It was kind of you to offer to pay for yours but if my sending this to you will in some small measure say "thank you" for the enjoyment I had from reading the "Govenor's Lady", I shall be very happy.

I thought you might be interested in the house we have purchased in Francestown, where this picture will hang. The house is an old brick end New England colonial.
