The academic year $1986 / 87$ was a year of celebration to recognize the 25 th anniversary of the Faculty of Health Professions of which the School of Physiotherapy is a senior and important part. Students went to the community Malls with poster demonstrations. Schools had their homecoming as did the Faculty as a whole. Professors went public with their expertise and student research days seemed to gain greater prominence. The Faculty hosted a successful symposium on Educating Health Professionals for the 21 st Century, and the year culminated with your graduation and with our distinguished guest, the Hon. Monique Begin, former Federal Minister of Health and Welfare receiving a Doctor of Laws honours causa at your convocation.

What did we have to celebrate? Your graduation was a significant part of the celebration. The fact that you could receive your education in physiotherapy in Atlantic Canada would be reason enough to celebrate, but there is more. Faculty, therapists and students in Atlantic Canada are able to make their contribution to the body of knowledge in physiotherapy and such research will grow. The School and its graduates have the opportunity and with it an obligation to influence the quality of care in Atlantic Canada and elsewhere in the country. Such is so for the other Schools in the Faculty.

The School of Physiotherapy at Dalhousie University was opened in 1963-the third School in the Faculty at that time. Miss Hazel Lloyd, later Professor Lloyd, established a diploma programme with the part-time Medical Director, Dr. Arthur Shears. Professor Hill joined the School within a few years of its inauguration. They set the pattern of physiotherapy education at Dalhousie until Professor Egan was appointed as Director with the specific task of creating a four year degree programme which he and his colleagues introduced in September 1976. The programme received full accreditation in September 1986. The School is now in its next phase of growth under the direction of Dr. Joan Walker and I look forward to a further increase in research and to the early introduction of a graduate programme. You have reasons to be proud of your School and I hope that you will keep in touch with it. May I wish you a challenging and rewarding career as a physiotherapist.
