To get all of this done has taken a little more time! We had an excellent meeting with Federico Mayor, and all formalities should be completed before the end of this week.

The schedule remains unchanged: although we have not yet fixed exact dates.

There should be a first meeting of Vice Presidents the end of February, in Lisbon. There should be a first Plenary of the Commission in Lisbon in April. There should be a second meeting of the Vice Presidents in Malta the end of May; there should be a second Plenary session of the Commission in Tokyo in September.

Hearings would go on all through the 1995. Our operational centres --including, of course, the one in Japan --should prepare lists of people and/or institutions and organisations which should be involved in the hearings, right now in January/February. Guidelines for the hearings, including a background paper, are being prepared by our office in Malta and should be approved by the first meeting of Vice Presidents. That meeting should also approve the final membership of the Commission; the time table, and should have a first round of consideration of what the most important issue will be and what the structure of the final Report might look like. We will then form working groups to deal with various aspects.

I think that sums it up right now. I shall send you another fax in a few days.

I am looking forward very much to meeting you and to working with you.

Dear Dr. Suzuki,

Thank you very much for your fax letter and for your kind offer to help with the Sasakawa Foundation. Our story is very simple. In 1987 I was awarded the Sasakawa United Nations Prize for the Environment. Ever since that time the Foundation has been generously supporting us. We have been dealing with Mr. Takashi Kobayakawa, Program Development Division, and lately with Mr. Akinori Sugai, Section Chief, Internat. Affairs Department. Contributions have ranged from \$50,000 a year (initially) to \$170,000 in more recent years. All the funding was for training programmes in China, India, and Fiji.

The problem is, they consider us as a training institute and will support only our training activities. Other projects, such as the Commission hearings or our Spirulina project in Africa, though deemed worthy, are not considered. Perhaps our applications for other than training activities could be moved to another branch. For the Commission, if my memory is correct --especially for hosting the Plenary Session next September --, the Sasakawa Peace Foundation had been mentioned.

If you are so kind as to discuss the matter with Mr. Setsuya Tabuchi, you might even widen the scope a bit and see whether they could consider support for our 3 Asian Centres (China, Japan, and Fiji) for the Hearings. That would be \$90,000 rather than \$30,000, but my impression is that it is a question of principle rather than one of the precise amount. UNDP is supporting the hearings in Africa, India, Costa Rica, and Fiji, with \$30,000 each, but, actually that is not much more than seed money, and when

you see the budget proposed for the Commission's work, you will see that considerably more is needed.

By DHL I am sending you the background paper for the hearings. Some of the questions raised may have to be adjusted by each region.

In a few days you will receive from Malta (by DHL) the annotated agenda and background material for the April 10-11 meeting in Lisbon.

Thank you for all your wonderful cooperation.

I do hope this change of venue does not inconvenience you too much, as a matter of fact, I thought that Paris is more convenient as a venue. Please let me know whether you wish us to make reservations for you at a hotel, I imagine, for the 9th, 10th, and 11th, or whether you prefer to make your own arrangements. Also please let me know

whether there is anything we should do in connection with your air ticket or change of ticket.

Also, Dr. Ruivo will be in Paris on May 17-20, and will meet with Mr Yaker to help hammering out some details.

My suggestion is, we stick to the dates we agreed on in our Paris meeting, i.e., We have another meeting the beginning of June (I think it was June 2-3). Obviously we cannot have the Plenary. Mr. Soares is far too late. My suggestion would be we skip the Plenary in Lisbon and plan now the first plenary in Tokyo, as agreed on September 4-7.

To the June meeting I intend to bring a first draft for the first "Interim Report" to the Fiftieth General Assembly --which should be very brief: merely an announcement of the establishment of the Commission; its mandate, and the importance of having such a Commission, indicating some of the major problems. This "interim report" should be adopted by the Tokyo Plenary.

At that point we would have caught up with our schedule.

Please do let me know whether you would agree with these proposals.

I saw a copy of Dr. South's letter to you and was glad to see that everything is moving ahead.



Thank you for your fax of May 29, which was awaiting my return from IOI meetings in Malta. I want to thank you most warmly for your commitment to raise US30,000 for the hearings to be conducted by IOI-South Pacific.

During our IOI-Meetings Ambassador Layashi Yaker reported on his meeting with President Soares of Portugal who has made his commitment to be Chairman of the Commission. He also outlined the procedures now in place to select members for the Commission, and the meetings to take place this month.

In order for us (IOI-South Pacific) to cover Australia and New Zealand in the Oceania hearings, I made a proposal to Elisabeth Mann Borgese and Dr Saigal, IOI Executive Director, to which they have agreed, pending your approval. I have suggested that for Australia, Dr Ken Brown of the Technical University, Sydney, Australia coordinate the hearings for Australia. He has provisionally agreed to this, in discussions we held during the Malta meetings. Similarly, for New Zealand I plan to approach a colleague who has the right connections and capabilities to conduct the New Zealand hearings which would be fed into IOI-South Pacific as part of our overall report to the Commission.

Can you please advise me whether you agree in principle with this? If we do proceed this way, some additional funds would be required to deal with the Australian and New Zealand hearings, since our original budget was based on dealing only with the Pacific Islands (the term "Oceania" has various interpretations).

I would estimate that we might need to provide \$20,000 for each of New Zealand and Australia, in addition to those funds already committed. It is possible that these funds could be raised internally by each country, but I am not sure we can entirely rely on that.

On a different matter, I am in the process of finalizing a proposal to the Commission to produce a major back-ground paper on coral reefs, mangroves and seagrasses, this a joint effort of the East-West Center and Pacific Science Association (Honolulu) and IOI-South Pacific.

With your help and personal contribution through payment of your own travel costs I am confident that we will now be able to proceed with our hearings in the Pacific Islands. I am hopeful also that you will agree to my proposed plan to proceed with the Australia and New Zealand segments. I will not act on these, however, until I hear back from you.







I was surprised very much by the fax letters of August 23, 1995 from H.E. President Soares and you respectively proposing the changes of the time schedule at this advanced stage of the preparation.

- I. Today, I have done my best effort to re-adjust the arrangements, and the results are as follows.
  - 1. The facilities of the UNU is available on Monday, September 4, so that we can have the Executive Committee meeting from 15:00 to 19:30 at the UNU.
  - 2. Fortunately, H.E. Mr. Takeshita will be able to stay with us at the UNU from 11:00 to 12:00 on Tuesday, September 5. His speech must be between 11:30 and 12:00.
  - 3. The invitation letters of the reception on Wednesday, September 6 starting at 19:30 at Sakura Room of the Westin Hotel have already been sent to leading persons of the ocean issues in the Japanese political and business fields and some ambassadors in Tokyo from H.E. Mr. Takeshita and myself. Among them are Minister of Foreign Affairs, Mr. Kono and Minister of Industry and Trade, Mr. Hashimoto who are strong candidates for the next Prime Minister, and former Prime Ministers Mr. Kaifu and Mr. Hosokawa who are the opposition party leaders. Although their attendance are not confirmed yet, it seems to me unwise to change the arrangement for the reception at this moment.

Therefore, I would strongly advise you that the Working Session on Wednesday September 6 should end at 18:30 in order for the participants including H. E. President Soares to move to the Westin Hotel to attend the reception.

Incidentally, in Japan the usual lunch time is 12:00 to 13:00 and the dinner time is 18:00 to 20:00 Therefore, the usual working time is from 9:30 to 12:00 and form 13:00 to 17:30. The starting time of reception at 19:30 is exceptionally late and we can not postpone it further.

4. It is awkward to start the press conference at 12:30 because it is in the middle of the lunch time in Japan. I would propose that the press conference should be set at 14:00 to 15:00 on September 5. I understand that H.E. President Soares has an appointment with Prime Minister Murayama at 15:30-1600. It takes less than 30 minutes from the UNU to the office of Prime Minister.

- II. Since we have to inform the changes in the time schedule to those who are interested in the World Commission and to cancel the reservation of the facilities on September 7 and 8, would you please send me a fax letter of H.E. President Soares' response immediately on September 24 which I shall receive on the morning of Friday, September 25? It would be too late for us to inform the changes in the time schedule to them next week when the meeting draws within a week. I sincerely hope that people in Japan including diplomats and international press people would not lose the chance to acknowledge the inauguration of the World Commission appropriately.
- III. I would also advice you to let the members of the Commission, who are coming to Tokyo, know the changes in the time schedule immediately.

As far as I know, some members of the Executive Committee are scheduled to arrive at the Narita Airport on September 4, and some other members of the commission are scheduled to arrive on September 5 or 6. They might not join the meeting from the beginning.

VI. With respect to the provisional agenda, I would like to leave it to the discussions between H.E. President Soares, Professor Mario Ruivo, Ambassador Layashi Yaker, and Professor Elisabeth Mann Borgese, because I may still have opportunities to propose alteration if any.

My dear Yoshio,

Thank you for your reply to Portugal. It is admirable how you adjusted to this surprising change; and all the decisions you made were excellent.

I had just studied your letter when I received a call from Ambassador Yaker who advised me that President Soares had decided to postpone the meeting to December.

Ambassador Yaker's call was followed by a call from Dr Mario Ruivo from whom I had no word since our Lisbon meeting. Now he tried to explain the President's position at length. He stressed the President's deep commitment to the Commission. He reported all the diplomatic initiatives he had taken in various countries at the highest level.

He had received a letter of warm support from Chancellor Kohl. He had made an appointment with Vice President Al Gore. He kept in close touch with Boutros Ghali whose support is whole-hearted, and this would include even financial support.

I do not want to express any opinion on the Portuguese decision until I hear yours. But, without prejudicing your own position, I see two alternatives as far as I am concerned. If the Japan Commission should decide to accept the postponement, I would, for the time being, go along. If the Japan Commission should react negatively, as I would fully understand, I would be willing to withdraw from the World Commission in its present form on the ground that their conduct of affairs since the Lisbon meeting has been unprofessional, incompetent and unethical and inspires no confidence for the future.

Am I correct in assuming that the hearings in Yokahama have been fixed and will take place in any case? If that were so, Krishan Saigal and myself would of course come in any case and participate in these hearings. I would be happy to deliver that half-hour "keynote address" that Professor Fuse had requested of

As for the rest, what would you think of the possibility of simply transforming the meeting into an international seminar, conducted jointly by the Japan Commission on the Oceans and the International Ocean Institute and co-sponsored by UNU? We could invite to that seminar all those who had accepted to come to Tokyo and have already made their travel arrangements. We would deal with the substantive issues before the Commission rather than with the procedural ones - which we would leave to President Soares. We would issue a publication, including Mr. Takeshita's speech and the results of the seminar -- and all the arrangements (or most of them) could stay in place.

Well, I do not know whether this is a realistic proposition. In any case, before reacting at all to Portugal, I am awaiting your next fax.

Please be assured that the IOI is totally at the disposal of the Japan Commission on the Oceans, that we deeply appreciate your work and want to support it in any way we can.

His Excellency, Dr. Mario Soares President of the Republic of Portugal

Excellency:

Your Excellency's letter of August 25, 1995 to me following that of August 23 were received with great surprise by the Japanese side, including myself, as we have been working very hard to prepare for the meetings scheduled for September. However, reading Your Excellency's two letters, I believe I have been able to fully understand Your Excellency's greatest concern.

The United Nations' Convention on the Law of the Sea had come through a bitter confrontation between developed nations, especially the United States, on the one hand and developing nations on the other before it was finally passed. Japan, standing between the two groups of nations, sought to find a point of compromise, thereby making some contribution in bringing the United States, which at one point had turned its back to the global forum, back into the framework.

The Independent World Commission for the Oceans, which your Excellency chairs, might not be able to achieve great success unless it can receive strong support both from developed nations, including the United States, and developing nations. Your Excel-



lency has been following a very appropriate course of gaining the support of Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali of the United Nations and Director-General Federico Mayor Zaragoza of the UNESCO, while keeping in close contact with Prime Minister Helmut Kohl of Germany and Vice President Al Gore of the United States. The efforts of Your Excellency are extremely encouraging in paving the way for future activities of the Commission. My efforts to have Your Excellency meet Japan's political leaders, including strong candidates from both the Liberal Democratic Party and opposition Shinshinto (New Frontier Party) for the position of the next Prime Minister, at a reception to be cohosted by His Excellency, Mr. Noboru Takeschita, and myself at the time of Your Excellency's visit to Japan were designed to strengthen the understanding of and support to the Commission on the part of the Japanese authorities.

Fortunately, I have been able to reserve the United Nations' University, with the exception of some facilities, as the venue for the Executive Committee on December 12, 1995 and the Plenary Session of the Commission on December 13-15.

The schedule of H.E. Mr. Takeschita is that although there is a possibility that he will have to give priority to an overseas trip, it has been decided that he will attend the Plenary Session and make a speech, barring the need for an overseas trip. I am planning to meet with Mr. Masaaki Kuniyasu, the new Ambassador to Portugal, before he leaves Tokyo shortly and have a thorough discussion with him on the Commission.

I expect that the three extra months we now have before the meetings would be used to prepare solid documentation on the



definition of the objective of the Commission and related organizational aspects including the structure and "modus Operandi" of the Secretariat, and that it should be sent out to the Commission members to seek their comments, so that the December meetings would have the participation of as many members as possible.

To all those concerned I have conveyed Your Excellency's appreciation for the preparatory work made so far and understanding of the difficulties in readapting the calendar and the engagement already entered into by the Japanese side.

I am looking forward from the bottom of my heart Your Excellency's visit to Japan in December.

My dear Yoshio,

I am just back from Lisbon and would like to convey to you my impressions. Actually I was not invited to attend the working sessions, but only a briefing session after the completion of the work.

Let me start on the positive side: I think the documentation will be ready within a week, and invitations will go out at that time, by fax or courier. This should be ample time. Certainly, the fiasco of last time will not be repeated.

The membership has been enlarged to 40. I am quite sure, however, that not all of them will come to the Tokyo session.

On the problematic side, I have some concerns that I would like to share with you.

The primary reasons for the postponement early this months were indeed those which you assumed. There have been political difficulties. Our chairman thinks these have now been resolved and he has in any case decided to move ahead.

However, I have just been made aware of an intergovernmental initiative, taken by the Government of the U.K. that appears largely to duplicate our work. Since the great powers are involved in this, it may explain the kind of reluctance that our Chairman appears to have met with.

I think, in practice, there will be significant differences. The Intergovernmental initiative will focus more on the environment, less on the wider implications of ocean governance for the U.N. system as a whole. Nevertheless, the establishment of this intergovernmental panel on the oceans changes the context within which we are working and we will have to relate to it somehow.

I am sure our Secretary-General will be in touch with you directly with regard to the agenda, the documentation, work plan and all other details. There will be ample time for a "general debate," where all members can contribute their ideas about every aspect of the Commission's work. One problem that will have to be solved is whether the session will be open or closed. President Soares seems to be very determined to have closed working sessions, excluding even the Centre Directors for whom I have drafted a note which I am attaching. According to his concept, only the opening session would be open to the public.

The Centre Directors will meet in Costa Rica, just prior to the Tokyo Session, and we will fully discuss the hearings at that session.

# The Restructured Global Environment Facility Questions and Answers

#### Background

#### What is the GEF?

The Global Environment Facility (GEF) is a financial mechanism that provides grant and concessional funds to recipient countries for projects and activities that aim to protect the global environment. It is jointly implemented by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and the World Bank. The GEF was launched in 1991 as a pilot program.

In March 1994, some 73 participating governments successfully concluded negotiations to restructure the Facility and replenish its Core Fund with over US\$2 billion to be committed over a three-year period. GEF resources are available for projects and other activities that address climate change, biological diversity, international waters, and depletion of the ozone layer. Activities addressing land degradation, primarily desertification and deforestation, as they relate to the four focal areas, are also eligible for funding.

#### Why was the Facility restructured?

Restructuring the institutional arrangements of the GEF—to provide for universal membership and greater transparency and democracy in the conduct of its affairs—became a priority in the months before the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development (UNCED), held in Rio de Janeiro in June 1992. Both Agenda 21, the sustainable development program adopted at Rio, and the new conventions on climate change and biodiversity, which named the GEF their interim financial mechanism, called for the restructuring of the Facility.

#### Who contributed to the replenishment?

Thirty-one countries, including fourteen recipient countries, pledged over US\$2 billion to the new GEF Trust Fund. A number of other countries from both the developed and developing world are also expected to make additional pledges. Contributions from industrialized countries are based on the burdensharing formula agreed for the tenth replenishment of the International Development Association (IDA10), the soft loan facility of the World Bank. Several donors have pledged voluntary contributions in addition to their burden shares.

# Who will manage the new GEF Trust Fund and when does the trust fund of the Pilot Phase (GET) come to a close?

The World Bank serves as the Trustee of the new GEF Trust Fund. It accepts contributions to the new fund for the period between July 1994 and June 1997. The Trust Fund of the Pilot Phase (GET) was terminated in March 1995, the effective date of the establishment of the new GEF Trust Fund. All funds, receipts, assets, and liabilities held in the GET were transferred to the new GEF Trust Fund.

#### How does cofinancing complement the Core Fund?

In addition to contributing to the Core Fund, some donors have set aside funds to cofinance GEF project activities and programs. This cofinancing can be in the form of grants or highly concessional loans.

#### What is the governance structure of the new GEF?

The GEF has an Assembly, a Council, and a Secretariat.

#### How does the Assembly work?

The Assembly consists of representatives of all participating countries, and is responsible for reviewing the general policies of the Facility. Its chair is elected from among the representatives, and all decisions are reached by consensus. It will meet every three years.

#### What is the role of the Council?

The Council is the main governing body of the GEF for all issues related to operations. It is responsible for developing, adopting, and evaluating the operational policies and programs for GEF activities. The Council will meet every six months in Washington, D.C.. Additional meetings will be held if necessary.

#### How are decisions taken in the Council?

Decisions will be reached on the basis of consensus. When consensus is not possible, the Council can turn to a voting system that safeguards the interests of both recipients and donors. This "double-majority" voting system requires a 60 percent majority of countries, as well as approval by donor countries representing at least 60 percent of contributions. Two-thirds of the members of the Council constitute a quorum.

#### How is membership of the Council determined?

The Council comprises representatives of 32 constituencies; 18 members are from recipient countries and 14 from non-recipient (i.e., developed) countries. Some constituencies include a mix of recipient and non-recipient countries.

The 18 constituencies composed of recipient countries are distributed as follows: 6 for Africa, 6 for Asia and the Pacific, 4 for Latin America and the Caribbean, and 2 for Central and Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union. The recipient country constituencies will be formed through a process of consultation among GEF recipient countries, taking into account a number of criteria including: (i) equitable and balanced representation; (ii) commonality of environmental concerns; (iii) policies toward sustainable development; (iv) natural resource endowment and environmental vulnerability; and (v) contributions to the Facility.

The 14 non-recipient constituencies will be formed through a process of consultation on the basis of contributions to the GEF. The larger donors can form their own constituencies.

#### How long will Council members serve?

Each Member of the Council or Alternate will serve for three-years, or until a new Member is appointed by the constituency. A Member and Alternate may be reappointed by the constituency. The Alternate will have full power to act for the absent Member.

#### Who will chair the Council?

Responsibility for conduct of the deliberations of the Council will be shared between an elected Chairperson (the UN model) and the GEF's Chief Executive Officer (the Bretton Woods model), who will also be the Chairperson of the Facility. The Chairperson of the Council will be elected for the duration of each meeting; the position will alternate between recipient and non-recipient members.

The elected Chairperson will be responsible for conducting Council deliberations related to:

#### When was the first work program of the restructured GEF prepared?

The first work program of activities for GEF1 was presented to the Council for review and approval in February 1995. For more detailed information on the GEF project portfolio, please refer to the *Quarterly Operational Report*.

#### How is an application for GEF funds filed?

Governments may apply for GEF funds directly to any of the implementing agencies. NGOs can do the same once the government has endorsed the project in principle. Projects submitted for funding under the Small Grants Programme in the 33 countries where the program is operational should apply directly to the national committee of the GEF Small Grants Programme.

#### Are GEF funds additional to traditional development assistance?

Yes. GEF operations are intended to complement, not substitute for, regular aid programs. GEF resources aim to facilitate projects with global environmental benefits for which official development funds are not normally available.

#### How are projects approved?

The Council must approve the joint work program. Proposals approved in the work program will be developed by the implementing agency. Before final approval by an implementing agency, the CEO of the Facility will endorse each project to ensure its consistency with the approved workplan. The Council will review final project documents if at least four Council members request such a review.

#### Is information on GEF projects available?

Yes. Information on projects can be obtained directly from the responsible task manager in the relevant implementing agency. The GEF Secretariat issues a Quarterly Operational Report that lists all GEF projects and the names of task managers along with their telephone and fax numbers.

#### Can the GEF finance projects put forward by other organizations?

Yes. The implementing agencies may make arrangements for GEF project preparation and execution by multilateral development banks, specialized agencies and programs of the United Nations, other international organizations, bilateral development agencies, national institutions, NGOs, private sector entities, and academic institutions, taking into account their comparative advantages in efficient and cost-effective project execution.

#### Relationship with Other Organizations

# What is the relationship and nature of cooperation between the GEF and the climate change and biodiversity conventions?

The Council will ensure the effective operation of the Facility as a source of funding for both the conventions, should the Conference of the Parties (COPs) designate the GEF their permanent funding mechanism. The use of GEF resources to fund convention activities will be in conformity with the policies, program priorities, and eligibility criteria decided by the COPs of each convention.

#### What is the relation between the GEF and the Montreal Protocol?

It is complementary. The Montreal Protocol has its own Multilateral Fund to cover developing country costs in phasing out the production and consumption of ozone-depleting substances (ODS). However, there are a number of GEF-eligible countries that are Parties to the Protocol, where the production or consumption of ODS is too high to qualify for support under the Multilateral Fund. These are mainly countries in Central and Eastern Europe, and the former Soviet Union, whose current consumption of

Your Excellency, President Soares Chairman of the Independent World Commission on the Oceans

Excellency:

As I write to Your Excellency, I look back on the week of December 11-16 as a time that passed like a typhoon in Tokyo.

I believe that the First Session of the IWCO in Tokyo, at which members of the Commission gathered together for the first time and started to make their views known to the world, was a great success. The members were able to deepen their mutual understanding and came to share a common awareness as to what the Commission intended to do. The news of the launching of the IWCO was announced to the world by Kyodo Press and other wire services, and the Japanese media also reported it in many ways.

I was disheartened that representatives of globally influential media organizations, like CNN, failed to come to our press conference: Perhaps this was inevitable, since the Commission had just come into existence, and because all our activities lie ahead of us.

I regret that no communique was issued at all at the end of the conference. I have received a large number of requests for a communique from media people in Japan and abroad. We must take this lesson to heart at the second session to be held in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, and at all future sessions. Even if we gather together distinguished members, unless we release information in a timely manner on what was discussed by them, it will not be really newsworthy.

My impression of our first session in Tokyo is that the time was too short to conduct serious debate among the distinguished participants. However, if we hold longer sessions from the second session onwards, it will make it impossible for the members, who are all very busy people, to participate in all of the programs. One solution to this problem would be to distribute to

members ahead of time materials that have been thought out and prepared carefully, so that they would be able to examine them well in advance. Each member could then state in five minutes or less his or her carefully considered views at the session. For efficient debates, it is essential to prepare and distribute in advance well-thought out discussion papers that are based on international experiences and lessons, including hearings in various regions of the world.

Finally, I have a favor to ask of Your Excellency. you be able to invite Professor Tsutomu Fuse of Yokohama City University to become a member of the Commission? He is a professor specializing in the law of the seas and a central figure in Japan's research on the ocean issues. He has many friends and acquaintances in the field at home and abroad and is very influ-H.E., Noboru Takeshita has great confidence in him. success of the First Session in Tokyo would not have been possible without Professor Fuse's efforts in preparing for the meetings and the support of his students. He is not only an expert on the oceans but he is also very proficient in English. no doubt contribute greatly towards the drafting of Commission reports. As two members each from the United States, Canada, France, Brazil, Algeria, and Malta are present in the Commission, I do not believe it would be a problem, in terms of geographic balance, to have two members from Japan, which is an Asian nation.

I extend my best wishes to Your Excellency for the New Year, which is just around the corner. I should also like to offer my best wishes for the success of the IWCO, which I am sure will expand its activities and produce steady results.

Dear Yoshio,

Sorry to be late in getting back to you. Before answering your latest fax I wanted to see what kind of documents were being produced by our friends in the Secretariat. I know have all the documents, and probably you have received them too.

Now,, first of all, of course I will fervently support an invitation to Tsutomu Fuse to join the Commission. He will be a very useful member, and, as you rightly point out, there is no reason why there should not be two members from Japan, when there are two from several, less important countries.

As to the documents, I am attaching my comments, which you are going to receive also officially from the Secretariat. Layashi Yaker quite agrees with my comments. As a matter of fact, he will call an intersessional meeting of the Executive Committee. It should take place the end of March, in Lisbon --if they can get everything together by that time. The meeting should be back to back with a workshop, to be held in Geneva, for the elaboration of the background paper on economics. I am enclosing my suggestions with regard to this project, which Layashi has adopted completely, and he is following up on it. I hope that several of the EC members --including, above all, yourself, will be able to go from Lisbon to Geneva to attend this workshop. I imagine that the EC meeting need not take more than one day, but I do not yet have the exact dates for the whole plan, and you will get them in a few days from the Secretariat.

It appears that negotiations with the Swiss Government have been successful, and that excellent Secretariat offices have been put at our disposal. Jan van Ettinger is moving to Geneva on February 4.

As you will see in the attached workshop proposal, I would very much like to have a Japanese expert on the economics of ocean mineral and metal production. Can you suggest one?

I think that is all, to bring you up to date. And since it is still January, I am still in time to send you my warmest wishes for 1996.
