

#### **DTP Mandate**

- to express itself through contemporary tools.
- to undertake a series of journeys paved with exploration and ending in discoveries that can be articulated.







## A Note from the Director

"If we've survived what we remember, then it's likely we'll survive the present. Memory is a form of hope". (Timothy Findley from Inside **Memory**). I had the good fortune to hear Timothy Findley reading from his own work here in this studio. It was a rewarding evening and it struck me that some of his observations were similar to Christopher Durang's notes on Bette and Boo. Durang says "The play feels autobiographical ... there is a core to the play that is pretty much rooted in my past". Throughout our rehearsals memory came up with predictable regularity. We shared personal memories, all of them important to the individual. They were experiences highlighted by embarrassment, rage, or a touching moment, and all had been altered by the passage of time. As this is a memory play, our personal relationships to memory became the focal point of our exploration. In the play Matt mentions that one of his favourite movies is 81/2. We watched this classic from my youth and I was filled with memories of times and people I knew then. In the film, the producer asks the director, "Why piece together the tatters of your life, ... the faces, the people you never knew how to love?". One reason is that the answer produced The Marriage of Bette and Boo; another, in the words of Tim Findley, is that "memory is survival".

The journey with the students of the Costume Studies, Technical Scenography and Acting programmes has been a rewarding experience. We hope you enjoy the performance.

## **Patrick Christopher**



Patrick Christopher, Director of THE MARRIAGE OF BETTE AND BOO, is now in his 3rd year as head of the Acting Programme. It is his responsibility to coordinate and implement the training of student performers whose aim is to pursue a career in the theatre.

Mr. Christopher is a graduate of the National Theatre School of Canada and has enjoyed 25 years of acting, directing and teaching across the country. He was a member of the highly acclaimed Grand Theatre season in London, Ontario under the direction of Robin Phillips. It was working with this talented director/teacher that led Mr. Christopher to a teaching career. He was a member of the Ryerson Theatre School faculty from 1986 to 1988.

Since his appointment with Dalhousie he has worked professionally with CBC radio (thank you, Sudsy Clark), The Chester Festival, Neptune Theatre School and the Summer Musical Theatre Programme for Henson College. Film work includes JUSTICE DENIED, THE DONALD MARSHALL STORY, and LOVING YOURSELF for the Nova Scotia Hearing Impaired. THE MARRIAGE OF BETTE AND BOO marks his fourth play for Dalhousie Theatre Productions.

There are two types of students served by the theatre department: those committed at the outset of their university studies to pursuing a career in theatre and those who wish to pursue it as a discipline in a liberal arts program. The department strives to serve both groups on the premise that exciting creative work demands an aware and intelligent audience, and, conversely, an aware audience will demand exciting work of the artists they see. This mutual dependence and interchange of all the programs in the department is a large part of what makes work here stimulating.

In the ongoing controversy over censorship and the artist, Christopher Durang holds a central position. Productions of his work have been targeted by extremist groups since the beginning of his career. Recently, in the United States, members of the Roman Catholic Church (which is a recurrent theme in his work) have protested and picketed theatres which perform his plays. Members of our panel will open the colloquium with a discussion about the censorship pressures they experienced when they performed Durang's <u>Sister Mary Ignatius Explains It All For You</u>, and related censorship pressures they continue to feel. Please join us for what should prove to be a provocative and lively discussion of censorship in universities, the arts, and specifically, the works of Christopher Durang.




