Your letter of March 6th, addressed to Mr. George W. Tingley, has been passed to this office.

First, I would like to thank you for making it possible for Col. Chappell of Oshawa to address your Club on Tuesday, March 26th. This privilege is very much appreciated.

For your information, Col. Chappell is a member of the Oshawa Rotary Club, and the writer is a member of the Moncton Club. Arrangements are being made for Col. Chappell to speak at the Moncton Club on the 25th, and, later, other Clubs in the Maritime Provinces. Col. Chappell has addressed a great many service clubs in Ontario, so you may rest assured that the programme we anticipate arranging for you in Halifax is not of an advertising nature. The only advertising is the fact that he belongs to General Motors, and naturally his views are coloured by such a background.

In addition to Col. Chappell's talk, we have a talking picture which, of course, is mostly of our own plants at Oshawa, St. Catherines, etc. This picture shows the actual building of cars in the various stages, but, while it is General Motors of course, it is so arranged as to be purely educational - that is, there is no mention of price or any other advertising in the film. Col. Chappell speaks on different subjects. For your information, I am attaching notes extracted from an address given by him, entitled "The Constituents of a Car". On glancing over these notes, I am sure that you will agree that the talk is educational and interesting.



NOTES EXTRACTED FROM ADDRESSES

MATERIALS

Drawn from earth's remotest sources, of all moveable objects representing a finally completed whole, there are few in whose construction so many materials, so many places, so many trades, and so many persons are involved.

There are over 4,500 parts in a Chevrolet car. If you split these parts into their individual components, you would reach a total of approximately 14,000 items.

We currently produce 155 different types of automobile or truck which necessitates the Purchasing Department making available a stock of nearly 50,000 different parts of material in order to maintain normal production.

SOURCES

In spite of our boundless natural wealth, we must go far afield for many of our needs.

Economics - political and industrial - are the means by which markets are opened, maintained or closed. Hence, sometimes sources far distant are required to supply a semi-finished product, the raw material for which may be found within our own borders.

Steel - from the blast furnaces at Pittsburg, which have been fed with iron ore from Minnesota, poured into billets and blooms, rolled at Wierdon, Va., or Gary, Ind., and fabricated into bars, sheets and strips. There are over 75 different alloys of steel in the modern automobile besides many grades and alloys of cast iron. These materials are further fabricated into body parts such as fenders, running boards, hoods, radiator shells at Oshawa, or drop forgings, differential gears, tubes, axles, etc., at St. Catherines, or again used as material for casting engine blocks and such parts at Walkerville.

Lead and Zinc - mined and smelted in British Columbia and further refined in Toronto and Montreal.

Copper - reduced and poured into bars in Northern Ontario, refined, alloyed and rolled into tubes, sheets and bars in New Toronto.

Tin - from far off Malaya in the Straits Settlement or perhaps from those ancient Cornish Mines which have been producers since the time when the Phoenecians traded with the Ancient Britons.

Aluminum - from that gray clay-like ore known as bauxite, brought from British Guiana in the equatorial zone, fused with another ore product, criolite, which is brought from Greenland near the Arctic Circle, and then using the heat developed by Quebec's "white coal" at Arvida near Chicoutimi, eventually becomes the bar or sheet aluminum with which we are familiar.

Lumber - from the forests north of Haliburton come maple, birch and elm, arriving at Oshawa in the form of rough 2" planks. Cedar and fir from the forests of British Columbia, in long lengths and in five-fold laminated sheets. While from the Maritimes and the Pacific coast come the requirements of spruce and pine.

Asbestos - threshed out of the rock which is gouged out of those vast quarries at Thetford Mines and other parts of the Eastern townships of Quebec, being subsequently fabricated in a dozen different places across the Dominion.

Rubber - from South America or from the East Indies brought in in bales of crude sheets or else in the more modern method in that native juice of the rubber tree - latex - milled, callendered, fabricated and cured as tires, tubes, sheets, pads and blocks, in Toronto, Hamilton, Kitchener and Montreal as well as many smaller centres.

Wool - sheared from the backs of Australian and New Zealand sheep. Washed, carded and made into yarn in England and Canada, where after strengthening with Cotton from Egypt or the Southern States, is woven into various textile fabrics at Farnham or Montreal, Quebec, or Renfrew, Peterboro or Toronto in Ontario, as well as special types of material in other smaller towns in Canada.

Plate Glass - brought in in raw stock sheets from England, Belgium or even Czecho-Slovakia, to be polished, cut and treated either as standard plate glass or safety glass, in its various forms and sizes, in Canada.

Services - consider the use of Hydro, telephone and telegraph, customs duties and freight. On these five items alone our company spent during 1933 nearly five million dollars, a sizeable industry in itself. This is why we say that the purchase of a new Canadian-built car represents 87 days' work to the Canadian workman for we are not merely employing men in automobile factories and garages but we are putting people to work in practically every line of industry.

Building a car reflects in some measure the use of all arts and sciences as well as the technique of the workman. This is why we say that the automobile industry is a major industry, an industry of national importance for a car in its physical aspect alone represents a series of highly important economic functions in the industrial life of our country.

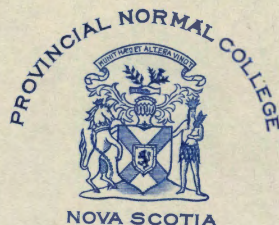


