NOTICE OF BY-LAW REVISION

Take notice that the following revision of the by-laws will be presented for consideration by the Annual Meeting of the Dalhousie Alumni Association on May 13, 1974.

That the following be added to Clause 3, MEMBERSHIP IN THE ASSOCIATION:

3.0 (4): Any person who is a graduate of the Nova Scotia Technical College and who is not already a member of the Association, may elect to become a member of the Association. This clause shall become effective on and not before the effective date of a proposed amalgamation of Dalhousie University and the Nova Scotia Technical College.



\$546,000 TO DALHOUSIE

Dalhousie will drill the deepest hole ever in the ocean floor. The experiment was made possible when the Department of Geology was awarded a \$235,000 grant by the National Research Council of Canada, in January.

Equally important was the \$311,000 NRC grant, also awarded in January, to the Dalhousie Biology Department for an extensive research program on plant and animal life in Nova Scotia's coastal waters.

The purpose of the Geology Department's project, officially called "Leg 37 of the Deep Sea Drilling Project", is to find out what actually lies beneath the ocean floor. This will be accomplished by drilling a hole over one mile deep in the ocean floor near the Azores and analyzing over 2,000 drill-core samples.

The Dalhousie project, the most extensive of its type ever carried out, will be executed by a five-man Dalhousie team aboard the M.V. Glomar Challenger, a 400 ft. ship designed by a California offshore-drilling company, Global Marine Inc. The drilling operation, to begin in late May or in June, is expected to take thirty days.

"Coastal Zone Productivity: Environmental and Genetic Aspects", the official title of the Department of Biology's project, began at the university in early January, and will be completed over the next four years. Work in the university will be done in cooperation with scientists at the Atlantic Regional Laboratory of the National Research Council, who are active in seaweed research.

The main fields of study will be the physiology and genetics of seaweed, oysters, and other coastal marine life.

CONTINUED EDUCATION

IS GROWING CONCERN

To learn - that's what Dalhousie's Committee on Part-Time Study and Extension wants to do.

The committee wants to know community attitudes about Dalhousie's role in meeting community needs. To help it to achieve its objectives, the committee, established a year ago by President Hicks, organized a two-part project which began in January.

Part one of the project consisted of a series of meetings between the committee and representatives of groups and organizations in the community so that the groups could express their opinions of the university's role. Part two of the project was a market research survey to determine what the community thinks about part-time and extension studies.

"Such views will be of great assistance to the committee when it prepares its final report," said Dr. A.J. Tingley, Registrar of Dalhousie and chairman of the Committee.

Until recently Dalhousie has not had an overall policy of full commitment to continuing education and part-time study programs, although several departments had been developing excellent programs of their own.

DAL INVOLVED WITH RIGHTS FOR INMATES

History was made in October, 1973, when the inmates of the Dorchester Federal Penitentiary, Dorchester, N.B., were provided with the first legal aid service ever offered to inmates of a federal penitentiary.

The service, the result of more than a year's discussions between the organizers, government officials, legal aid organizations in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, prison officials and inmates, was finally made possible when Dalhousie received an \$87,200 grant from the Donner Canadian Foundation for that purpose last September.

Four legal paraprofessionals trained by the Dalhousie Legal Aid Service, and operating under the direction of Executive Director Peter Harvison, a graduate of Dalhousie Law School who resides in Halifax, will offer legal services to the inmates of Dorchester for a two-year trial period.

A survey conducted at the Dorchester penitentiary showed that over fifty percent of the inmates interviewed had identifiable legal problems that required the services of a lawyer.

Late in 1972 the findings of the survey were considered by representatives of legal aid societies in Nova Scotia, the Halifax Coalition for Development, the National Parole Board, the Nova Scotia Barristers' Society, ex-offenders and Dorchester officials.

It was agreed that any form of legal service would have to be performed by trained lay personnel - legal paraprofessionals.

In the summer of 1973 Dalhousie's legal aid service obtained funding under the Opportunities for Youth Program of the federal government for a seven-week paraprofessional training program.

Fifteen people took the course and four have been chosen as the first legal paraprofessionals to form the working nucleus for the Dorchester project.

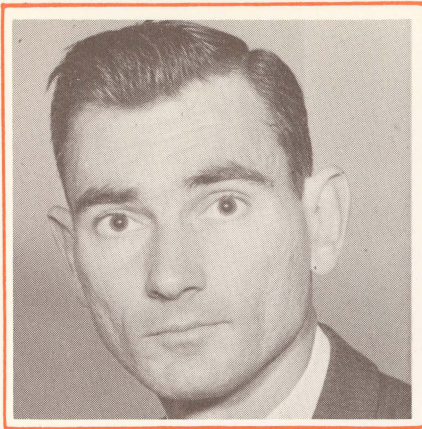
'63... **J. Scott Rogers**, BSc, is now an Assistant Professor in the Department of Industrial Engineering at the University of Toronto.

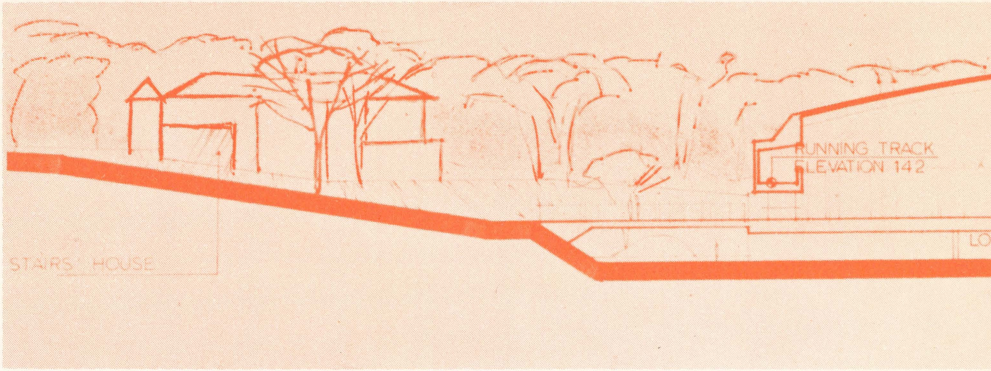

over proposed athletic complex

ATHLETIC COMPLEX

What began innocently in August 1973 as a public meeting to announce the start of a long-awaited athletic complex at Dalhousie, has turned into one of the most hotly contested issues in Halifax.

Since the initial meeting, south-end citizens, University officials, alumni, students and members of Halifax City Council have all become involved in a continuing battle. There have been statements and counter-statements, petitions for and petitions against, an application for rezoning, a public hearing, a rezoning by City Council to prevent University construction on the property, an appeal against the rezoning and a statement that the University may institute legal action against the city in the courts.

Rezoning Requested

Dalhousie invited some of its neighbours to the meeting in August, 1973, to discuss the University's desire to build a physical education, recreation and sports centre on property it owned south of South Street opposite Studley Field.

Objections to the proposal were raised and a Committee of concerned area residents was formed. The Committee's main point was that if the University was to be allowed to develop its property south of South Street, it would be the "thin edge of the wedge" in further southward expansion.

Despite University statements that it had no further interest in acquiring or using any additional land south of South Street, a number of residents

asked Halifax City Council to rezone the area in question from R-2 to R-1. Such rezoning would prevent the University from developing or improving the property it has acquired south of South Street during the last 11 years.

In a statement, which formed the basis of a letter to the Mayor and Aldermen, University President, Dr. Henry D. Hicks, said that if the City Council rezoned the area to prevent land from being developed in the way the University has planned for several years, both the city and the University would lose much-needed facilities for physical education, recreation and sports.

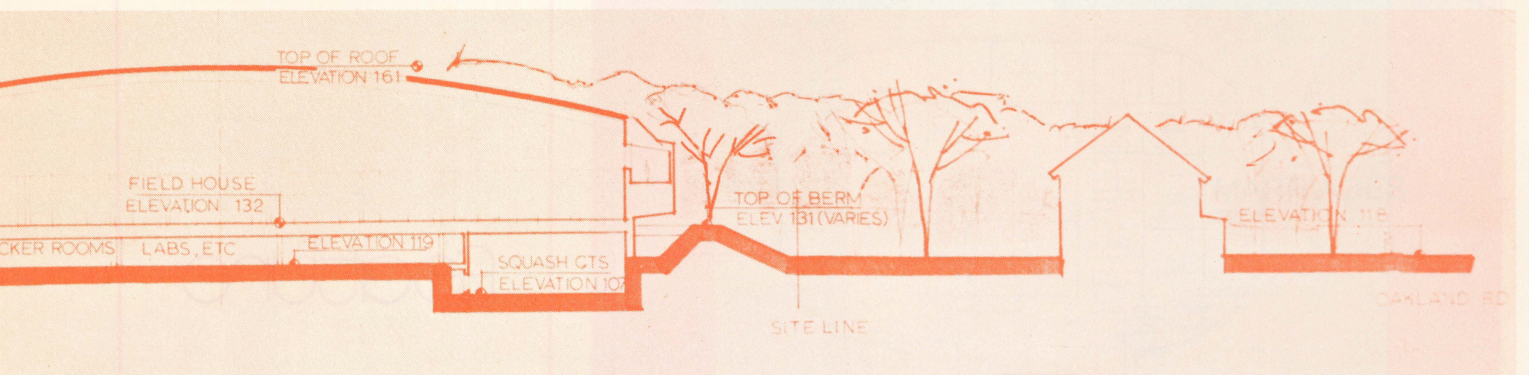
Dr. Hicks said that the University, at the request of residents in the area to reconsider its proposal to build the centre on the site south of South Street, has reviewed fully all the possibilities for meeting the University's needs with other land it owned or could acquire in the foreseeable future.

"There is a poor alternative site for the proposed centre on the north side of South Street. That alternative is Studley Field itself, but construction there would be feasible only if the site south of South Street can be further developed for outdoor recreation facilities, in other words to replace Studley field and track."

Dilapidated and Overcrowded Facilities

The University has the poorest physical education and recreation facilities for a university of its size in North America, and even lags behind many smaller institutions in the Atlantic region.

Too few people, said the President, realized that the University's present



facilities were planned and completed over 40 years ago, when only 700 students attended the University. Today most of the 7,000 students enrolled at Dalhousie could not hope to take part regularly in activities because of the dilapidated and overcrowded facilities.

Even so, said Dr. Hicks, the inadequate facilities had served extensively groups and individuals in the community for many years, and in its planning the University recognized that these groups

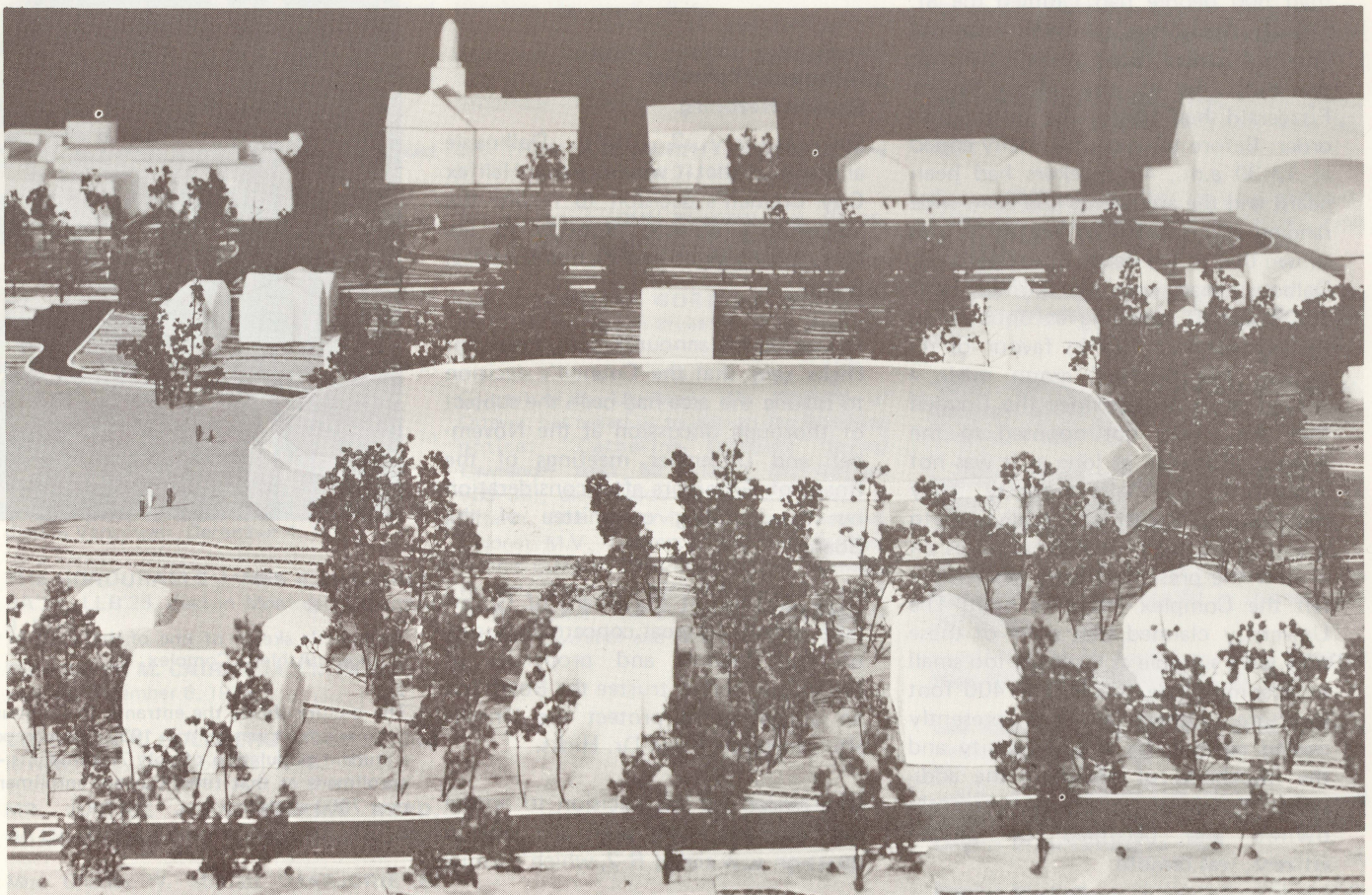
and individuals would continue to use any new facilities equally or more extensively than in the past.

But more important, said Dr. Hicks, Halifax was woefully lacking in recreation facilities in comparison with other cities of its size.

No one, therefore, could deny the urgent need for a better physical education and recreational plant at the University and in the City.

Public Hearing Called

When the issue became more heated, City Council called for a public hearing and set October 17th as the date. As the citizens' group in the South Street area became more active and mounted an intensive campaign against the complex, the University also began to petition for support. On October 3rd, the Board of Directors of the Dalhousie Alumni Association endorsed the stand taken by the Board of Governors of Dalhousie, and a committee led by Association Honorary President,

Murray M. Rankin, carried the University's case to the residents and aldermen in a concerted effort to prevent the rezoning.

The 3,800 Dalhousie alumni in the City of Halifax were sent a petition by President Hicks and a week later a follow-up letter and petition was mailed to alumni by Association President, W. Struan Robertson. At the same time Dalhousie students also circulated a petition among the student body.

On the night of the public hearing more than 500 people had jammed the St. Francis School gymnasium - several hundred others were turned away at the door - by the time Mayor Walter Fitzgerald had called the meeting to order. Before the meeting finally ended at 12:30 a.m., 40 speakers had been heard and the arguments had been wide ranging and sometimes heated. It was shown that in the battle of the petition, Dalhousie had won the skirmish with 1,500 against rezoning as opposed to the committee's 726 in favour of rezoning. The citizens' group made a strong effort to convince the Council that they were not opposed to the Atlantic Complex as long as it was not located on the Stairs property. They came prepared with large scale plans to show no less than 12 alternate sites on or near the present campus where they felt the Complex could be built. The University claimed that none of these sites were suitable as most are too small to accommodate the 200 X 400 foot structure. Others are not presently owned entirely by the University and the likelihood of obtaining the additional required properties, presently owned and occupied by private citizens, was remote.

In the end the question was referred to City Council and was discussed at their next meeting on October 25th at which time the decision was deferred. Finally, on November 16th, Dalhousie lost the battle when Council voted 7 to 3 to rezone the land from R-2 to R-1 which prohibits use for University purposes. Those voting in favour were Aldermen Dennis Connolly, Margaret Stanbury, Darrell Wentzell, Nick Meagher, Reg Bell, Bob Stapells and David MacKeen. Those against the rezoning were Aldermen Lou Moir, Leo Hogan and Merv Sullivan.

Dalhousie To Appeal Council Rezoning

On January 3, 1974, Dalhousie announced that it would appeal Halifax City Council's decision to rezone the University's six-acre property to the Nova Scotia Provincial Planning Appeal Board.

In making the announcement, President Hicks said that the Council's decision to rezone the area had been the subject of thorough discussion at the November and December meetings of the Board of Governors after consideration by the building committee of the Board.

"The decision of the Board of Governors reflects its great concern as trustee of the finances and properties of Dalhousie, and as trustee the Board has an obligation to protect the University's interests", said Dr. Hicks.

One reason for the decision to appeal was that for many years the area in question was zoned R-2, which permits

development for University use, and the University had made application for a building permit before there was a motion under consideration by City Council to rezone the property.

"The decision of City Council effectively precludes development by Dalhousie and adversely affects the value of the property in question. To replace it with an equivalent block of property in the vicinity of the University would take a very long time and cost a very substantial sum of money", added Dr. Hicks.

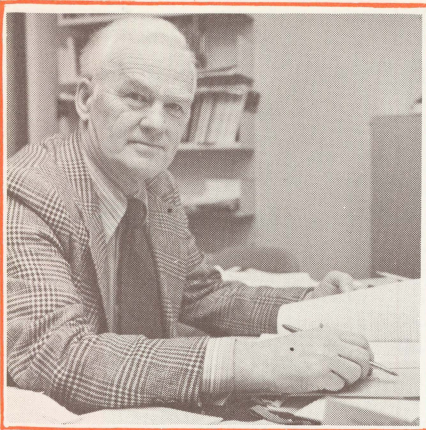

WHY HERE?

Why do high-technology industries locate where they do? What factors influence their decisions? These are two questions being studied by a team of researchers under the auspices of Dalhousie's Government Studies Program.

The purpose of the 18-month study, begun in 1972, "could do this," said Program Director Dr. Michael Kirby, "it would help in developing a government policy more precisely for the attraction of high-technology industry to Nova Scotia."

The project, the first major study undertaken by the university's Government Studies Program since its creation in late 1972, consists of five phases: detailed design of the study; identification of locational factors; analysis of the Halifax-Dartmouth area in the light of the factors determined in the previous phase; general policy analysis; and developing a number of alternative proposals.

The Dalhousie members of the four-man research team are Dr. Roy E. George of the Economics and Commerce Departments, and Professor Tom Pinfold of the Economics Department.

The project has an advisory committee consisting of representatives of the Nova Scotia Department of Development's Planning and Economics branch and the Industry Operations Branch, and the Metropolitan Area Planning Commission. Some representation from the federal and private sectors is also expected.

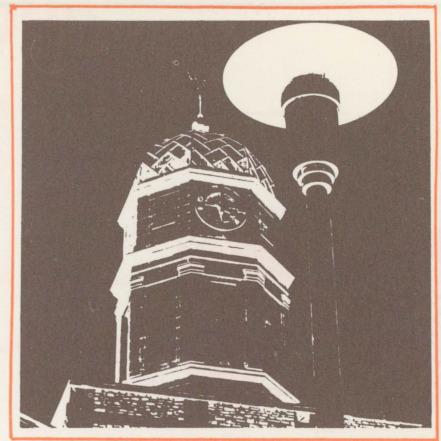

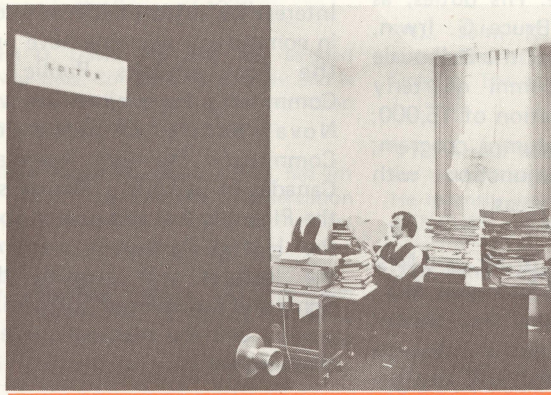

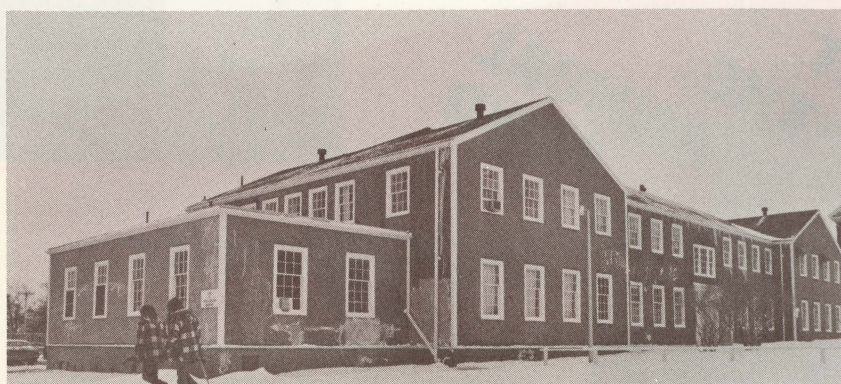
