

#### Spain Again

There have been a number of world-wide conflicts within the memory of men living today, and the pattern of aggression is becoming clearer as each day passes.

A try for world domination seems to follow a set pattern. First there is an artificial upsurge of extreme nationalism in the country planning conquest. This was evident in Germany before the two world wars and in the Soviet Union of the

The next step is to provide a scapegoat, so any potential opposition in the Homeland can be obliterated with national security the excuse. The Jews of Nazi Germany and the "Deviationists" and Titoists" of the present day are examples of this trend. The dramatic Red Purges of 1936 were the forerunners of another aggression.

After the homefront has been secure from all possible treachery, the next step is to test the weapons to be used.

Spain was the testing ground where Fascist and Nazi weapons were first tried against those of the Soviet Union. Franco was supported by "Special Brigades" of German and Italian troops, while his Communist opponents were equipped something about Norm and Bert, with the latest Russian guns.

It was in Spain that the Blitzkrieg tactics were first developed and tested. At the present time new Russian equipment is being used by North Korean and Chinese units in Korea, and new tactics, adaptations of classic Russian tactics of the last war are being tried against the only possible major opponents to Soviet aggression.

Manchuria was another example of a testing ground for possible aggression. The Japanese attack on China was preceded by the conquest of Manchuria, nine years before Pearl

The failure of the League of Nations to act to protect Manchuria and Abbysinia heralded the downfall of that world organization. The action of the U.N. promises greater things for the future of mankind.

The unceasing aggression of the Russian people is not to be overlooked, however. Ever since the days of the first Czars, the Russians have constantly attacked and conquered the weaker neighbors. The White Russians, Ukranians, Poles, Balts, and Finns, as well as countless peoples of Central Asia were brought within the fold of Imperial Russia.

In every case the Russian Army tested their equipment in some minor skirmish before committing it a major conflict. Korea may be just another testing ground. Who much that the Seniors should need





## TIGERS CAPTURE CITY LEAGUE CROW

### Defeat Shearwater 54-37 to Make Clean Sweep of Playoff Series

The Dalhousie Intermediate Basketball team captured the City Navy Edges Dal League crown for the second consecutive year last Thursday night In Swim Meet as they downed Shearwater, 57-34, to win the playoff series with two straight victories.

The game, played in Shearwater gym, was a real crowd pleaser, as Tigers forged to the front early in the first half, and staved off repeated threats by the tars, to win easily.
