

#### Divine Novel Wins First Atlantic Fiction Award

The Writers' Federation of Nova Scotia and the Writers' Development Trust are pleased to announce that Wayne Johnston has won the first Thomas Raddall Atlantic Fiction Award for his 1990 novel The Divine Ryans.

The \$1,000 award, named in honour of one of Nova Scotia's greatest novelists, was created last fall by the Federation and the Trust with the assistance of the Nova Scotia Department of Tourism and Culture, and goes to the best work of adult fiction by an Atlantic Canadian published in the previous year. Entrants must have been born in Atlantic Canada or have lived in the region for the last two years.

Johnston is a native of Newfoundland now living in Toronto. His first novel was the award-winning The Story of Bobby O'Malley. He published The Divine Ryans last year with McClelland & Stewart.

"The Divine Ryans is a good send-off for the Raddall Award," the judges said, noting their envy for the book's mix of humour and pathos, and its "striking, sneaked-in images. It's a book you can read again and again. A literary critic would have a heyday with it, but general readers will love it too. There's a lot to think about. The Divine Ryans ensures the Award won't get the reputation of being for dreary, serious books."

Johnston will be on hand to receive the Award at a ceremony on Saturday, June 15th, at 2 p.m., in the Akin Room of the Public Archives of Nova Scotia in Halifax. The 1991 Evelyn Richardson Memorial Literary Award for non-fiction and prizes in the Writers' Federation's 15th annual Atlantic writing competition for unpublished manuscripts will be presented at the same time. Everyone is welcome.

A year ago the Writers' Federation of Nova Scotia and the Writers' Development Trust created the Thomas Raddall Atlantic Fiction Award, and we presented the first Award to Wayne Johnston last month. We have now been approached on behalf of the Award's namesake, the novelist Thomas Raddall, with a proposal that Mr Raddall donate his PLR income to the trust that funds this Award. I wonder if you could comment on the feasibility of this proposal, amd whether and how it might be accomplished.

My understanding is that currently and in the past Mr Raddall has not applied to the Commission for compensation, and would like us, if we are able to do so, to "undertake the paperwork" on his behalf.

I would also like to point out that this is a case of a distinguished writer wanting to make a contribution to other writers at the end of his long career. It is not a case, and should not be construed as a case, of a writer not "needing" his PLR compensation, or undermining in any way the right that we all fought so hard to obtain for writers. Mr Raddall's wish is characteristic of his generosity to other writers. At your earliest convenience I hope you will be able to advise us on behalf of those among them who vie for this Award.


I am writing with regard to your letter of 26 July about the possibility of Thomas Raddall donating his PLR income to the trust for the Thomas Raddall Atlantic Fiction Award.

From PLR's point of view, any PLR monies would have to be sent directly to Mr. Raddall, and he then would take the necessary steps to donate the money to the Award. The Commission could not send his earnings directly to the trust fund. It is acceptable to the Commission that the WFNS, as an example, fill in Mr. Raddall's PLR forms and provide the required photocopies. The bare bones requirement for PLR is that Mr. Raddall sign the author/contributor form initially, and the subsequent registration renewal forms himself. We could send all documents to the writer in care of the WFNS, if so instructed.

I hope that the above procedures will make this arrangement relatively easy to come to fruition. It is indeed a generous action on Mr. Raddall's part. Please let us know what address to use in mailing out his 1992-1993 forms.





## WRITERS' FEDERATION CONTINUES LIVING TRIBUTE TO EVELYN RICHARDSON

The Writers' Federation of Nova Scotia is calling for submissions from authors or publishers of non-fiction published during 1992 for the annual Evelyn Richardson Memorial Literary Award. Confined to resident or native-born Nova Scotia writers, the Richardson Award, established in 1977, is Nova Scotia's highest recognition for non-fiction writing.

The Award honours the memory of Evelyn Richardson who is probably best known for <u>We Keep a Light</u> (McGraw-Hill Ryerson, 1945), which won the Governor General's Award. It is an autobiographical account of the years she and her husband spent on Bon Portage Island, where he was the lighthouse keeper. There they raised their family of two girls and one boy while developing an ever increasing self-sufficiency on their privately owned portion of Bon Portage. Richardson proved that rejection slips from publishers with that hateful phrase "of local interest only" could be overcome. Previous winners of the Award include Harry Bruce, Alden Nowlan, Joan and Lewis Payzant, Kay Hill, Bruce Armstrong, Murray J. Beck, Brian C. Cutherbertson, Lilias M. Toward, P.B. Waite, Tony Foster, Harold Horwood, Dean Jobb, Judith Fingard, Harry Thurston and Robert Pope.

#### THE ACADIANS OF NOVA SCOTIA WINS RICHARDSON LITERARY PRIZE

The Writers' Federation and the Directors of the Richardson Trust are delighted to announce that the 1992 Evelyn Richardson Memorial Literary Award has been won by Sally Ross and Alphonse Deveau for *The Acadians of Nova Scotia Past and Present* published by Nimbus Publishing Limited.

The first work devoted exclusively to subject, *The Acadians* presents a thorough study of Acadian history from the earliest days of French settlement to present-day Acadian communities. Ross and Deveau draw on original seventeenth century documents as well as modern sources. They examine the Expulsion that began during building hostilities between the vying European powers of France and Britain in 1755; and trace the return of these dispersed peoples and their resettlement in seven areas of Nova Scotia. The writers highlight the differences that have evolved within these different regions and discuss the challenges they face today in preserving a language and culture in the face of pressures from the mainstream.

A fifth generation Nova Scotian, Sally Ross studied in France receiving her doctorate from the Université de Tours. She taught the history and culture of French Canada for ten years and now works as a learning resource consultant. She is known for her translation of Georges Arsenault's Island Acadians: 1720 - 1980. Alphonse Deveau, an eighth generation Acadian, was the first director of the Centre Acadien at the Université Sainte-Anne. His past writings of Acadian history include La Ville Française (1968), Les Personnes Eminentes (1988) and The Diary of a Frenchman (1990). Ross and Deveau shared the Dartmouth Book Award earlier this year for The Acadians of Nova Scotia.



## JOHN STEFFLER WINS RADDALL AWARD WITH FIRST NOVEL

The Afterlife of George Cartwright - John Steffler's stunningly original retelling of the exotic adventures of an eighteenth century fortune hunter to Labrador - has been chosen as the winner of the Thomas Raddall Atlantic Fiction Prize for 1992.

John Steffler was born in 1947 in Toronto and grew up in rural Ontario. He has worked as a farm hand, deck hand, teacher, janitor, sandal-maker and carpenter, and has lived and travelled for extended periods in Europe and North Africa. He has lived in Newfoundland since 1974 where he currently teaches English Literature at Memorial University's Sir Grenfell College in Corner Brook.

His writing awards include the 1993 W.H. Smith/Books in Canada First Novel Award, the Newfoundland Arts Council's 1992 Artist of the Year Award, the Canada Council's Joseph S. Stauffer Prize, nomination for the 1992 Governor General's Award for fiction, and two Norma Epstein prizes from the University of Toronto.

An acclaimed poet, Steffler has contributed to many literary journals and has four collections of his work published: An Explanation of Yellow (Borealis Press, 1981), The Grey Islands (McClelland & Stewart, 1985), Flights of Magic (Press Porcepic, 1987), and The Wreckage of Play (M&S, 1988).

George Cartwright, the main character of this splendid novel, is a dead man. Although the historical character was born in 1739, the youngest son of a down-at-heels country squire and died eighty years later after a long career as soldier and adventurer, the protagonist of Steffler's book hunts and haunts but can't die. Weaving in excerpts from Cartwright's own diaries, Steffler recreates a lost time and place and a character of overwhelming appetite and ambition who is infected by the harsh and unforgiving beauty of Labrador.

### The Evelyn Richardson Memorial Literary Award

#### Evelyn Richardson


Born in Shelburne County in 1902, Evelyn Richardson is probably best known for We Keep a Light (McGraw Hill Ryerson, 1945) which won the Governor General's Award. It is an autobiographical account of the years she and her husband spent on Bon Portage Island, where he was the lighthouse keeper. There they raised their family of two girls and one boy while developing an ever increasing self-sufficiency on their privately owned portion of Bon Portage. We Keep a Light is a kind of Nova Scotian Swiss Family Robinson - the wild nature of the elements providing the warmth, and the determination and ingenuity of the two main characters, Evelyn and Morrill Richardson, providing the continuity. Added responsibilities, deprivations and excitement during the Battle of the Atlantic make the account of the Richardson's life on Bon Portage even more remarkable.

Evelyn Richardson proved that rejection slips from publishers with that hateful phrase "of local interest only" could be overcome. One of her greatest accomplishments was to familiarize her national and international readers with her much loved corner of Nova Scotia. Following the publication of We Keep a Light, hordes of visitors started to arrive annually to explore Bon Portage and, more often than not, were graciously received by the writer and her family.

The Evelyn Richardson Memorial Literary Award was established by the Writers' Federation 1977, shortly after Evelyn Richardson's death, to honour the best published non-fiction writing by a native or resident Nova Scotian. The \$800 prize is accompanied by an original sculpting of the lighthouse by East Dover artist and blacksmith, John Little. The statue is commissioned by and has been provided by the Canadian Coast Guard - Maritime.

Previous winners of the Award include Harry Bruce, Alden Nowlan, Joan and Lewis Payzant, Kay Hill, Bruce Armstrong, Murray J. Beck, Brian C. Cuthbertson, Lilias M. Toward, P.B. Waite, Tony Foster, Harold Horwood, Dean Jobb, Judith Fingard, Harry Thurston and Robert Pope.







#### The Thomas Raddall Atlantic Fiction Award

#### Thomas Head Raddall

Thomas Head Raddall was born at Hythe, England in 1903. In 1913, his father was offered a post as an instructor in small arms with the Canadian army. The Raddalls settled on the western outskirts of Halifax, amid the dairy farms of Chebucto Road. Major Raddall was killed at Amiens in 1918. Mrs. Raddall's small army pension provided no allowance for children over fifteen, so Thomas Raddall, aged fourteen, and with a grade eight education, "fibbed" his way into the Canadian School of Telegraphy. After finishing his course, Raddall spent two years at sea, and then was posted to Sable Island, where he wrote his first published short story and absorbed the background he later used in The Nymph and the Lamp.

Confined to shore stations when he had hoped to return to sea, Raddall left the Marconi Service in 1922 and studied bookkeeping at the Maritime Business College. Jobs were scarce when he graduated, so Raddall went, none too happily, to a backwoods post with the Macleod Pulp and Paper Company at Milton near Liverpool. He worked for this company and later for Mersey Paper

Company until 1938. In his spare time, he began to explore his surroundings, becoming a woodsman and making friends with local Micmac guides.

He married Edith Freeman in 1927. Their first year together was a difficult time: troubles in the woodpulp market meant a 20% decrease in pay; Edith's brother was drowned; and their first child was born dead. For both financial and emotional reasons, Raddall began to spend much of his spare time writing. He sold a blood-and-thunder pirate serial to an American magazine, and at the request of the president of Mersy Paper prepared his first two books, Saga of the Rover and Markland Sagas. He also began to sell stories to Maclean's and Blackwood's. by 1938, he felt ready to leave the paper company and write full time. Raddall's work had already come to the notice of other historical writers, and it was with the encouragement of then editor Thomas B. Costain, that he undertook His Majesty's Yankees.

Raddall's literary reputation continued to grow: he received three Governor-General's Awards in fifteen years, and several of his works were adapted for radio and television. He received honourary degrees from Dalhousie, Saint Mary's, Kings', St. Francis Xavier; was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada and was made an Officer of the Order of Canada. He was offered, but declined, the post of Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia. Today Thomas Raddall lives in Liverpool, Nova Scotia.

The Thomas Raddall Atlantic Fiction Award was established by WFNS and the Writers' Development Trust in September 1990 to recognize the best work of adult fiction written by an Atlantic writer published in the preceding calendar year. Previous award winners are Wayne Johnston in 1991 for The Divine Ryans (McClelland & Stewart) and Herb Curtis in 1992 for The Last Tasmanian (Goose Lane Editions). The original cash award of \$1,000 established by the trust has been augmented to \$2,000 by an anonymous donor.

The Writers' Federation of Nova Scotia was established in 1975 to foster creative writing and the profession of writing in the province of Nova Scotia; to provide advice and assistance to writers at all stages of their careers; to encourage greater public recognition of Nova Scotia writers and their achievements; and to enhance the literary arts in our regional and national culture. Acting as an advocate for writers, the organization:

- o Organizes workshops, conferences, retreats and educational programs to promote writing
- o Publishes a newsletter, *Eastword*, to inform the membership of what is happening within the region and across the country
- o Communicates and works with other writers' groups in Nova Scotia, nationally and internationally
- o Maintains a permanent collection of books written by Nova Scotia writers and an up-to-date members' resource file
- o Represents the interests of writers to a variety of agencies and government departments; and lobbies on behalf of the interests of these writers
- o Administers the Evelyn Richardson Memorial Literary Trust and Award, established in 1975 to honour the memory of this pioneering writer and recognize the best non-fiction trade book by a Nova Scotian
- Administers the Thomas Raddall Atlantic Fiction Award, established in 1990 to honour Thomas Raddall and recognize the best fiction title by an Atlantic writer
- o Provides an equipped writers' studio to any member writer that requires a quiet writing space or word processing instruction
- o Provides a manuscript reading service of editorial and marketing advice from professionals among its members
- o Administers Writers in the Schools, a program funded by the Government of Nova Scotia, which arranges for and subsidizes writer visits to classrooms throughout Nova Scotia

The Writers' Development Trust was incorporated under federal charter in 1976 for the vital purpose of actively advancing interest in Canadian literature and supporting the development of Canadian writers. The Trust, which undertakes projects throughout the country and which has become well known for the hugely successful fundraising event - The Great Literary Coast-to-Coast Dinner Party - was instrumental in assisting WFNS establish the Raddall Atlantic Fiction Prize. Most recently the WDT presented Sandra Birdsell, who joined us for Writes of Spring last May, with the 1993 Marian Engel Award. The award of \$10,000 established by Margaret Atwood, honours one of Canada's most beloved and respected writers and is presented to a Canadian woman writer in mid-career, recognizing her collective works and the promise of her future contribution.

Thank you, thank you and thank you again. Such a treat finally to have met you.



Novel Born and raised in England, but an adopted Haligonian since 1977, Paddy Muir is a full-time freelance writer. She keeps body and soul together by explaining assorted industries, institutions and art forms to themselves, to each other and to the general public. She specializes in making sense of engineers and is engaged in a lifelong battle against overwhelming odds to eradicate words such as 'proactive' and 'rightsize' and 'impact' from corporate prose. Her book for children, Love from Katie, was cited for an Our Choice Award by the Canadian Children's Book Centre in 1992, and her short story, Eye of the Beholder, received honourable mention in Grain's 1993 Short Fiction competition.

Non Fiction A resident of Halifax for the past 25 years, Julie M. Ross won with her manuscript Yankee Tory: Jacob Bailey 1731 - 1808. A dynamo of harnessed energy, Julie has worked as an interpretive specialist with the Canadian Parks Service where she was engaged with the restoration of Province House and Ardgowan in Charlottetown. While there, she coordinated the interpretive teams and created the media and public relations packages. Today, she owns her own consulting business - Julie M. Ross Research and Design Associates - and is doing historical research for the Carleton House Project. She volunteers as chair of the Resources Committee of the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia; chair of the Special Events Committee of the Art Gallery of Nova Scotia and co-chair of the 1994 Art Lottery; serves on the board of the Church Conservancy Society of Nova Scotia and the Royal St. George's Society of Halifax and co-ordinates the Open Doors program at Cathedral Church of All Saints.

Short Story Born in Charlottetown, Gail Gray graduated in theatre and philosophy from Dalhousie University. She spent several years teaching English in Malawi before returning to Halifax where she is working as a health records administrator. She started writing several years ago when she joined a creative writing class at St. Mary's University. Last year, Gail won third place in the short story category with the second short story she had ever written.

Personal Essay Jean B. MacKenzie who has always lived in Berwick, works with Statistics Canada and is the mother of two children. In the past several of her short stories have appeared in the Nova Scotian section of the Chronicle Herald. Missy, her prize-winning essay, captures a magical moment of heaven, storm-stayed for a number of years in a rural Nova Scotia hospital.

MacDonald longs for retirement when he can write full time. Acclaimed for his children's picture-book novel Chung Lee Loves Lobster (Annick Press, 1991) which won the L.M. Montgomery Award, Hugh has also seen several of his poems published in literary journals and was third place winner of the Carl Sentner Short Story Award for Family Snapshots. Retirement is not likely soon: when not teaching high school, Hugh and a family that includes five sons and a daughter may be found singing in the church choir, canoeing, sailing, cooking or participating in local theatre productions.

The Joyce Barkhouse Writing for Children Award When Syr Ruus Baker learned that judges had commented that her story, Edgar, about the exploits of a kidnapped crow, had genuinely captured the voices of her juvenile audience, she just laughed. "Well I should hope so, after teaching grade three for fifteen years!" Born in Estonia, she lived for a number of years in the States where she graduated with an M.A. in English. She started writing about six years ago and is delighted that the competition gave her an opportunity to do something with her story.

Play A native Nova Scotian brought up in the Valley, Christy Ann Conlin has had a pinch-me-I'm-dreaming month. With her play, Alone with a Head of Lettuce, completely sold out for its recent run at Acadia University, she picked up the phone to learn that she had won first prize in the play category and second prize, poetry in the WFNS competition. Currently studying Education at Acadia, Christy Ann graduated with a BA in theatre from the University of Ottawa.

Dear Dr. Tom:

We continue to be humbled and heartened by your Dad's continuing generosity to his colleagues. This will acknowledge receipt of \$3,530 which we have added to the Raddall Endowment account. It's currently in a GIC with the investment being rolled back in each month. Although the bank statement for end February is not yet in hand, my ledger indicates that it has earned 166.06 since we started the investment last May. Susan Atkinson-Keen has asked her investment advisor to look at the Raddall funds and see if there's as safe an investment area for them that would bear better interest; and if you have suggestions, they would be most welcome. We complete our fiscal year at the end of March and our audited statement is ready for presentation to the membership at the AGM at the end of May. I think it would be best if we started providing you with a copy of the statement so that you can keep track of these restricted funds.

I am also enclosing a receipt for the amount of the successful bid on your Dad's collection of books at our recent Celebration and lunatic auction. It was such a successful evening. We have always wanted to have an event that brought together the whole community - young writers, established writers, publishers, booksellers, librarians, interested members of the public - but for some reason it had never quite worked. And I had my doubts when we arrived to set up the room in the late afternoon: it seemed vast and echoey. I consoled myself with the notion that if everyone sat near the front that they wouldn't notice the empty seats at the back. Well, several hours later, the room was jammed and alive with animated conversation. We had to have extra chairs brought out, and ran out of programmes. The auction, which proved a perfect ice-breaker and great opportunity to mingle and talk to people you hadn't met before, also earned us \$2,000 toward our programs for young and emerging writers. Thanks for allowing yourself to be bothered yet again on our behalf with bringing in the much sought after books by your father: Budge Wilson beat out all the other bidders but it was getting a little acrimonious there for a while.

And books have begun to arrive for this year's Raddall Award: looks like a very fine crop - particularly out of New Brunswick.

Our continuing thanks to you and warmest best wishes to you Dad. I thought he might enjoy this little clipping from the Quill & Quire just in. They had called asking if we had a good photograph: we don't have anything very much but I sent them along a copy of Joyce Barkhouse's book in hopes that they might be able to work from that. In the end they've gone with the Costain covers. Do you have a photo of your Dad that we might use?
