Dear Roland:

I was delighted to have your fax on December 18.

Let me answer your question point by point:

Venue of preparatory workshop. I hope you found my AAA letter waiting for you in Hawaii (addressed to your home address). In that letter I explained that additional funds might be available if the workshop were to be held in Japan. This being the case, I would like to leave the decision to you. I see advantages in all three options. It might be interesting for UNU to give some visibility to this project in Japan itself; for us a workshop in Japan might be useful also in view of the preparation of Pacem in Maribus XXI, which will take place in Japan. Malta would have numerous practical advantages for us; Sardinia would be interesting because we should make early contacts with the University of Sassari if UNU is going to establish a marine center there. As I say, I would like to leave the decision to you, but it should be made very quickly.

BBB Composition and programme of the workshop. I will send you a very concrete proposal early in January, taking into account also the recent Reports of the Secretary General of the United Nations on marine affairs and the law of the sea. I am in touch with Maurice Strong and have already a good list of names, but would like to discuss it with a number of my colleagues before finalizing. Also, perhaps you could suggest some names yourself, going through the draft agenda as proposed. I

would be grateful if you could send me such names as soon as possible. I would suggest we commission papers early in January. They ought to be ready in draft form by April 15. The workshop should take place during the second half of April. Papers should be finalized by June 1.

We are delighted to cooperate with you in the output of a high-quality book covering the themes outlined in our proposal. We also have no difficulty in yielding the copy right to you. We would have difficulties, however, in having the volume published by the UNU Press because we have a contract with Pergamon Press for the publication of the Proceedings of this Conference. I see 2 possible solutions: (a) a joint, UNU/IOI publication of the edited proceedings (about 300 pages), to be published by Pergamon; (b) Two separate volumes: the Conference Proceedings, to be published by Pergamon; a more essayistic volume, to be published by the UNU Press.

I think that covers it for today. I am working on the MacArthur Foundation to get support. I am sure they would be quite receptive to a recommendation from you.

Dear Roland:

Good to talk to you.

The list of names you suggest is all excellent. All these people ought to be invited. I am not quite sure whether we can structure all of them into the book, considering the special areas of special competence required for each chapter.

I have put together a first draft of what may become the book, taking as many of your first list of names as I could. I have gone over it with Norton. Some other names on your list might be considered as second choice if the first choice does not come through; e.g., Prescot might be put into the place of Djalal, Wooster into the place of Broadus, etc.; we also might consider putting an Italian into the place of Platzöder, inasmuch as an Italian would belong both to the European and to the Mediterranean Community.

But these are details which will fall into place as we move along.

Basically, this might be a good starting point; and it dovetails with the agenda of the conference.

I am awaiting your reactions from Tokyo.

I hope you had a safe journey back.

Yesterday I received from Ruth Adams a letter of which I am attaching copy. I am happy with it insofar as it is the first concrete positive reaction we have from the Foundation. It is something I feel we can build on.

However, the amount she mentions is quite inadequate. There must be some more money in some other budget there. In fact, we do not belong exclusively into the Environment budget. Our project is far more comprehensive and certainly falls partly into international relations and international organization.

At this point I think it would be extremely useful if you could make a recommendation to the Foundation. The amount we requested was \$250,000, which is half of the budget. It is in their ballpark.

I am also quite willing to work the World Resources Institute into the contents. They do have as strong interest there.

Dear Roland:

I was in Ottawa for talks with CIDA.

Your revised budget is o.k. I can use the UNCED money to pay for my coordinator whom I really need as I cannot possibly do all the detailed work myself.

So please go ahead. Any adjustments, as we go along, will be very minor.

As for Ruth Adams, she needs to be convinced that the project belongs both to Environment and to Peace and International Cooperation. If \$250,000 is too ambitious (I would not have thought so), she should at least match the \$50,000 we can hope to get from Dan Martin. This would give us our basic security for the Conference. I can raise other money on top of that.

I completely agree with you that we must have as many people from developing countries as possible, and that we also must have a Japanese.

As for the latter, we usually have the participation of Professor Fuse of Yokohama University. (He also has the advantage that he comes at his own expense!) But if you have another suggestion, it would be most welcome.

Dear Roland:

Thanks for your call. I feel very encouraged by your initial reaction to the book plan.

I agree with you: Part IV is undernourished. it is not in the background document, but it is in this "illustrative table of contents."

part IV should consist of three chapters, plus Conclusions and Recommendations.

Chapter 16 should deal with the needed internal reforms within the global institutions dealing with the oceans. What should they be like in the 21st century? These needs are indicated in the background paper, but they should be elaborated here in this chapter. Who could do that? Somebody independent, imaginative, and outside the system. Stjepan Keckes? Marc Nerfin? Jacques Richardson? My preference would go to either Keckes or Richardson. The role of the NGO's at the global level should also be considered here.

Chapter 17 should deal with improving the coordination mechanism. This should be the counterpart of the "interministerial mechanisms" at the national level. What exists now clearly is not comprehensive enough. The kind of co-ordination I envisage would enable the Agencies and Institutions to execute autonomously an integrated ocean policy formulated jointly. If Keckes does one chapter, Richardson could do the other. But perhaps you have other names.

Chapter 18, which would be Mario Ruivo's, would develop and elaborate on what he started at the end of UNCLOS III: the concept that there must be a forum where States can discuss ocean affairs in an integrated manner, this being the institutional implication of the Preamble's famous phrase that "the problems of ocean space are closely interrelated and need to be considered as a whole." Layachi Yaker likes the UNCTAD analogy.

And then the conclusions and recommendations.

If we want 20 chapters rather than 19, we might include, before the conclusions, a chapter on an "ocean development tax."

I have some progress to report on Chapter 15: You probably know about the Woods Hole - USSR Academy of Science project on Environmental Security. They want to do a chapter on environmental security in the Arctic. I had a good talk with Jim Broadus who wants to give a report to PIM XIX on this whole project. I urged him to focus on the Arctic Chapter, but to look at it in a comprehensive way: starting from the recognition that environmental security, military security, and economic security are all part of comprehensive common security and looking at the institutional implications of that. Gorbachev, in his Murmansk Address, proposed, for the Arctic (which he did not define) (a) disarmament; (b) cooperation in the conservation of the environment; (c) cooperation in scientific research; (d) cooperation in economic development (offshore petroleum, fisheries, etc.) What would be the institutional implications of that?

I am attaching a revised outline (am sending it also to Norton).

Now as to the budget: I am attaching the revised budget. This was done before our last talk. I would see \$85,000 spent, and that includes UNU's \$75,000 and \$10,000 from UNEP as follows:

Preparation costs
-Workshop & further substantive preparation
. Coordinator,4 months $x \frac{1}{2} x $10,000 = $20,000$. Secretary, 3 months $x \frac{1}{2} x 2,000$ 3,000

. Office needs 1,000

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Last not least, I had an excellent talk with Maurice Strong's office. It appears we can have the meeting at his place — during the last week of April (his Preparatory Meeting might be continued through the third week and therefore the premises would not be available to us). It also seems that our request for a contribution of \$10,000 was well received. Maurice is very much interested in our whole approach to the problem of institutional implications. We are indeed filling a gap that needs to be filled.

That seems to be all for today.

Dear Roland:

On account of the Gulf War, President Soares of Portugal has just postponed the "High Level Meeting" to which Pacem in Maribus is to be joined. President Soares rightly believes that the Heads of State whom he wants to invite would have no ear for matters of ocean governance at this time.

We feel that the linkage to this meeting is important indeed and will contribute much to the quality of our own conference -- as well as to the book, since we intend to include the Declaration that will be adopted by that meeting. We would therefore suggest that Pacem in Maribus be postponed as well -- to September 16-19. We feel this is a case of force majeure that quite justifies the change.

This, however, is a one-time change. Should President Soares change his own dates after that again, we would sever the linkage and hold Pacem in Maribus in any case on September 16-19.

All else, including of course the date for the Geneva Preparatory Workshop, (April 20-23) remains unchanged.

Please let me know right away whether you agree to the change.

Matters with the MacArthur Foundation are going extremely well now.


