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

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

# DSU Cat-astrophe in the Mix for 2006

But one young lady plans to change all that.



# Dalhousie Bans Religion on Campus

Dalhousie's administration plans to ban all religious practices on campus, beginning September 2005. While students will be free to practice religion on their own time and off university property, the administration has decided to completely disassociate itself from religion in all its forms.

"We think the best way to encourage diversity is to prohibit practices that may be offensive to some students," says Dal president Tom Traves. "The walkin prayer clinics at the SUB, the dude who sells stories like 'My Life as a Broom' while preaching about Jesus, even the all-denominations-welcome services at the King's chapel, have to go."

While the decision is undoubtedly controversial, many faculty members have expressed their support. "Drug use and smoking are banned on university property, so why not religion too?" asks Philip Alloy, a Dal chemistry professor. "Just as people should be free from the dangers of secondhand smoke, students should not have to deal with aggressive religious interest groups on campus."

Helen Spondee of the English department agrees. "I think it's control or study cosmolog important for Dal to encourage makes up these crazy rul critical thinking and reasoning glad Dal has finally decide rather than blind faith," she says.

"Dal is a secular institution, after all. If we don't put a check on religious practice on campus, who knows what we can expect in the future? Public stoning? Hands being cut off of the people who steal courtesy umbrellas?"


The religious ban will also include the comparative religion department. "Really, the department is so small I doubt anyone will notice when it's gone," says a (former) comparative religion major. "Still, it's a shame that students won't be able to take courses from this department anymore."

"We've decided that religious education is outside of Dal's jurisdiction," says Traves. "The Atlantic School of Theology is a more appropriate setting for such instruction."

Josiah Lowe, a Dal student and former practicing Catholic, supports the university's decision—despite widespread opposition among other believers. "I agree with what Dal is saying," says Lowe. "Religion has no place in a secular institution."

And his decision to stop practicing Catholicism? "I got tired of all the limitations Catholicism imposes. They say that anyone fourteen years or older isn't allowed to eat meat during Lent, and that it's a sin to use birth control or study cosmology. Who makes up these crazy rules? I'm glad Dal has finally decided to divorce itself from religion."

# DSU... Dictatorship?

New proposal could sideline students' electoral input

The Dalhousie Student Union will no longer have to worry about poor voter turnout if a new proposal is approved by DSU Council: a committee has recommended that council remove students' right to vote altogether.

"Turnout has been decreasing," says DSU President Curtis McGrath, who sat on the Electoral Reform Committee. "So why not take out the middleman? If students don't care about voting, then they won't care about losing their rights."

A DSU councilor, who wishes to remain anonymous, says that this year's election was a wakeup call.

"The students who actually did vote chose unfamiliar faces," she says. "With the new regulations, we could just keep the old DSU clique in power forever."

The Council will vote on the recommendations on April 22, but if ratified, the recommendations wouldn't kick in until 2006—when McGrath plans to return to lead a transitional government, stacked with executive members of his own choosing. "We're hoping the incoming executive will be bad enough that students will feel so guilty, they'll thank us next year for taking away their role in the elections process," he says.

The Electoral Reform Committee studied several models before coming up with their plan. The election systems of Cuba, China and the former Soviet Union were all tabled. Tony Chad, another committee member, says the plan contains a mix

of the three. "A student dictatorship is always going to be different," he says. "But we've been mostly influenced by Cuba, because we know a lot of students go there for spring break."

Interestingly, the committee has the full support of Dal's po-

litical science department. "Voting is so passé," says Paul Chrétien, the president of the Political Science Students' Society. "We ran an SPSS analysis of past DSU voting patterns, and realized that the students didn't always make the most rational choices."

Most students interviewed didn't care about whether they can vote next year or not. "The DSU doesn't do much of anything, do they? If they ban voting, it would be the biggest thing the DSU has done since I've been here," says fifth-year arts student Tauro Anto.

As for McGrath, he thinks Council will vote in favour of the proposal, even though it eliminates the council itself. "They're a bunch of sheep anyway," he says. "They do whatever I say, especially if I threaten them with my bat."

### **Aramark Customers Smell a Rat**

What's worse than finding a fly in your soup? Try a fully-grown rat—exactly what Dalhousie student Al Glover discovered in a soup he purchased from the Killam Library Bistro on April 6.

"It was shocking," Glover says. After paying for his meal, Glover sat down and removed the soup's semi-transparent lid only to find that it didn't look quite right. "There was this lump in the middle," he says, adding that he thought it was a potato, but knew that would have been impossible. "Aramark doesn't put real vegetables in their soups," he says, a statement later confirmed by the company.

As Glover started poking his lunch with a spoon, a small snout appeared and two bulbous little eyes looked up at him. "He was swollen in a bad way, and his fur was stained orange," Glover explains, "but his eyes were clear, and black."

After notifying the Bistro staff that the soup he'd been sold was unfit to eat, Glover brought his discovery to Dalhousie medical professor Marion Webster, so she could to perform an autopsy on "the poor little guy," as Glover calls his deceased lunch companion. "It appears that he did indeed drown," Webster says,

explaining that there was also extensive internal organ damage resulting from the rat's ingestion of large quantities of concentrated soup stock. "There was a lot of trauma and evidence of poisoning," she says.

It is well known that rats and other rodents have been long-term residents of the Killam Library, but the soup incident was a rodent's most blatant attempt yet to share lunch with a student. "Not only have the majority of our Dalhousie outlets passed health inspections once, but twice. That's two years in a row!" he bragged.

Students are somewhat more skeptical. "I have seen employees go from handling raw bacon to preparing bagels," says history student Mary Allans. To date, Glover has planned no legal action against Aramark or the university administration, fearing that it could jeopardize his recently-awarded full scholarship.

# Dal Declares Martial Law on Campus

At a recent press conference, Dalhousie officials announced that martial law will be instituted on campus in time for the fall semester.

Beginning in September 2005, students will be allowed to take the law into their own hands using vigilante justice. For the purposes of setting boundaries, Dal is defining campus as anything in the square bordered by Coburg Rd., Robie St., South St. and Oxford St.

The move comes on the heels of increased complaints of muggings, robberies and harassment on campus.

"It's time we give the students the power to take care of themselves," said Eric McKee, Dal's VP of student services. "Too much shit has been going down and I'm tired of getting phone calls and emails from every kid who loses their iPod."

McKee said a big part of the problem stems from the uselessness of Dal security.

"I can't even tell you what they



# LeMarchant St. resident building own anti-nuclear missile silo

Sternbelly Hogwart From Behind

An unidentified resident living at 6161 LeMarchant St. has decided to ignore the Canadian government's decision to stay out of a U.S.-designed antiballistic missile defence system, opting to build his or her own system instead.

In an anonymous letter delivered to every house on LeMarchant St. in March, the resident wrote that he was "disgusted, stupefied and girlishly annoyed with the actions of Paul Martin and the Liberal government," continuing to state that "the government's decision is unacceptable to me ... and I am losing all of my beautiful golden locks over this." The letter, which outlined the resident's plans to construct his own BMD system in the front yard of his LeMarchant residence, was signed "Mr. Grumpy" and postmarked as originating 6161 LeMarchant St.-an address registered to Dr. Frank Harvey, a Dalhousie political science professor and noted pro-BMD

After receiving several complaints about the letter, Halifax Regional Police went to Harvey's 6161 LeMarchant St. residence to investigate—only to find a near-

completed ballistic missile interceptor sitting on the residence's front lawn. Harvey, who has visited the Balkans and Russia several times, is known around the political science department as having "strong black market ties" and, according to one retiring professor, is in possession "beautiful locks of golden hair," was later spotted by police fiddling with what police call "a big shiny piece of metal."

When approached and confronted by police over the letter, Harvey denied any allegations, shifting what appeared to be a "nuclear-grade screwdriver" into his back pocket.

"Some hoodlums must have put this large, hard-to-obtain missile launching system in my backyard by accident," he told police. "Or maybe it was some pranks."

#### **Nova Scotia Student Goes to**





08:12 hours



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
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# **Travestee turned Travesty**



Once the contest beginstentatively called Travesian Idoldelegates from outside Canada may be expected to pay 16.8 per cent more than the average delegate, and delegates that have the greatest opportunity to go on and do other things because they have immense, marketable talent may be expected to pay 9.28 per cent more than the average delegate.

The protestors are refusing to sing until both their fees are reduced and made more equal across the country.

When Traves and advisors Sass Jordan, Corey Hart, Shania Twain and one of Avril Lavigne's ghost songwriters all met last week, 200 contest delegates stood outside their meeting room in si-

lent protest, clad in the T-shirts of their favourite bands.

"The reason why we wore Tshirts with our favourite bands on them, like Nickleback and Sam Roberts, is because we want to indicate that the most successful bands are successful because they're basically egalitarian societies," said a recent anthropology graduate, who hopes to combine his degree and singing skills in the future.

Outraged by the incident, Traves defended the fees in a spur-of-the-moment written statement, announced via megaphone to the protestors by one of his secretaries:

"The reason why we are charging international delegates more is because of what being from another country adds to the music," she read. "It adds flava. Think of Ricky Martin, or William Hung, or Jennifer Lopez, or someone with a British accent. With flava, the final band would surely be marketable and therefore would make a lot more money than if the band was just five people from Nova Scotia in some Celtic-sounding rig. Therefore, the overcharged delegates will get their money back. They have to think of it as an investment."

In an exclusive one-minuteand-thirty-seconds interview with the Gazette, Traves revealed other reasons for the high fees, saying the reason why delegates who have the greatest opportunity to go and do other things are charged so much is because "their talents will elevate the band, and we don't want them to get too hot-headed, because they will leave. If we give them a lot of debt, it will be more difficult for them to do so."

Traves did not have a lot to say about individuals who do not get a spot in the band. He did indicate, however, that they would be reimbursed with a "fancy" participation certificate and some Travestee memorabilia.

"All delegates are essentially making an investment in a longstanding musical dynasty," Traves said.

"Honestly. Market demand aside, they're basically getting this contest for free."

When this article went to print, the silent protest had not yet put a damper on the progress that Traves and his committee have made in finalizing fee payments from various delegates.

Traves commented that the fees have to be elevated and that the protest will have no effect on him or the competition.

Auditions will be held on April 31 in Traves lush home.

Undergarments have taken a radical turn this season. Coneshaped bras of the 50s have come back full force, so throw away




your seamless push-ups. Your goal is torpedo tits à la mid-90s Madonna: the pointier, the bet-





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# **Tuition Scam**

Women's soccer team to benefit from professional student tuition fee hikes

Beginning next season, each player on the successful Dalhousie women's soccer team will be insured with a \$9 million policy against injury.

"After the team's astounding success, we think that it's in Dalhousie's interest to protect them," said a Dal official who insisted—at knifepoint—that they not be named, but looked suspiciously like university president Tom Traves.

This isn't an uncommon practice. Real Madrid star David Beckham has his legs insured for \$108 million.

But it's the source of the funds that are to pay for the Dal policy that is drawing criticism.

The *Gazette* has learned that the expected 9.8 per cent tuition increase for medicine, law, dentistry and pharmacy programs—estimated to be worth \$11.7 million—will be funneled into a special account to fund the insurance program for the ladies' soccer team.

"This is really great for our

soccer program," says coach Graham Chandler. "If we get an injury we can just buy a new player from a professional European league."

Chandler downplayed the fact that buying players is illegal in university-level sport in Canada.

"Sure it's illegal, but you can do anything when you're rolling in dough—besides, if we need more money, we can always just knock out the knees of a rookie," Chandler said, requesting that the Gazette not print his comments.

The policies, to be taken out with Blue Cross, will cost \$86,180

for each player per year, for a total of about \$3.5 million. An additional \$2.2 million will be put on reserve to fund future policies; saved for "special contributions" to AUS and European officials.

The female athletes themselves told the Gazette they "were, like, really excited," and "were, like, happy that the like Dal people, like, thought that they were like important, and stuff."

Surprisingly, professional degree students seem to be absolutely furious.

"This is right ridiculous," says Dal Medical Student Society president Blowey MacDougal. "Oooh look at me, b'y, I can kick a frikkin' soccer ball... insure me arse!"

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# Men's Swim Team Haemorrhoid Woes

The men's swim team battled more than the competition they faced in the pool this year. A recent report issued by the team's medical staff reveals that the entire group was hampered throughout the season by the acute symptoms caused by haemorrhoids.

As anticipated, the team successfully defended its conference title and reputation as Atlantic Canada's dominant swimming force, overwhelming the competition in nearly all the sprint, medley, distance and relay events at this year's AUS championships.

What was not anticipated was that the majority of the team's members would have to compete with another runner-up: haemorrhoidal discomfort.

"I've never seen anything like it," says Richard Azman, a proctologist who has worked with the Halifax Regional Health authority since 1971. "Haemorrhoids are not contagious, so for all the members of an athletic team to have this problem at once, well, it's simply unheard of."

"The most distressful thing is that we cannot put a finger on the cause," says Mark Spitzer, the current swim team head coach.

He adds that the frustration stemming from his team's ailment reached a climax when they traveled to Edmonton, Alta. during reading week to compete in the CIS Championships.


"We're pleased with our performance at the AUS championships, and most of the guys were close to their PBs [personal best times], but the haemorrhoids probably prevented us from achieving our full potential at the nationals." The team left the Golden Bear campus frustrated, having failed to reach the po-

The cause of haemorrhoids, often referred to as piles, is controversial and the source of much debate in the medical word.

"We believe that piles can be caused by physiological problems, such as excessive strain during bowel and urinary movement, or chronic diarrhoea," says Azman. "However, lifestyle problems such as idleness or sitting for excessively long periods of time are also common habits amongst haemorrhoid sufferers."

Alex Starboard, the team's 200-metre and 400m medley specialist who, after the 2005 CIS championship, sought a surgical solution to the problem, told the Gazette of the frustration with other possible remedies.

"Our inability to find a solution to the problem had bummed

us out since September," admits Starboard, who avoided sitting once throughout the nine-and-a-half-hour interview. "Certainly, when we realized that we all had this problem, we really wanted to find a solution, but we didn't want to give up training time in exchange," he says. "So we co-operated fully with Dr. Azman and gave him the information he needed. Despite finding some treatments that permitted us temporary relief, a proper rem-

edy just doesn't seem to be available."

The general consensus among Dalhousie's varsity community is that this problem is not affecting athletes on other teams. But officials with the women's swim team refused to reveal any medical information regarding the team's athletes—and flatly denied press requests for an interview.

For the men however, the search continues: Azman is convinced that a non-surgical remedy can be found. "I will not quit," he says, "until a get to the bottom of this."

## **Football Returns to Dalhousie**

Announcement will bring gridiron back after 30-year absence

At long last, the game of football is back"—and with that surprising presidential declaration, it was officially confirmed: Dalhousie University president Tom Traves addressed members of the local and national media at his Oxford St. estate, reinstating the football program, which was abandoned after the 1976 season. Athletic director Scott Alexander joined the president in donning the newly unveiled jerseys for a photo opportunity, immediately followed by a passing of the collection plate.

Traves and Alexander were bombarded with questions regarding the source of funding for the squad and responded with their strategy. Tuition will be raised by 10 per cent, they replied-an answer that came as no surprise to media members in the attendance. An annual \$50 "Athletic Renaissance Fee," charged to all students, was also announced and will take effect next fall. The track and field, volleyball and soccer programs will be removed from the university budget, angering several athletes, hydration technicians and apparel supervisors.

The team is set to begin playing in September of 2006, 30 years after the program ended. The extra year of preparation will give the athletics department an opportunity to generate publicity and alienate alumni. Tryouts will

commence several weeks before the season opener on weeknights at Wickwire Field.

In an effort to conserve funds, however, the field's lights will not be used

The program will begin recruitment efforts immediately, sending 14 newly hired scouts to scour schoolyards and buffet lines across the globe. As for the coaching staff, Alexander announced that a search was underway and that a familiar face was the leading candidate. "We have had very serious conversations with Ryan Leaf about the coaching position," said the head of the athletics wing. "He has been looking for an employment opportunity for some time now."

Traves and Alexander agreed that the new squad would en-


dure a development period of several years before it becomes consistently competitive. "It will take time, but this will be an exciting team in the years to come," said Traves.

"Just seeing the black-andgold back on the football field should be enough of a thrill for the alumni and pigskin-starved student body," added Alexander.

Will an intramural-level team draw the attendance necessary to survive? Only time will tell. One thing is for certain: the game of football has returned to Dalhousie. It may not sit well with parents and their credit card limits, but the announcement comes as great news for the community as a whole. Minus all the teams Dal will have to cut, and their supporters, of course.



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
