

Strike Update

The following information was released on Nov. 25/88 from the Office of the Vice-President:

Classes have now resumed and University operations are returning to normal.

Given the diverse range of the University's academic programmes, plans for the completion of the term and year will vary among the different faculties. The University is encouraging faculty members to work out arrangements with their classes to suit the particular subject and the needs of the students in the class. In this way it should be possible to finish classes in ways that are acceptable from an academic point of view, and that involve reasonable workloads for students and a minimum of disruption of their personal lives. At the time of this notice, appropriate arrangements appear to have been made in the majority of cases.

A variety of measures to assist students to cope with the demands of their academic programmes, and other administrative matters, during this period will be undertaken.

(1) For the remainder of the academic year, hours in the Kellogg, Killam, and McDonald Libraries will be extended as follows:

 Monday-Friday
 8:00 am to 11:00 pm

 Saturday
 9:00 am to 9:00 pm

 Sunday
 9:00 am to 11:00 pm

(2) Additional tutorial assistance will be available through the writing workshop.

(3) Extra service will be available from the Counselling and Psychological Services.

(4) To accomodate special inquiries from students, the Registrar's Office will be open untill 5:00 pm instead of 4:00 pm for the remainder of the term.

(5) The penalty and interest charges for late payment of fees will be waived for the remainder of the term.

(6) Students who withdrew from the University during the strike can re-register without any academic or financial penalty. (7) Computer services for students will be expanded if there is a clear need.

Some students have indicated that, for a variety of reasons, they are concerned that they cannot perform at a satisfactory academic level under the circumstances they will face in their classes following the strike. Therefore, they are planning to withdraw or drop some of their classes. The University encourages such students to attend their classes, find out what arrangements will be made to finish the term or year, and discuss any concerns they may have with their instructors, or advisors in the appropriate department of faculty, Registrar's Office, or the Student Services Office. Students who decide to withdraw from the

Students who decide to withdraw from the University or drop one or more of their courses should be aware of the following special arrangements that will apply until December 20/88 and retroactive to October 24/88.

(1) Class registration will be erased from their transcripts so that no "W's" will appear.

(2) They will receive a full refund of any tuition fees paid if they withdraw from the university, and an appropriate partial refund if dropping a class changes their fee status.

The University's hope is that these arrangements will be helpful to students affected by the strike. As well they are intended to allow be students a period of time during which they can assess the arrangements being made in their classes to deal with the time lost during the strike, and the obtain appropriate advice before making the very serious decision to drop a cource or withdraw from the University.

... appeal of a transcript notation, payment of fees, etc. (Regulatory appeal)


... defence of an allegation of plagiarism, cheating, etc(Academic offence)


Every student at Dalhousie University has the right to seek assistance or representation by an advocate if that student so wishes.




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
