















"Oh, won't you come up to Dalhousie..."

Students

From across Canada, the United States and every corner of the world, students enrol at Dalhousie to live as Haligonians and Maritimers.

Social life at the University is informal and varied. There are more than 100 student societies and clubs on campus.

The Student Union Building is the heart of student activity. It contains a cafeteria, games room, reading and relaxing rooms, and other student-oriented offices.

The university boasts a variety of residences:

Shirreff Hall, for women, accommodates 428 students. Traditional. Full board. Dining hall, library, lounges, study rooms, kitchenettes, laundry and games rooms. Social and sports activities;

Howe Hall, for men, houses 503 students. Traditional. Full board. Two dining halls, study rooms, lounges, laundry rooms, games room, squash court. Social and sports activities;

Ardmore Hall, for 57 women students. Rooms only, but kitchens provided where students may prepare meals;

Graduate Houses: Several near campus. Each accommodates 6 to 11; for graduate students only;

Dalhousie Apartments (Fenwick Place): High-rise apartment building, about a mile from main campus, housing 450 students in 3- and 4-bed units. Full kitchen and laundry facilities;

Married Students Apartments (Peter Green Hall): 112 apartments for married students only. Laundry facilities, library, day-care centre; and

Miscellaneous houses.

A complete guide to student services is available and lists: Health Services, Counselling and Psychological Services, Chaplaincy Services, Awards Office, Registrar, Ombudsman, Careers, Housing, Food Services and Cultural Activities. Student Handbook is published every September.















To Know Dalhousie...

Nova Scotia is a province of environmental contrasts. The wild Atlantic, the sandy beaches, the green valleys and the rugged highlands offer a variety of sports and pleasures.

Halifax, the capital, is the headquarters of government and the hub of Canadian commerce for the Atlantic provinces. A modern, progressive city, it provides many social, cultural and entertainment attractions without the frantic pace of other cities similar in size.

Halifax does not suffer the pollution of heavy industry. Amid its modern monuments to progress, quaint corners of history nestle peacefully; the old blends comfortably with the new.

Like Halifax, Dalhousie has grown in size and stature without becoming urban in its character. The campus rests in the residential south end of this "City of Trees".

The Earl of Dalhousie established the college in 1818. Throughout the University's history a proud tradition of independence and academic freedom has been maintained.

Enriching

The people, programmes and facilities of Dalhousie combine to play an important role in enriching the life of not only the student but the community as well.

The Dalhousie Arts Centre provides excellent entertainment, including theatre, art, classical and popular music.

The School of Dentistry's mobile clinic takes dental care and education to children of the province. Under professional supervision, students operate legal aid services and family medicine clinics. Children with disabilities are helped to develop motor skills by physical education personnel.

Dalhousie's athletic and recreational facilities are shared with the public. Continuing education classes are offered and arrangements have been made for the Computer Centre and the library system to share their resources with the community.
