We have been out of touch for ages, which is sad. I hope you are keeping well and active.

You may be interested to know that Nica is back in Milano, where she has a research job at the University and besides is preparing to take her doctorate in Medicine! She is also working for an Italian publisher as scientific editor. So I am really proud of her, but I know how much we owe to you.

I have been immersed into my oceans -- and there seems to be no way of getting out of them. This Spring, incidentally, I will be in New York for two months (Mid-March to mid-May) for the U.N. Law of the Sea Conference, and it would be lovely if we could meet during that time.

What I am writing to you today about, is a little <u>nuisance</u>, and I apologize for bothering you. But the circumstances are somewhat special.

We are sending you a copy of my new book THE DRAMA OF THE OCEANS which will be published by Harry Abrams in March. I wrote the book for the International Ocean Institute, and all royalties go there, for fellowships, research, and action. This is why I am somewhat brazen in doing what the publishers want me to do for promotion. The publishers have been doing exceedingly well: the book is a Book of the Month special dividend; other bookclubs have bought it, and it has already been sold all over the world for translations.

Now could you be so very generous as to write one or two sentences about the book which the publishers could use for advance publicity? The more exciting, the better:as I say, it is not self-aggrandizement; it is for the common cause.
