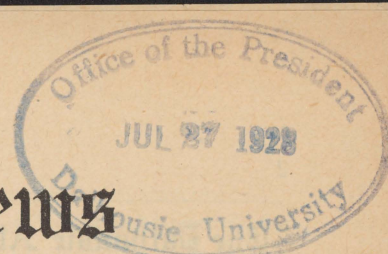

ALUMNAE ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Dalhousie Alumnae took the form of a luncheon at the Halifax Hotel.

All the girl graduates, in the five faculties, were present as guests of honor, and to the great pleasure of the entire company, Miss Jean Bayers, of the Faculty of the University of Saskatchewan, a most loyal alumna of Dalhousie, was present also.

On behalf of the alumnae, Mrs. Pond welcomed the graduates most happily, Miss Jean Mackenzie responding with grace on their behalf.

The Triennial meeting of the Federation of University Women is to be held in Vancouver August 21, 22 and 23, and Miss Florence Blackwood, Miss Jessie Henry and Miss Lois Creighton will attend as delegates from Halifax.

The various reports were presented by the respective officers Mrs. Douglas McIntosh reporting that the sum of \$217 had been raised for the memorial Gymnasium. There was the report on Federation by Miss Judith Piers, and there followed announcement by Mrs. E. W. DALHOUSIE LAW SOCIETY HOLDS ANNUAL DINNER

The Dalhousie Law Society held its annual banquet at the Halifax Hotel and it was one of the most successful and enjoyable of the student functions held this year. The president of the society James E. Mitchell, acted as toastmaster.

Among the toasts were those to the college, proposed by M. A. Farmer and responded to by Dean John Read, of the school. The toast to the graduating class was proposed by H. H. Turnbull and responded to by A. J. Walsh.

Mr. Justice Mellish delivered a very entertaining address and the list of speakers included Dr. A. S. Mackenzie, president of Dalhousie University, Professor A. L. MacDonald, Professor H. E. Read and Professor J. W. Godfrey.

ELEVATED TO BENCH

Hon. W. J. O'Hearn, K.C., Halifax, has been appointed Judge of the County Court for Halifax City and County.

Hon. Walter J. O'Hearn, former Attorney-General for Nova Scotia, was born in Dartmouth, received his education in the Halifax Schools, and took his degree in law at Dalhousie University. He has always practised his profession in Halifax, and attained considerable eminence in criminal cases.

Mr. O'Hearn is a King's Counsel and was at one time Registrar of Deeds for Halifax County and subsequently Junior Police Magistrate for the city.

When Hon. O. T. Daniels, Attorney General for Nova Scotia, resigned in 1922 Mr. O'Hearn was taken into the provincial government by Premier G. H. Murray and he was returned by acclamation at a bye-election, Jan. 16, 1923.

TRIBUTE TO NEW CHAIRMAN

The President extended a welcome to the new Chairman of the Board of Governors, Mr. G. Fred Pearson, referring to him as a tried and able leader. For years he had thrown himself, heart and soul, into the work of the University, and the results of his energy and ability are much in evidence.

Speaking of the University's development Dr. Mackenzie said that Dalhousie had grown from a small provincial college to the status of a national university, and the guidance of her future policy and progress was a matter of corresponding national and not merely local, importance. The outlook of her leaders, he said, must be broad ly Canadian and their concern the interests of the country as a whole.

Chief Justice Mathieson, of Prince Edward Island, gave the address to the graduates. His words of congratulation to the graduates were filled with a humour which spread throughout the convocation hall before he had concluded with his expression of good will and best wishes for the future.

ALUMNI BANQUET

An informal banquet was held on March 30th, at the Green Lantern under the auspices of the Dalhousie Alumni Association. Major H. B. Stairs presided and introduced the principal speaker, Mayor Kenny, who is a member of the Alumni and a governor of the University. About 100 were present, half of whom were members of the graduating classes.

Other speakers were Dr. Howard Murray, Dean of the University, Gerald Godsoe, retiring President of the Student's Council, and Murray Rankin. Letters were received from President Mackenzie and G. F. Pearson, chairman of the Board of Governors, who were absent from the city. Among those present were Judge Russel, Dr. MacMechan, Dr. George Murphy, A. H. Buckley, J. L. Hetherington, H. E. Mahon, and a number of professors and other well-known citizens.

ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Alumni Association was held in the Board of Trade building on May 14th, and officers for the coming year appointed. Dr. K. A. MacKenzie was chosen Alumni Governor. Major H. B. Stairs was elected President. J. E. Rutledge was elected first vice-president, and Prof. W. R. Maxwell, second vice-president. R. E. Inglis was chosen secretary-treasurer, and the executive was selected to consist of O. R. Crowell, Dr. W. Alan Curry, J. W. Logan, Dr. E. Kirk Maclellan, and Dr. E. W. Nichols. Many of the officers for the year were re-elected from last year.

The financial statement read at the meeting showed that the amount collected during the year had totalled \$1768.31 and that expenses had been \$1738.40, there being a resultant balance of \$29.91. Nearly \$1200 was raised under the auspices of the association by R. M. Fielding for expenses of the football team on its trip to Vancouver. In addition to these expenditures, the Association is raising funds for the Alumni development fund to contribute toward a new Gymnasium.

Auditors appointed at the meeting yesterday were Messrs. Jubien and Morton. During the year Alumni News was sent out four times to 3800 graduates all over the world, Prof. Read editing the News distributed. The number has now been increased to almost 4000.

CONVOCATION

With her graduating class numbering one hundred and forty young men and women, Dalhousie University observed her sixty-fourth annual Convocation with all the time honored academic ceremonies in the College gymnasium at Studley. The occasion marked the close of Dalhousie's sixty-fifth year of continuous activity since its re-organization in 1863, and the one hundred and tenth year of its existence, and as pointed out by President Mackenzie in his introductory address, the year just concluded witnessed the establishment of new attendance records.

Endowed with the sunlight and glory of early Spring, conditions which have not failed to give their benediction to the closing exercises now for many years, the Convocation attracted a gathering, comprised of friends and relatives of the graduates and friends of the University, as large as any which hitherto crowded into the Studley Gymnasium on such an occasion. There was the usual colorful parade of faculty and students from the various college buildings to the scene of graduation, there was the usual large representation of other leading educationists awaiting to extend congratulations to both University and Students on the success of their efforts, and there was the customary joyous spirit abroad amongst the graduates as they stepped to the platform to receive their degrees from the University.

Of the students in attendance at the University this year, numbering 823, or ten percent more than last year, one hundred and forty received degrees from the various faculties yesterday. More than sixty received the degree of Bachelor of Arts, and twenty-five received the degree of M. D., C. M. Seven students received the degree of Bachelor of Commerce, one the degree of Bachelor of Music, five the degree of Bachelor of Science, eleven the degree of Bachelor of Laws and five the degree of Doctor of Dental Surgery.

Twelve students received degree of Master of Arts and three the degree of Master of Science.

Four students received diplomas of Licentiate of Music, six received Engineering diplomas, and six diplomas in Pharmacy.

Dr. Allan Chester Johnson, former tutor in Classics at Dalhousie, and now Professor of Classics at Princeton University, received the honorary degree of L.L. D. Dr. Johnson is a native of Loch Broom, in the County of Pictou. He came to Dalhousie in 1899 from Pictou Academy, and during his undergraduate course won the North British Society Bursary, the highest prize given at that time for general proficiency at the end of the Sophomore year. In 1904 he was awarded the Bachelor of Arts degree with high honours in classics.

A notable feature of convocation was the foremost position taken by the co-eds, who in several of the faculties outnumbered the male graduates. In the Faculty of Arts and Science there were thirty-seven girl graduates as compared with thirty-three boys.

There was one co-ed in the class of eleven to receive degrees in Law, and one in the class of twenty-five to receive degrees in Medicine. Dentistry and Commerce were the only two faculties in which the co-eds were not represented among the graduates.

Following the Invocation by Rev. Dr. C. M. Kerr, Minister of the Presbyterian Church, Halifax, President Mackenzie gave his annual statement, reviewing the college year and telling something of the efforts which have been made to develop the University.

Dr. Mackenzie made feeling reference to the recent deaths of three members of the Board of Governors, George S. Campbell, Judge W. B. Wallace, and Mr. Justice T. S. Rogers, all of whom, he said, "are rare in any community and worthy of the warmest tributes which we can pay to their memory."

WAR MEMORIAL UNVEILED

A bronze war memorial tablet in memory of those members of the Class of 1912, Dalhousie University, who lost their lives during the Great War was unveiled during the convocation exercises on May 15.

H. W. L. Doane, president of the class made the presentation, and Mrs. Eugene Parker unveiled the tablet. A short address was delivered by Professor Howard Murray.

The tablet was cast under the personal direction of W. E. Hillis, of the Class of 1911, and bears the following inscription:

"In proud remembrance
of those Dalhousians of Class 1912
who gave their lives in the Great War,
1914-1918

Edward Reginald Clayton,
William Ross MacAskill,
Arthur Paton MacIver,
John Park MacQueen,
John Cuthbert Stairs."

PRESENTED TO DALHOUSIE

Dalhousie is again indebted to Mr. Dugald Macgillivray for some exceedingly interesting additions to the collection of autographed books which he has been gathering for the University Library. It is not long since the announcement was made in the papers of the gift of books with the signatures of some of the outstanding figures in the European world. The present list includes volumes by the Countess of Oxford and Asquith Baron Beaverbrook, Dr. Robert Bridges, Mr. Rudolph A. Clemen, Professor Maurice R. Davie, William Clyde and Arnold Gessell of Yale University, Dr. A. T. Hadley, ex-President of Yale University, General Sir Ian Hamilltin, Right Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, Emil Ludwig and Field-Marshal Sir Wm. Robertson. Several of these have a signed page of greeting to the students of the University.

DALHOUSIAN HONORED BY WESTERN COLLEGE

At the annual convocation of Manitoba University held recently, W. F. Hanna, a native son of Nova Scotia was signally honored, when the degree of Doctor of Philosophy, the first to be conferred by the western University, was given to him.

Mr. Hanna, who received his early schooling in the city of Halifax and his first University degree from Dalhousie, has had a distinguished career in plant research work in the west. After receiving his degree at Dalhousie as Bachelor of Arts in 1915, he enlisted with the Canadian Expeditionary Force and served throughout the duration of the war in France and Flanders as a member of the air force.

Returning to Canada in 1919, he resumed his studies at the University of Alberta taking degrees of Bachelor of Science and Master of Science in agriculture there. Subsequently he

entered the University of Manitoba as a research student and a few years ago joined the faculty of the University of Minnesota, being a professor in the department of plant pathology.

ROYAL VICTORIA HOSPITAL GRADUATES

Among this year's graduates are Miss Marion I. Clark, B. A., daughter of Dr. and Mrs. J. A. Clark, Oxford Street, Miss Kathleen Covert, B. A., a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Covert, Dartmouth, and Miss Burns Ross, B. A., daughter of Rev. R. W. Ross and Mrs. Ross.

Miss Covert has won the distinguished honor of a course in Public Health at McGill University, this honor only being obtainable by one graduate each year, a fact which speaks for itself of the excellence of her work as a student nurse.

BACK FROM WORLD TOUR

Rev. D. MacOdrum, B. A., '97, of Brockville, formerly of Halifax, has returned from a world-tour during which he visited the mission stations of the Canadian Presbyterian church. Mr. MacOdrum left Canada last September and was heartily welcomed on his return by the congregation of the Presbyterian church in Brockville.

PROF. MERCER FOR HARVARD

Professor C. H. Mercer of the Dalhousie University modern languages department, has been granted a year's leave of absence by the institution, and during the coming year will continue his studies at Harvard University, Cambridge. Professor Mercer who had been an active advocate of the work of the League of Nations Society, in this city, and in New York, where he delivered a series of lectures for the League of Nations Non-partizan Society, has been awarded the Austin Scholarship for teachers.

DEAN FALCONBRIDGE LECTURES AT LAW SCHOOL

Dalhousie Law School a year or two ago began the system of having some distinguished jurist give each spring a short series of lectures. Two years ago the subject was the Civil Code. Last year it dealt with Extra-Territorial Treaties. This year Dean Falconbridge, of Osgood Hall, so took up the subject of the "Codification of the Law."

He is a simple, easy and forceful speaker, using simple English easily followed, and his lectures have been followed with a great deal of interest.

S. C. A. CONVENTION

PROFESSOR HUNT HAS RESIGNED

The news that Professor Bishop C. Hunt, of the Department of Commerce, has resigned his chair, the resignation to become effective at the end of the present term, will be received with sincere regret, for during his four years residence here and his six year's association with the university he has won not only the regard of his students and of his fellows of the faculties at the University, but of the community as a whole. He will, it is understood, return to his home state of Massachusetts, and certainly along with great regret at his departure, every good wish will follow him.

PROFESSOR BABKIN GOING TO MCGILL

Professor Boris Babkin, of the staff of the Medical College and Mrs. Babkin have sailed for an extended trip abroad. Much to the regret of a wide circle of friends they will not return to Halifax but will take up their residence in Montreal where Dr. Babkin has accepted a position at McGill University.

Dr. Bronson and Dr. J. H. L. Johnstone will this summer spend the season in Schenectady with the General Electric Company.

Dr. H. L. Stewart, Mrs. Stewart and their children have sailed for Ireland where they will spend the summer.

Malcolm McIntyre, a New Brunswick man, has been appointed Instructor in Law at Dalhousie University. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. McIntyre, of Sackville, was graduated in Arts from Mount Allison in 1925 and has been in attendance at Harvard where he took his LL. B. degree.

THE WELDON CHAIR

The Dominion-wide campaign among the graduates, former students and friends of Dalhousie Law School to endow the Weldon chair of law is now under way. The object is to raise a total sum of \$100,000, a certain proportion of which has been allotted by the committee in charge to the citizens of this city who desire to do honor to the memory of Dr. Weldon, the founder and first dean of Dalhousie Law School and who had the welfare of legal education at heart. The foundation of this new chair is in continuation of the forward moving policy of the school and to enable it to maintain its present place of leadership among Canadian law schools in future. The first contribution of \$25,000, to the fund was made several weeks ago by the Hon. R. B. Bennett, a distinguished graduate of Dalhousie Law School. It is noteworthy that the second and third subscriptions have already been voluntarily made by two of the law students who graduated this year. James E. Mitchell has given \$50 and Charles MacKenzie \$25. This evidence of loyalty and appreciation is very encouraging to all well-wishers of the school.

1851 EXHIBITION SCHOLARSHIP

Announcement has been made of the award of the 1851 Exhibition Scholarship to Miss Mabel Ashmere Borden of Dalhousie University, Halifax. It is Miss Borden's distinction to be the first woman in Canada and one of the probably only three or four women in the British Empire ever to receive this eminent scientific prize. The scholarship which has a value of \$2500. provides for two years of advanced study in a university abroad.

Miss Borden received her bachelor of arts degree at Dalhousie University in 1927 following an undergraduate career that was marked by such diversified activities as a specialization in zoological science, the presidency of the Dalhousie Girls' Club, the Headship of Shirreff Hall and the captaincy of the Dalhousie Girls' Basketball team that won in that year the Maritime championship. She carried on advanced biological studies at Woods Hole, Mass, and zoological research at St. Andrew's, N. B., during the past two summers. She has spent the last university year carrying out important researches on the scallop under the direction of Professor Gowanloch of Dalhousie University through a bursary of the National Research Council of Canada, and received from Dalhousie her Master of Arts degree at the convocation this spring.

Miss Borden is the second of Professor Gowanloch's students to win this highly prized scholarship within the past three years, Robert C. Robb, who this year received his doctorate from Harvard University, being the other young Dalhousie zoologist so honored. Dalhousie has had a succession of successful 1851 Scholarship men out of all proportion to the numerical size of the university, a record that is particularly proud since the selection is made by the Commission in London, England, and the candidates represent all regions of the British Empire. Miss Borden will continue abroad studies of scientific problems fundamentally important to the Maritime Fisheries.

DR. J. STEWART REMEMBERED ON BIRTHDAY

Dr. John Stewart, Dean of the medical faculty at Dalhousie University, widely known in Europe and America for his work in medicine, honored by the British Empire, by the University of Edinburgh and other institutions of learning, on July 3rd celebrated his eightieth birthday at his home, 28 South Street.

Telegrams and cablegrams from many parts of Europe, including one from Sir Watson Cheyne now living in the Isle of Wight, who was associated with Dr. Stewart and Lord Lister in the latter's great research efforts, and one from an eminent Swedish medical authority, were received during the day by Dr. Stewart. Others

came from all parts of Canada and United States centres.

During the afternoon many friends visited his home and included among them were members of the staff at Number 7 Stationary Hospital, Canadian Expeditionary Forces in France, of which Dr. Stewart was the commanding officer with the rank of lieutenant-colonel. He has since been granted a full colonelcy.

ADMITTED TO NOVA SCOTIA BAR

Rex J. Moore, LL.B. '27, was admitted to practise at the Bar of Nova Scotia in April. Mr. Moore was born at Sawyerville, P.Q. In 1921 he was graduated from the University of Bishop's College, as a Bachelor of Arts and following his graduation was on the teaching staff of Bishop's College School as Assistant Master for three years. During his college career Mr. Moore has held many offices and has been a popular athlete. He is at present with the Halifax branch of the Royal Securities Corporation.

Two of this year's graduates in law have been admitted to the Bar. A. J. Walsh, and J. G. Godsoe. Mr. Walsh was born at Holyrood, Nfld., and received his early education at St. John's. He entered Dalhousie Law School in 1925, winning the Caerswell prize each year since then and the University medal in graduating this year. Mr. Walsh will practise at St. John's.

Mr. Godsoe is a popular Halifax boy, coming to Dalhousie from St. Mary's College. He has held offices in many of the college organizations and was selected this year for the Malcolm Honor Society's gold medal. Mr. Godsoe will practise with the firm of Burchell, Smith, Parker & Fogo.

OBITUARY

The death of Judge W. B. Wallace took place at Halifax on March 31st after a brief illness. Judge Wallace graduated from Dalhousie in 1895 and in 1902 was appointed Judge of the County Court. He took an active interest in public matters and social problems. For many years he was a lecturer at the Law School and was a member of the Board of Governors of the University. By his death, Dalhousie loses a warm supporter, the community a public hearted citizen and the legal profession a valued member.

Dr. Charles A. Hamilton, of Mahone Bay, passed away at his home on May 9th. Dr. Hamilton graduated from Dalhousie in 1891 and practised at Mahone Bay since 1892, where he was known as a faithful and skilled practitioner.

The death of Joseph P. Foley took place at Winnipeg on May 11th. Mr. Foley was graduated in law in the class of 1900. In 1910 he went to Winnipeg, where he joined the firm of which Sir James Aikens was the head, later retiring therefrom and becoming associated with the firm of Tupper, McTavish & Tupper. Mr. Foley became one of the most prominent lawyers of Winnipeg and established a large clientele.

The Hon. Mr. Justice T. S. Rogers died recently at Halifax after an illness of some months. Mr. Justice Rogers was appointed to the Supreme Court Bench in 1921 and was one of Nova Scotia's most eminent jurists. He was also at one time a lecturer at the Law School and a member of the Board of Governors. Another co-incidence in the careers of Mr. Justice Rogers and Judge Wallace is that they were members of the Halifax Relief Commission from the time of its inception

after the explosion of 1917 and the burden of this work in addition to their judicial duties may have contributed in large measure to their early deaths.

The death of Harry J. Crowe, A & S '96 took place at Toronto on May 25th after a lengthy illness. Mr. Crowe was born in Halifax and was well-known throughout Canada and Newfoundland where through his efforts several manufacturing plants were established.

Dr. Philip D. McLarren, one of the most promising medical practitioners of Halifax, passed away at the Victoria General Hospital on May 25th. Dr. McLarren graduated from Dalhousie in 1917 and immediately enlisted for overseas service. On his return he established a practice at Halifax and had won a place in the front rank of his profession in this Province. The leading medical men in Halifax united in paying the highest tribute to Dr. McLarren's ability as a physician and his high qualities as a man.

Dr. D. A. MacAulay passed away at his home in Baddeck on June 16th after a short illness. Dr. MacAulay graduated from Dalhousie in 1910 and practised in Cape Breton until 1915, when he enlisted and served overseas in the R. A. M. C. as medical officer. Dr. MacAulay practised at Baddeck since his return from overseas and had become one of that town's most beloved and respected citizens.

Many Dalhousians and especially those of the class of 1910 will mourn the sudden death of James D. McLeod. His genial manner and capacity for making friends will be recalled by all who knew him. After leaving Dalhousie he studied law in Calgary but when the war broke out he enlisted and served overseas. He was wounded at Courcellette and the effects of his war experiences were responsible for his death at a time when otherwise he would naturally be in the prime of manhood.
