My dear Tom:
I loved the book and was flattered by your several references to me. Those immediate post-war days were good days and I look back on them with happy memories.

You have no idea how comforting it is at my age to be referred to as "a proficient young man". I reached the ripe old age of 65 in mid September and shortly afterwards retired from McMillans. After Maclean-Hunter bought the firm in 1972 I gave up the Presidency to make room for George Gilmour of Maclean-Hunter and spent about 4 years with the title Vice-Chairman looking after a few favourite authors and getting some new ones including one old rascal called John Diefenbaker.

I have accepted the Presidency of NSL - a McClelland and Stewart subsidiary - because I cannot afford to retire and do not want to. Publishing has been my life and remains my passion.

I had meant, Tom, to write to you when I heard of Edith's death but the news reached me several months after the fact and I just never did so. I'm sorry.

I am sending a copy of IN MY TIME down to you and wonder if you would be good enough to inscribe it to me. This is something I shall value and place on my book shelf beside several other Raddall inscriptions.
