Barth, Director of EPA's Environmental Monitoring and Support Laboratory in Las Vegas and General Chairman of the Conference. Mr. Christian A. Herter, Jr., Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Environmental and Population Affairs, will speak at a luncheon on Wednesday.

These speakers and the attending scientists and administrators from 32 nations offer unusual interview opportunities.

A press room will be in operation throughout the Conference for your convenience. Advance copies of technical papers, when available, will be in the press room for use by news media representatives. Press room staff will be ready to assist you in arranging interviews and locating speakers. The registration fee will be waived for representatives of accredited news media who present their credentials at the press room.

Please take time to look through the enclosed program. We hope you will find the International Conference it describes worthy of your attention. And we hope you will decide to come to Las Vegas in September to cover this Conference for your publication.

ENERGY AND THE OCEANS

The world's energy system and the world's ocean system are interconnected in a number of ways. These connections are becoming more intense and more consequential as the "energy crisis" unfolds. Increased population pressure, scarcity (for whatever reasons) of land-based energy resources, and the development of new technologies are pushing energy production and distribution farther and farther into the oceans. The oceans are becoming the primary locus for energy production (oil, gas, nuclear energy); the primary medium for energy distribution (tanker traffic, pipelines); the primary sink for energy waste disposal (oil, thermal waste, radioactivity); and a primary resource for energy generation (tidal, ocean currents, sea-thermal).

It is time for a systematic appraisal of this relationship between ocean and energy.

The International Ocean Institute in Malta has begun by contributing a series of research papers on energy and the oceans to the Center's project on Energy and the International System. This work will be continued.

The legal requirements generated by the ocean/ energy interaction have not yet been explored. The only reference to any need for international law on this subject is to be found in the Maltese Draft for





KONGRESSHAUS

The "Kongresshaus" (Salzburg Convention Hall) is a very modern building, erected in 1957 in the centre of Salzburg, in the middle of the Kurpark. The Salzburg Convention Hall is a member of the International Union of Convention Halls. Convention hall

Position: The Convention Hall enjoys an ideal and quiet position in the Kurpark, opposite the Château Mirabell, between the main line station and the Cathedral. The river Salzach flows about 200 yards away. All the tourist attractions of the town are within 5 or 10 minutes walk.

How to get there: All the main bus routes lead to the Convention hall.

Brief description of the building

Level A: Cellars, records. Room for office equipment, duplicators etc. Artists changing rooms. Air conditioning plant. Bowling alley. Telephone booths. Buffet.

Level B: Entered direct from the Kurpark. "Europa" Room. Various small meeting rooms in the "Europa Mirabell" hotel, with direct access from the "Europa" Room. Large hall (foyer), Post Office, Telegraph Office, teleprinters, telephone booths, Travel Agency, office for money changing. Desks for meeting organisers, for registration and pigeon holes for documentation, cloakrooms. Sick bay. Buffet and restaurant service. Various stalls and shops for the convenience of delegates, e.g. Theatre ticket agency, dressmaker, jeweller, optician, confectioners, souvenir shops, etc.

Level C: Press room with telephone outlets. Control room for lighting and sound equipment. Offices of the "Salzburg City Services for Conventions, Meetings and Exhibitions".

Level D: "Paracelsus" room. "Makart" room. "Mozart" room. Salzburg room. Buffet and restaurant service, cloak-rooms, telephone, simultaneous interpretation booths, exhibition rooms.

Special technical installations

Facilities for delegates at the Convention hall

Telephones:

- a) An internal telephone system, independent of the public system, is installed throughout the building and connects all the various parts.
- b) The system is connected to the public service by the numbers 715 11, 725 31 and 725 91.

- c) There are 11 independent telephone lines which can be put at the disposal of delegates.
- d) A public Post Office installation supplies all telegraph, telephone and postal services, as well as teleprinters, which can be installed if required by the organisers, who decide the times at which this office shall open.
- e) As at d) above, special telegraph, telephone and teleprinter offices are available for the Press.
- f) If required by organisers, a certain number of telephone lines can be connected on each floor.

g) It is possible to install additional telephones and telephone outlets in special booths apart from the booths already set up.

Postal service: A special public post office can be installed on demand. The type and complexity is left to the choice of the organisers.

Public address system: A public address system links all the rooms in use. This system can be used to broadcast urgent messages at all times.

Special technical installations (cont.)

Closed circuit television between the various rooms. All the connections are in place. The system has been used in all the rooms and we are able to guarantee that it can be installed to the satisfaction of convention organisers with a minimum of delay.

Travel bureau: Travel bureau staff is multilingual and is always at the service of organisers and delegates. The travel bureau is able to handle all travel arrangements for the convention, it organizes and executes all excursion programmes, guided tours, etc.

Bank: At the time of each convention a banking office is opened for the convenience of delegates. The organisers can choose the times of opening and closing.

Convention and reception service: A separate information is at the service of convention delegates apart from the travel bureau. Multilingual staff can aid in the preparation of local itineraries and will supply all information.

Exhibition service: Organisers wishing to arrange an exhibition concurrently with their convention can obtain free assistance through this service. It can aid in the resolution of all problems arising in the arrangement and realisation of successful exhibits. The exhibition service can arrange for the services of a specialist team to handle the planning, the design, the mounting and the overall organisational layout for exhibi-

Entertainment service: this service is not only for reserving theatre seats etc., but can organise special activities for delegates such as private concerts, theatre parties, dances, dinners, folklore outings, etc.

Airline ticket office: The Austrian Airlines has an office in the Convention hall. It will supply information on all flights and make bookings and reservations.

Parking: There are two parking areas which can take 500 vehicles. They are in the immediate vicinity of the Convention hall and are reserved for delegates. Parking is free. There are a further 1000 parking places in the area.

Bar and restaurant: There are three independent restaurants, each with bar and buffet, offering a complete range of good food. On level A the buffet restaurant provides good plain food, presented in a typically Salzburg atmosphere. On level B is a luxury restaurant, run by the Europa Mirabell Hotel. On level D is a quick service buffet where prices are very moderate and where delegates in a hurry can obtain meals and refreshments.

Facilities for the organisation of meetings

Rooms: Europa Room for 1000 people; Paracelsus Room for 300 people; Makart Room for 120 people; Mozart Room for 60 people; Salzburg Room for 30 people. In addition there are many smaller rooms suitable for 10-25 people. Free cloakrooms on every floor.

General services: Printing and copying service. Photocopying. Art workshop. Any number of pigeon holes.

Secretarial facilities: Convention offices and various counters can be installed on all floors.

Simultaneous translation equipment: Simultaneous translation can be broadcast on six channels. The installation is permanent and can be used in each room throughout the building. Participants are able to listen in from any part of the Convention hall.

Portable Translation Equipment: This is a secondary system, broadcasting on six channels. It is packed in portable cases and can easily be moved, with a minimum of delay, to any part of Salzburg, throughout Europe or even

Special debating facilities: Special discussion installations to aid the debate of many delegates in large rooms are available. Thus a large number of delegates can join in the discussion without having to leave their seats. These installations possess fully automatic control. Further technical equipment available: All the different types of equipment necessary for a successful convention are on call. This list of equipment is continually extended as the most up-todate facilities are added: Proki writing projectors, sound film projectors, 8, 16, and 35 mm cine projectors, tape recorders, slide projectors, epidiascopes, screens of all sizes, microphones, luminous tubes, hall amplifying equipment, arrow projecting flashlights, etc.

Technical installations

Air conditioning: The whole building is air conditioned.

Power supplies: A large number of points for lighting and power are available on each floor, especially in view of large exhibitions. The lighting of the building is arranged so as to satisfy all the requirements of any convention. In addition, the central lighting and spotlighting bridge can be fitted with any type of special flood or spotlights, suitable for any kind of show or exhibit or convention (mobile spot clusters, coloured spotlights, odine spotlights, footlights, variable lens projectors and clusters of fixed spotlights).

Mains power outlets for special film and TV-shooting operations can be set up (live broadcasts or MAZ video recordings), up to 100 KVA capacity per outlet.

Water supplies on each floor are sufficient for even large exhibitions.

Duplicating: There is a permanent office for duplicating by stencil or photocopying. A designer and decorator is available to organisers, as is a printing service which gives priority to conven-

Other places for Meetings, Conventions and Exhibitions

Salzburg can offer various other places e.g.:

First computer-based edition

for the first time the Yearbook (now in its 14th edition) is produced from computer-held data. The amount of information which has to be processed, cross-checked and indexed has grown considerably since the reference book was first produced 22 years ago. This can only be performed satisfactorily with the aid of a computer, which thus contributes directly to the rapidity with which each edition can be prepared (ensuring up-to-date information), and to the quality of the final result.

The computer-held data is used not only for this Yearbook but also for the production of the supplements to the Yearbook (appearing in the journal International Associations) and for the production of the Annual International Congress Calendar of future international meetings. This integrated system is being developed to produce other publications which constitute detailed extensions to information produced in the Yearbook.

The new approach will considerably enhance the Yearbook's established reputation as the starting point for research on the international system of organizations.

Contents

The Yearbook of International Organizations provides information on all international organizations -

every category including

- official organizations (established by agreement between governments)
- nongovernmental nonprofit organizations (councils, federations, groups, commissions, standing conferences, associations, organizations, etc.)

every field of activity including

science, commerce, social welfare, education, technology, bibliography, press, international relations, economics, politics, finance, trade unions, professional associations, transport, sport, humanities, health, etc.

every geographical area

international is defined broadly to include all geographical and political groupings of African, Asian, American, Caribbean, Pacific, Scandinavian, European (and other) organizations.
