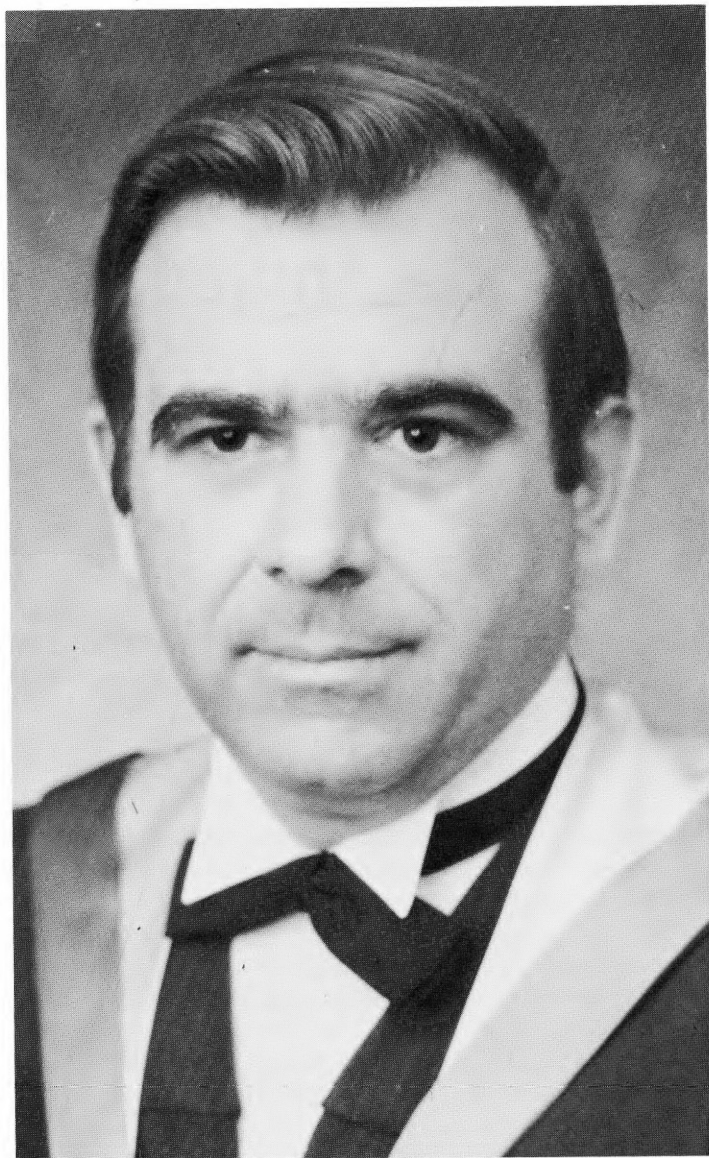

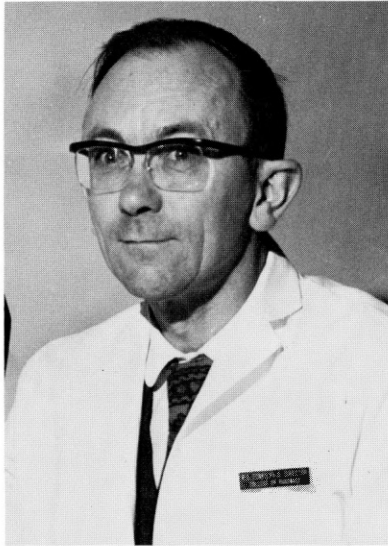

I am very sad that Pharmacy lost one of its most recent graduates with the tragic sudden death of Mr. Ned Flemming just before Christmas, 1974. Ned was a well-liked student who added zest to everything he participated in. He worked hard and was keen to ensure the highest standard of pharmacy of practice. Mrs. Flemming and the five children have our deepest sympathy.

We had a year of firsts in 1974/75: Lorne Richardson as Pharmacy's first Vice-President of the Dalhousie Student Council; and, the first University Gold Medal for the Faculty of Health Professions was awarded to Miss Isobel MacLeod at the '74 Convocation for outstanding academic achievement, with Miss MacLeod, Miss Bell and Miss MacCara making our first triple distinction baccalaureates.

Last year two saw the first use of a questionnaire in our admissions programme. The Calibre and academic standard of students admitted to the College continues to be very high and this year we had the highest total of entrance scholarships in the College's history.

What other innovations have taken place this year? The preceptor programme in the fourth year was launched this spring and is being closely watched by students, staff and licencing bodies alike. We hope to introduce a block time-table in the fourth year next fall to facilitate that and other programmes. Our first structured study of OTC preparations began last fall in the fourth year as did a new course in Therapeutics and Iatrogenic disease. An interesting and highly topical component has been introduced into the Hospital Pharmacy elective.

The stamina of the second year students has been truly tested with this year's first exposure to the rigours of advanced human physiology. By 1976 we should have a course specifically for Pharmacy.

How glad we are that the first year students settled so readily and completely into the full life of the College. Pharmacy Week was an outstanding success as was the Ball, which attracted so much support from Pharmacists from all parts of the Maratimes. Dr. Murray Katz brought a refreshingly different and provocative presentation on Industrial advertising for us to consider. His visit too was a considerable success.

Congratulations to our successful team in the Co-Ed softball tournament - our broom-ball team presently looks full of promise.

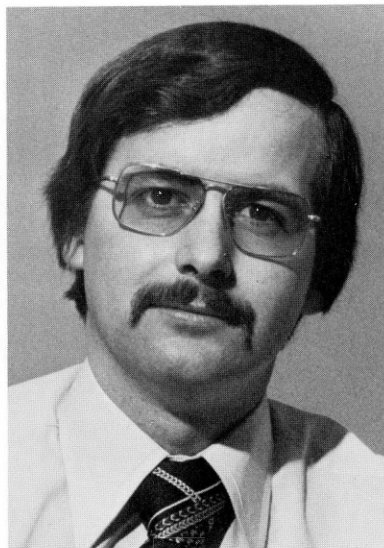
Third year have been working particularly hard this year and we have great expectations for them.

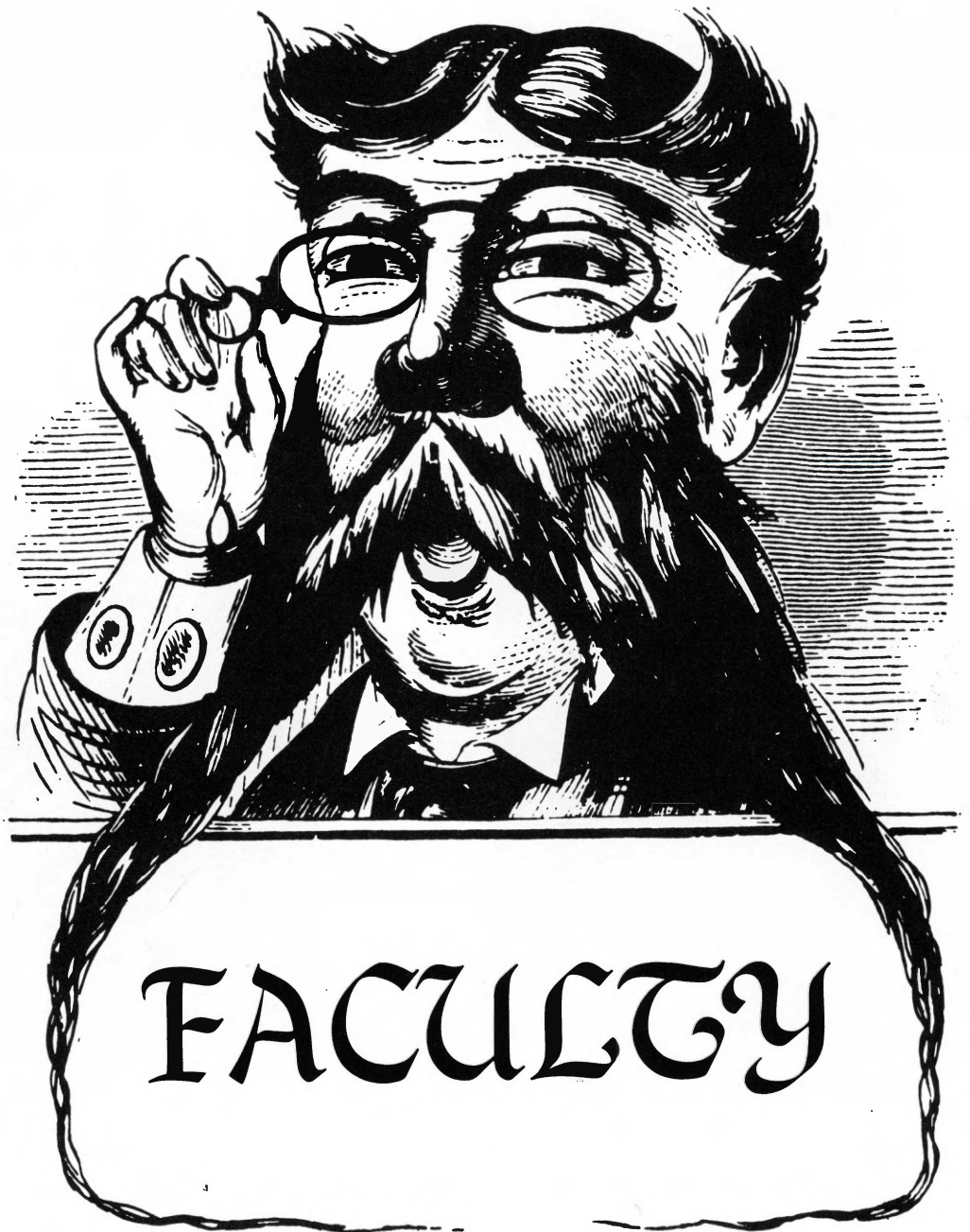

To those students remaining, I encourage you to keep up the good work and spirit which has traditionally made Pharmacy the best faculty on campus.

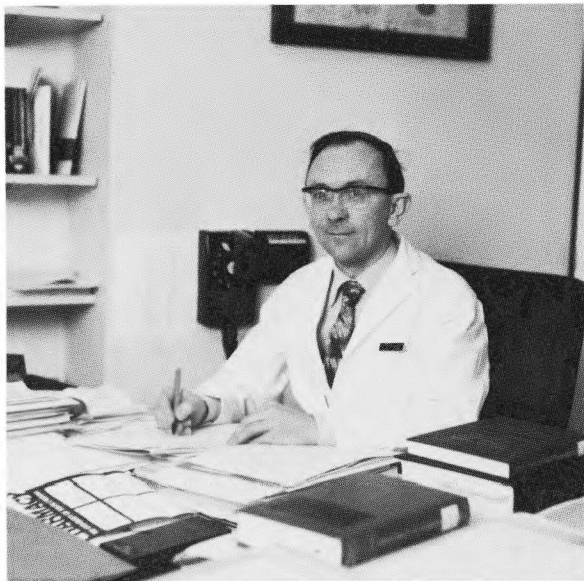

One of the major results this year was the formation of the Carleton Campus Task Force (Lower Campus) to discuss the feasibility of Student Union membership and to provide greater co-operation among the Health Professions. A survey conducted on the topic showed a desire for more interest in the Lower Campus by the Upper Campus. As a result, there is now a temporary book-store at the beginning of the first semester on the Lower Campus; tickets for Entertainment events are sold on the Lower campus; and Health Professional Executives know a bit more about each other.

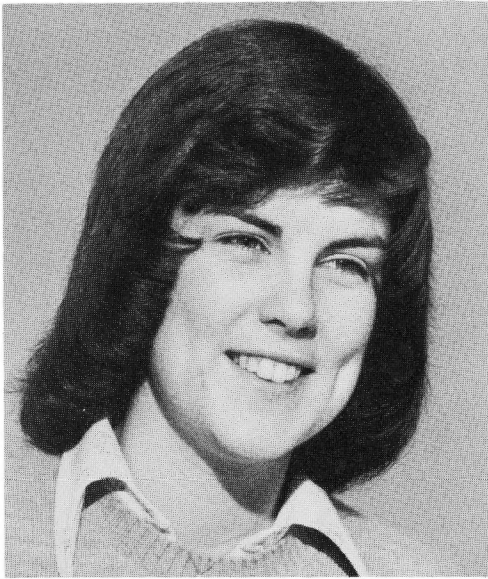

Pharmacy has been very active in the above areas, with myself on Council, and Lorne Richardson as Vice-President of the Union.

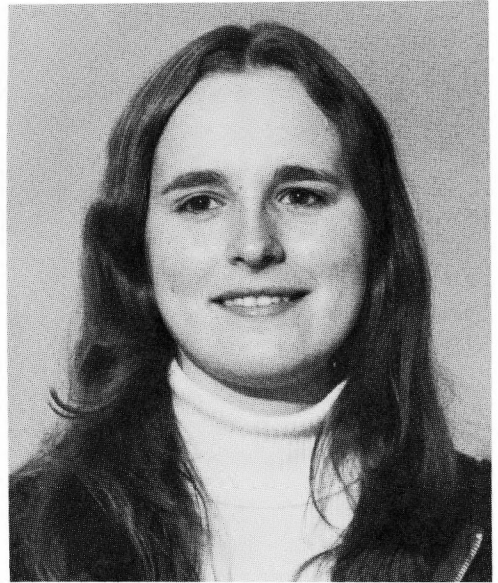
I hope that I have satisfactorily represented Pharmacy's views on the Fee referendum, the Union's Grants Committee (who we thank for \$500.00 this year), etc.

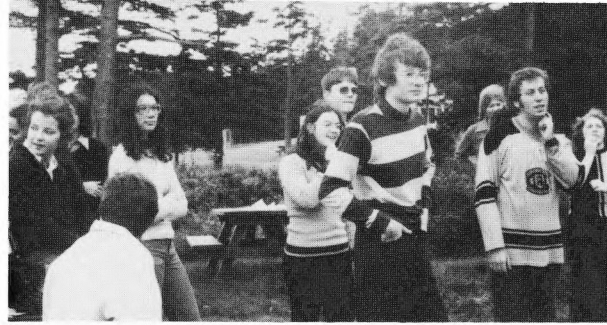
On behalf of Irene and myself, may I say that I hope we can all continue to work together to make Pharmacy, not only at Dal. , but right across Canada, even better in the years to come.

The General Meeting which took place in November was to give everyone a chance to see how the D.S.P.S. executive was run and to hear about some of the future events at the College.



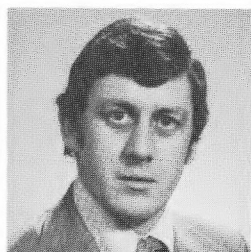
