100,000. So far, said the President, \$7,250,000 has been raised, and the balance of the work remaining could be done effectively by the Fund Council office under the supervision of fund director Bruce G. Irwin, who is also Director of Alumni Affairs.

A partner in Barrow, Nicoll & Company, a firm of chartered accountants, Mr. Barrow is also a director of the Bank of Canada and the Industrial Development Bank and a director of the Canadian Scholarship Trust Foundation. He is a former vice-president for Nova Scotia of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council, a past-president of the Halifax Board of Trade, the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade and is a member of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.
