Dear Mrs. Borgese;

I should prelude these remarks by saying this idea is still in the stages of a Winnie-the-Pooh hum.

We were wondering whether or not the Oceanic Society, through OCEANS, could sponsor a, say, weekly column called "The Sea" which could be syndicated around the country.

Before trying to sell the idea to a syndication agency we would like to build up a stable of writers (6-10) who could each produce a column of 500-750 words every few weeks, that is somewhere between a blue moon and an average moon.

Features should be both newsworthy and general background material. Each contributor would have an area of very general specialty, but there would be plenty of overlap.

The income, and the main point of this is income (although the Society also hopes to get some mileage), would be split equally between the Society and the writer of that particular column.

Would you be interested in being part of the stable? I hope so. If you are, could you send an example, preferably two? The areas where you could see yourself making the best contribution -- these could be geographical as well as thematic. And finally, a curriculum vitae.

If you are interested, there is no real hurry for this, but if you could get the stuff to us in a month that would be fine.

We hope to publish both letters in the May/June issue of OCEANS. As you say, they will make an interesting exchange and clarify a few points for our readers.



Dear Don:

I was just writing the IOI Report to keep to the July 15 deadline you sent me when Fox brought in a copy of the May-June issue, which arrived today, having been posted on April 26, again by surface mail instead of air-mail. That was the first indication we had that you were definitely cutting the "IOI Report" out of Oceans.

In your letter of March 4 - the last we received from you - you said "the publisher suggested that probably the IOI Report should go", but that you would, in any case, run our Report in the May-June issue. Instead we find that you have just put in one short paragraph of highlights.

Your March letter arrived here on March 11 and the next day I replied to your questions about the use to which the report is put, and the distribution given, pointing out that we still hadn't received 100 copies of any issue except Volume 6 No. 4.

Having heard no more I wrote a piece on Mediterranean mariculture for the July-August issue, and air mailed it to you on April 29. We had no acknowledgement, and I presumed it was now published. We had intended to use it for forthcoming conferences. I feel that at least advance information of the changed schedule was due to us, both as friends and as collaborators.

The July-August IOI Report will be mimeographed, and I'll send you a copy when it is done. It deals with "An environmentally sound law of the sea" (the enclosed "Introductory Notes" I presented to a meeting of NGO's called by Barbara Ward in London might interest you, in that connection); my participation in the Whaling Commission in London at the end of June, and with the "events" at Caracas - Elisabeth is there following, lobbying (I'm sure), and holding seminars with "developing" delegations.

Our book on the Mediterranean is at last published; I presume you have by now the proceedings of PIM IV.

I anticipated pleasure in reading Nicholas Rosa's "What is Leviathan's future?". Instead I was disappointed. It is so full of inaccuracies and distortions that it plays right into the hands of the exploiters while purporting to be pleading for a moratorium. It does, in my view, a great disservice to the cause of conservation, and will offend many of those groups who worked so hard, and with effect, last month to influence the governments meeting in London. One of the most important things we have to do is get the relevant facts straight in order to pursue good purposes effectively. I'm tempted to write a critique of it - would you publish it? Even without pictures?


