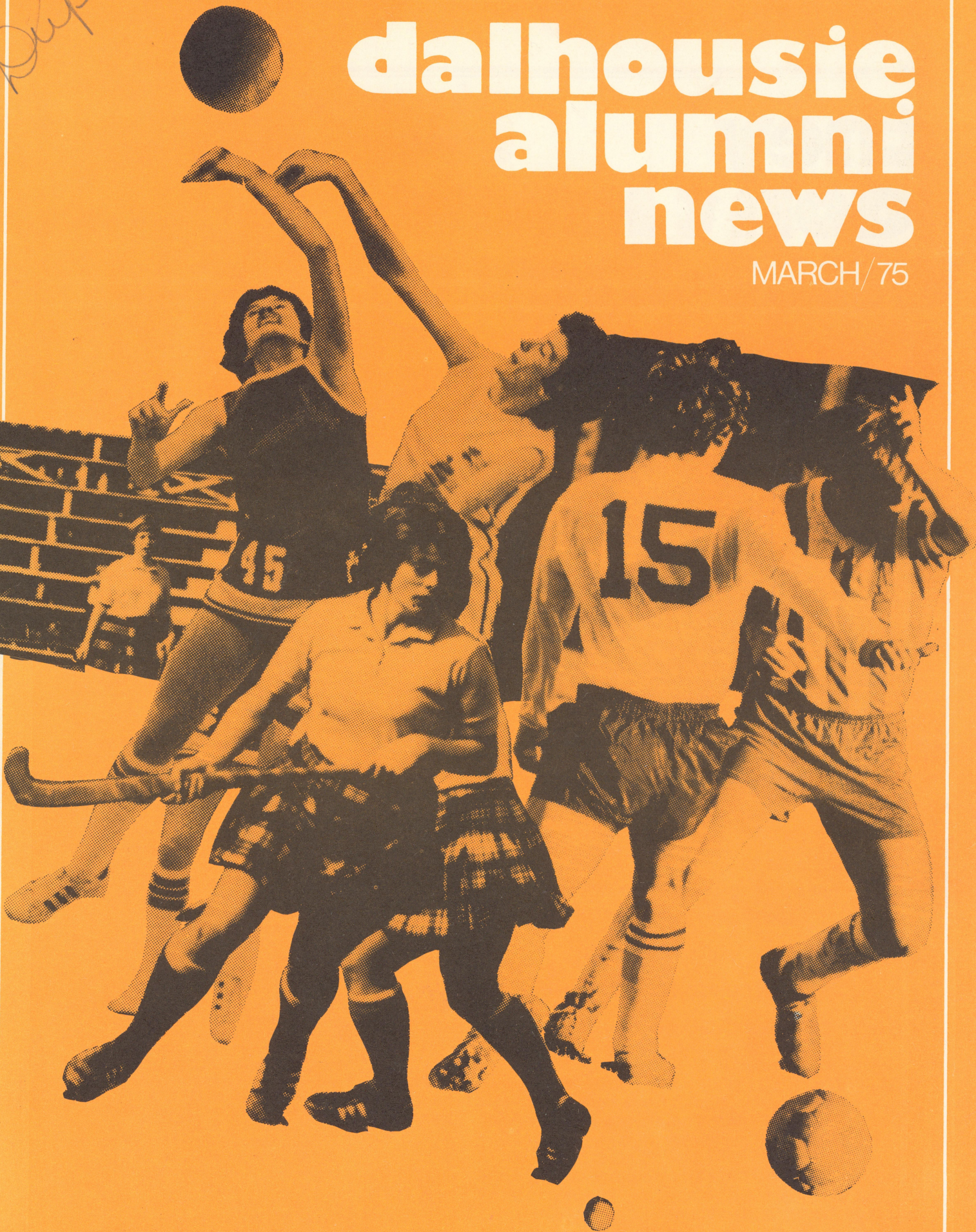

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champions all!

As a student here in recent years, you didn't put the words "Dalhousie" and "sports" together in the same sentence, at least not very loudly.

This year sports on campus has taken an upward turn and it's a pleasant change. I'm not referring to the "Big 3", at least not to two of them. The football Tigers season record of 0-6 speaks for itself; the basketball Tigers, with their record of 4-6 (and two games left to play), have been in the doldrums. The hockey Tigers, however, made some nice plays this year to produce a 12-6 season record and earn a berth in the playoffs. (Ed. note: the playoffs were just beginning as the **News** went to press.)

The big changes came in the areas where, unfortunately, you don't hear too much about them; women's field hockey and basketball, and men's soccer.

In the league season the field hockey Tigerettes went undefeated and racked up 8 wins (two of them on corners) and 22 points to lead the eastern division and take them to the playoffs. Scores for the league games ran 1-0 and 1-1 (won on corners) against Memorial, 4-2 and 1-1 (won on corners) against St. Francis Xavier, 3-1 and 2-0 against Saint Mary's, and 3-0 and 2-0 against Acadia.

In the championship playoffs at Fredericton, the Tigerettes defeated the University of Prince Edward Island (who had finished 2nd in the western division) 1-0, then beat St. Francis (2nd in the eastern division who reached the final by defeating the University of New Brunswick) 1-0 in the championship game. The Tigerettes dominated the play in the final, and while St. F.X. produced some good rushing they never posed a serious threat.

Said coach Nancy Buzzell, "It's only a pity there wasn't a national intercollegiate championship tournament this year — I think we would have turned in a good performance."

The basketball Tigerettes had a "heart-breaker" of a season this year. They finished the regular league schedule with a 10-2 record for the season and 2nd place in the league. The Tigerettes lost both of their season games to the University of New Brunswick and then lost again to UNB, this time by 9 points, for the AWIAA championship. Season play saw

the Tigerettes defeat Saint Mary's 54-40 and 56-43, Mount Allison 80-42, University of Prince Edward Island 59-47 and 81-54, St. Francis Xavier 54-53 and 67-48, and Acadia 45-34 and 46-22.

Dalhousie's soccer Tigers were another sports success story. The Tigers put together their best season record yet by defeating Memorial 3-1, St. Francis Xavier 4-1, Acadia 4-1, and Saint Mary's 5-0; losing to Acadia 3-2 and to St. F.X. 1-0; and tying Memorial 1-1 and SMU 2-2; to come up with a season record of 4-2-2.

In the league championship playoffs, the Tigers downed the University of New Brunswick 2-1 to reach the final with Mount Allison. The Tigers outplayed Mount Allison for most of the game but, out of fear of making a mistake, they were unable to put the finishing touches to their solid defensive and midfield play. In the end a penalty goal gave the Tigers a 1-0 victory and the league championship.

Fresh from their victory over Mt. A., coach Tony Richards and the Tigers headed for the National Intercollegiate Championships in Montreal where they played against teams from Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba and British Columbia. They didn't win but placing 3rd shows they put in a very creditable performance.

Things are looking up indeed!

Offers new degree

Dalhousie will be offering a one-of-a-kind program in Atlantic Canada in September of this year. The program is a four-year course leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science (Health Education) and will be provided through the School of Physical Education in the Faculty of Health Professions.

Early last year, the School of Physical Education was advised that the provincial Minister of Education had approved the recommendation of the Council on Teacher Education that the proposed program would be recognized for specialist certification.

In its proposal to the University Senate and Board of Governors, who have both given formal approval to the program, the Faculty of Health Professions said that in recent years the Nova Scotia department of education had given increased priority to health education in the schools. In 1971, the department launched a two-year junior high school health education pilot project in conjunction with the Nova Scotia department of public health and Dalhousie. This involved the introduction of a new curriculum guide, in-service teacher preparation, and evaluation by teachers and pupils.

The curriculum guide has been officially adopted by the department, and last year provincial regulations for junior high schools identified health education as a distinct area with a specified time allotment. Also last year, the department of education appointed its first full-time consultant for health education.

"There is", said the Faculty, "broad consensus that school health teaching as traditionally carried out in Nova Scotia has not been very successful. Health education classes are rarely taught by people who have specific university preparation for such teaching.

"Concerned officials of the Nova Scotia department of education, local school boards and individual schools are depending on Dalhousie to provide teachers who can rectify this situation.

"Dalhousie's metropolitan location, ongoing teaching in many subjects in which the proposed health education majors would be studying, already established health education minor program, and existing library holdings, place it in an admirable position to begin to meet Nova Scotia's needs for qualified health educators, especially at the junior high level. No similiar program exists in the Atlantic provinces. It is expected that initial classes would consist largely of Nova Scotian students.

"During the past four years of planning, constructive criticism and encouragement have been received from many sources, including the Nova Scotia interdepartmental committee on school health and key persons active in health education locally, nationally, and in the United States."

The Faculty submission added that employment prospects for graduates of the program were excellent.

The four-year course will include classes in the humanities, biology, educational psychology, psychology, anatomy, physiology, microbiology, human relations, school health programs, community health programs, philosophic processes in health education, ecologic concepts and issues, physical growth and development, a number of electives and practice teaching.

Now the bell has sounded to start Round 4; the City of Halifax has appealed the Nova Scotia Supreme Court's decisions to the Supreme Court of Canada. However, no action has yet been taken as the Court has not been in session since the appeal was launched.

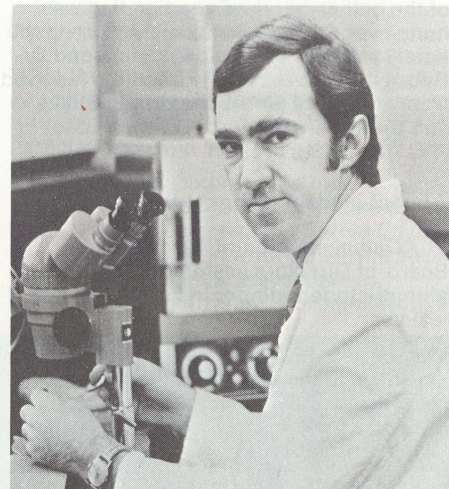

receives APICS award

Dr. Brian K. Hall



Dr. Brian K. Hall, a Dalhousie University biologist, was the winner of the 1974 Young Scientist Award by the Atlantic Provinces Inter-University Committee on the Sciences.

The APICS award, established in 1972 to recognize outstanding research work in the Atlantic region by a scientist under 36, went to Dr. Hall for his work on the development and functions of the skeletons of vertebrates and on how hormones regulate and coordinate embryonic development.

Dr. Hall's work has important implications for medicine and dentistry. He has made advances in knowledge of the mechanisms which determine the differentiation of cartilage or bone from common precursor cells. Such knowledge is valuable in controlling the repair of bone fractures, and in understanding certain types of drug-induced malformations.

He was presented with his award at a dinner held in his honour, in March. ○

of the

DALHOUSIE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

as proposed to

The Annual Meeting, May 12, 1975

1. NAME

1.0 The name of the association, the Dalhousie Alumni Association, is hereinafter referred to as the "Association".

1.1 The office of the Association is in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

2. OBJECT

2.0 The object of the Association is the promotion of the best interests of Dalhousie University.

3. MEMBERSHIP IN THE ASSOCIATION

Members

3.0 A member is

- (1) any person who has received a degree or diploma from Dalhousie University;
- (2) any person who has been registered for one year or more as a full time student at Dalhousie University and is not in regular attendance as a student of the University;
- (3) any honorary graduate of Dalhousie University;
- (4) any person who is a graduate of the Nova Scotia Technical College and who is not already a member of the Association, may elect to become a member of the Association. This clause shall become effective on and not before the effective date of a proposed amalgamation of Dalhousie University and the Nova Scotia Technical College.

3.1 **Active Members**

An active member is

- (1) a Life Member, or
- (2) a member who during the preceding or current calendar year has (a) paid such annual dues as may be fixed from time to time by the Board of Directors; or (b) made a donation to the Association or to Dalhousie University under a program of giving approved by the Board of Directors in lieu of annual dues, or
- (3) a member who is the spouse of an active member.

3.2 **Life Members**

A Life Member is a member who has paid to the Association an amount determined by the Board of Directors as the Life Membership fee. A Life Member shall be exempt from the payment of annual dues.

4. DIVISION AND BRANCHES

4.0 **Women's Division**

The women members of the Association may constitute the Women's Division, and it may select its own Chairman, Secretary-Treasurer and any other officers that it deems necessary.

4.1 **Branches**

- (1) Any ten members of the Association residing in any locality, upon receiving the approval of the Board of Directors, may form a branch, provided that:

- (a) not more than one branch shall be established in any one locality except where the Board deems it desirable to have a separate branch for men and women, for graduates of a professional faculty, or for members with a common interest; and
- (b) the By-Laws of the Branch do not conflict with these By-Laws

- (2) Each Branch shall cooperate with the Association in the advancement of the object of the Association.

4.2 **Affiliated Clubs or Organizations**

Members of the Association with a particular common interest or graduates of any professional faculty of Dalhousie University, with the approval of the Board of Directors, may form a special club or organization in affiliation with the Association, provided that the By-Laws of the club or organization do not conflict with these By-Laws.

5. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

5.0 The Board of Directors of the Association consists of the

- (1) Honorary President;
- (2) twelve representatives elected under Article 8;
- (3) six alumni representatives of the Association of the Board of Governors of Dalhousie University;
- (4) three alumnae representatives of the Association on the Board of Governors of Dalhousie University;
- (5) three directors appointed for a one year term by the Board of Directors;
- (6) representative appointed by each affiliated Alumni club or organization that has been approved by the Board of Directors under Article 4.2;
- (7) two representatives of the Women's Division;
- (8) immediate Past-President;
- (9) President of the Student Union of Dalhousie University;
- (10) Director of Alumni Affairs of Dalhousie University;

6. OFFICERS OF THE ASSOCIATION

6.0 The officers of the Association are the

- (1) Honorary President;
- (2) President;
- (3) Vice-President;
- (4) Secretary;
- (5) Treasurer.

6.1 An Honorary President may be elected at the Annual Meeting of the Association for a term of one year.

6.2 The President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer shall be selected by the Board of Directors from among its members at its first meeting following election of its members.

- 6.3 The officers of the Association hold office until the end of the Annual Meeting next following their installation, or until a successor is elected or appointed, whichever first occurs.
- 6.4 No person may be selected President for two consecutive terms of office.
- 6.5 Executive Committee
The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, two representatives of the Women's Division and the Director of Alumni Affairs, with power to add.
- 6.6 Other Committees
The Board shall appoint the Nominating Committee (see Section 8) plus any other committee as required from time to time.

7. GOVERNORS

- 7.0 The Association shall elect annually two Alumni and one Alumna to be its nominees as its representatives on the Board of Governors of Dalhousie University.
- 7.1 The Association representatives on the Board of Governors shall hold office for a term of three years, but no representative may be elected to more than two consecutive terms of office.

8. ELECTION OF DIRECTORS AND GOVERNORS

8.0 Nominating Committee

Before the fifteenth day of February in each year, the Board of Directors shall appoint from its members, a Nominating Committee consisting of a Chairman and two or more other persons.

8.1 Duties of the Nominating Committee

- (1) From among the Active Members of the Association, the Nominating Committee shall nominate as candidates for election:
 - (a) eight or more Alumni as Directors;
 - (b) four or more Alumnae as Directors;
 - (c) four or more Alumni representatives on the Board of Governors;
 - (d) two or more Alumnae representatives on the Board of Governors;
- (2) The Nominating Committee shall present its report to a meeting of the Board of Directors, prior to the fifteenth day of March of each year.
- (3) The Nominating Committee may be called upon by the Board of Directors to act during the year, as required.

- (4) The Board of Directors may amend any slate as presented by the Nominating Committee.

8.2 Candidates for Election

The following shall be elected annually by the Association:

- (1) six directors to be elected for a two year term;
- (2) two Alumni to be nominees of the Association as its representatives on the Board of Governors of Dalhousie University, to be elected for a three year term;
- (3) one Alumna to be a nominee of the Association as its representative on the Board of Governors of Dalhousie University, to be elected for a three year term.

8.3 Nominations in Writing

The Board of Directors shall place on the ballot as nominees the names of all members who have been nominated in writing by at least ten members of the Association, provided such nominations are received by the Secretary on or before the first day of March.

8.4 Ballots

- (1) The Director of Alumni Affairs shall prepare the ballots with the names of the candidates nominated together with the necessary instructions for voting and the final date for receiving ballots.
- (2) A ballot shall be mailed to each Active Member of the Association not later than three weeks before the date of the Annual Meeting.
- (3) All members who are not Active Members shall be mailed a ballot upon application in writing to the Director of Alumni Affairs, not later than three weeks before the date of the Annual Meeting.
- (4) Completed ballots must be received at the Alumni Office not later than five days before the Annual Meeting.

8.5 Scrutineers

The President of the Association shall appoint two Scrutineers who shall count the ballots and report in writing to the Annual Meeting the names of those who have been elected by receiving the highest number of votes.

8.6 In Case of a Tie

In case of a tie vote, the Scrutineers shall notify the President immediately and the President shall cast the deciding vote and notify the Scrutineers.

9. VACANCIES

9.0 Members of the Board of Directors and Officers

Any vacancy on the Board of Directors and among the

annual meeting

Officers of the Association shall be filled by the Board of Directors for the unexpired term.

9.1 Board of Governors

In the event of a vacancy of any Alumnus of Alumna representative on the Board of Governors, the Board of Directors shall nominate a successor for the unexpired term.

10. MEETINGS

10.0 Annual Meeting

- (1) The Association shall hold an Annual Meeting each year in the City of Halifax at or about the time of the Spring Convocation of Dalhousie University.
- (2) At least three weeks notice of the date and place of the Meeting shall be given by the Director of Alumni Affairs to the members of the Association.

10.1 Special Meetings

- (1) Special Meetings of the Association may be called by the Board of Directors at any time, provided notice of the time, place and purpose of the meeting is mailed to all members by the Secretary seven days prior to the meeting.
- (2) It shall be the duty of the President to call a Special Meeting on receipt of a request to that effect, signed by at least twenty-five members and specifying the purpose for which the meeting is desired. Should the President fail to do so within ten days, the Vice-President shall call the meeting.
- (3) No business shall be transacted at a Special Meeting unless notice thereof has been given.

10.2 Quorum

Twenty-five members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Association.

10.3 Voting

Every Member may vote, and in the case of a tie vote, the Chairman shall cast the deciding vote.

10.4 Meeting of the Board of Directors

- (1) A meeting of the Board of Directors may be called at any time by the President, or in his illness or absence by the Vice-President, provided twenty-four hours notice of the meeting be given.
- (2) It shall be the duty of the President to call a meeting of the Board of Directors on the receipt of a request to that effect, specifying the purpose for which the meeting is desired and signed by at least four members of the Board of Directors. Should the President fail to do so within seven days, the Vice-President shall call the meeting.
- (3) Seven members shall constitute a quorum at a meeting of the Board of Directors.

- (4) In the case of a tie vote the Chairman shall cast the deciding vote.
- (5) The first meeting of the newly elected Board of Directors shall be called by the President and shall be held prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association.

10.5 Absence of the President

- (1) In the absence of the President at any meeting of the Association or the Board of Directors, the Vice-President shall preside.
- (2) In the absence of the President and the Vice-President from any meeting of the Association or the Board of Directors, the members present shall elect a Chairman of the Meeting.

11. AUDITORS

11.0 Appointment of auditors

The association shall appoint Auditors at its Annual Meeting.

11.1 Duties of the Auditors

The Auditors so appointed shall audit the current year's accounts and present a certified statement to the Association at its next Annual Meeting.

12. FISCAL YEAR

- 12.0 The fiscal year of the Association shall end on the thirty-first day of March.

13. EXECUTION OF INSTRUMENTS

- 13.0 The Board of Directors may, by resolution, authorize two or more of the Directors to execute contracts, deeds, bills of exchange, cheques and other instruments and documents on behalf of the Association.

14. OFFICIAL PUBLICATION

- 14.0 The official publication of the Association is the "Dalhousie Alumni News", issued at the direction of the Board of Directors.
- 14.1 The financial control, the editorial management, the publication and the circulation of the "Dalhousie Alumni News" is vested in the Board of Directors.

15. AMENDMENTS

- 15.0 These By-Laws may be amended, repealed or added to by a resolution approved by the majority of those present at an Annual Meeting or Special Meeting of the Association, provided that notice of the proposed amendment has been mailed to each member at least three weeks prior to the holding of the meeting.

Dr. Alexander E. Kerr President, 1945-63

a great talent

A student of the history of education in Nova Scotia cannot help but be impressed by the contribution which the Church has made to the development of academic life.

The highly qualified educators of today inevitably are finding that their work rests on the firm foundations established by churchmen who interpreted as an expression of divine will the provision of the opportunity to learn.

In a Nova Scotia tradition which must be the envy of other provinces and nations, Dr. A. E. Kerr occupies a noteworthy place. His death last Saturday has taken from our midst a Christian gentleman of stature and devotion.

He was first of all a churchman, competent in theology, first in the scriptures - a warm and understanding pastor. His passing leaves the Christian community impoverished.

His citizenship was exemplary. When this nation went to war, he was among those who served. During the years of peace, he gave no less of himself, directing his considerable talents through a variety of organizations.

As an educator, following a teaching assignment at Pine Hill Divinity Hall, he spent 18 years in the presidency of Dalhousie University, a post from which he retired in 1963. Those were crucial and formative years in the history of that institution. The fact that Dalhousie today is a strong and respected centre of learning is attributable, in no small measure, to the vision and administrative ability of Dr. Kerr.

His work has been recognized in many parts of the world and the honours are numerous which have been accorded him.

In the imposing list of clergymen such as Reverend Thomas McCulloch, Father Jean-Mande Sigogne, and Reverend E. A. Crawley, whose ministry helped give the province a superior education facility, the name of Reverend Dr. A. E. Kerr owns an honoured and conspicuous place.

Dr. Alexander E. Kerr, president and vice-chancellor of Dalhousie University from 1945 until 1963, died in Halifax on November 30, 1974, at the age of 76.

A memorial service held in early December at Fort Massey United Church was attended by Lieutenant-Governor C. L. Gosse and Mrs. Gosse; Nova Scotia Chief Justice Ian M. MacKeigan; Archbishop James Hayes; MLA's; Dr. Henry D. Hicks, president of Dalhousie; and Donald McInnes, QC, chairman of the University Board of Governors, in addition to members of the family and friends.

Dr. Kerr was born in Louisbourg, Cape Breton. During the latter part of the First World War, he enlisted in the Royal Air Force and went overseas. After his return, he graduated from Dalhousie in arts, and then from Pine Hill in theology. He was ordained to the Christian ministry in 1921. He subsequently went to Union Seminary, where he received his bachelor of divinity, magna cum laude.

He served the church briefly in Sydney and Montreal, and then accepted pastorates in Vancouver, where he served five years, and in Winnipeg, where he served 10. He left Winnipeg to become principal and professor of systematic theology at Pine Hill. After six years in that office, he was invited in 1945 to become president of Dalhousie.

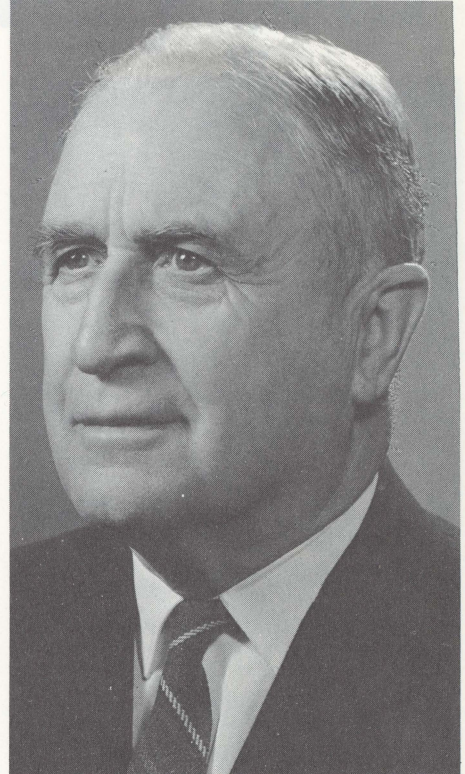
Since his retirement from the University, Dr. Kerr had been president of the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada, and taught the first class in Old Testament at the Atlantic School of Theology. The school was formerly Pine Hill Divinity College from which Dr. Kerr was a graduate.

Also since his retirement, Dr. Kerr was presented an honorary doctorate in divinity at the 500th anniversary of the University of Glasgow, Scotland. He was the only Canadian so honored at the anniversary convocation. He also held honorary degrees from many universities in the Maritimes and from Winnipeg.

He was also a member of the North British Society; first honorary president of the Red Cross Society; a member of the Canadian Mental Health Association; chairman of the building committee for the Abbie J. Lane Memorial Hospital; and honorary president of the Cape Breton Club.

He was nominated by the Maritime Conference of the United Church, by the Montreal-Ottawa Conference, by the

London Conference, and by various other bodies, to become moderator of the general council of the church during his early years at Dalhousie, but declined the nomination.

Dr. Kerr retired from Dalhousie on August 31, 1963, after 18 years as president of the province's largest university, and was appointed to the honorary post of president emeritus.

During his 18 years as president of Dalhousie, the University's full time enrollment climbed to more than 2,500, and was growing steadily at the rate of 10 percent each year. Various new facilities, including the faculty of graduate studies and the faculty of health professions, and the Institute of Oceanography were formed during his term as president. Grants from outside research grew from almost nothing to more than \$600,000 annually, and the total annual expenditures increased from less than \$500,000 in 1945 to more than \$4.5 million in 1963. □

Primrose and A. Wilson received the awards for their colour prints, and Dr. T. J. Murray, Department of Medicine, M. Primrose and A. Wilson

Other than these exceptions, the entries were viewed only to determine whether or not they should be exhibited.

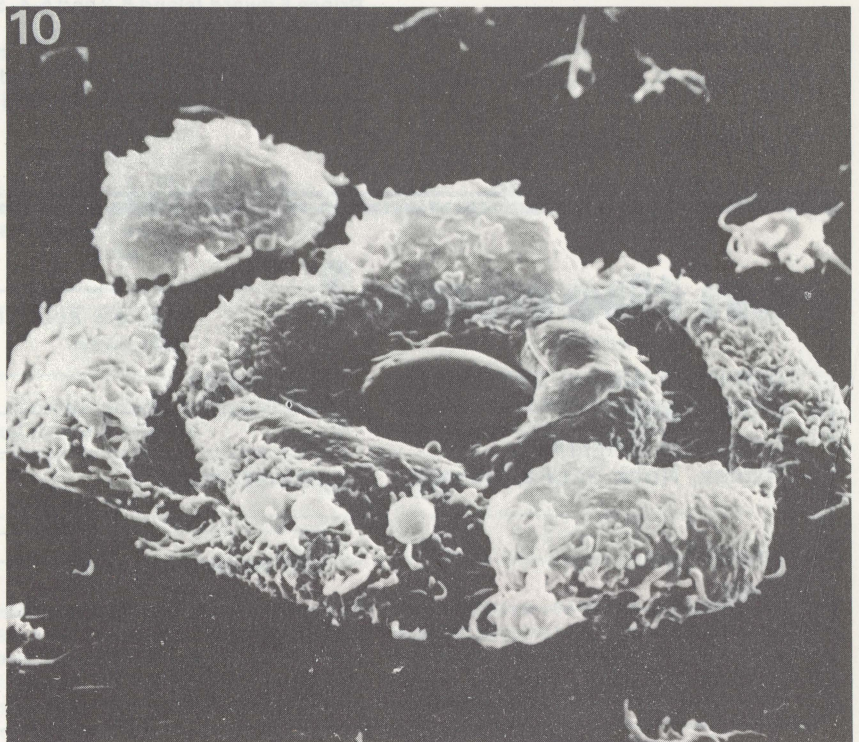
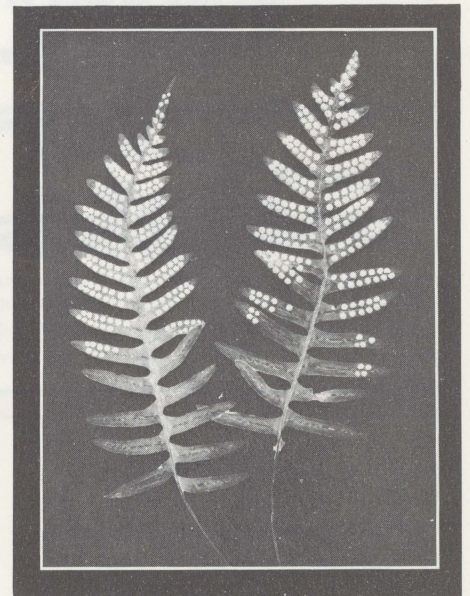
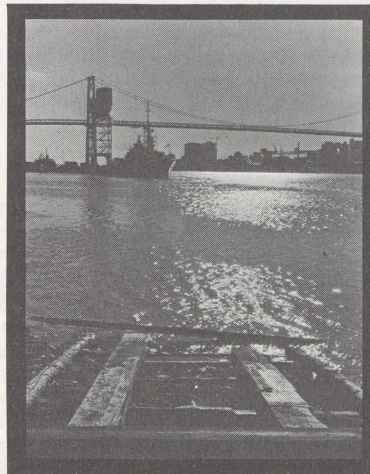

Men's Varsity, as of February 21:
After losing their first three games, the football Tigers continued their losing streak to finish the season with a record of 0 wins and 6 losses. The last three games saw the Tigers lose to St. Francis Xavier 42-0, Mount Allison 43-4, and the University of New Brunswick 34-32.

The basketball Tigers are also in a bit of a slump this year. With two games left to play in the league schedule, the Tigers are sporting a win-loss season record of 4-6. The Tabbies picked up all four of their wins against St. Francis Xavier by downing the X-men 88-76, 81-79, 80-75, and 86-79. The Tigers suffered three losses to Acadia 88-59, 83-60, and 86-68; and three losses to Saint Mary's 92-82, 87-81, and 90-67. Their remaining two games are against SMU and Acadia.

A brighter note is found when you take a look at the season record of hockey Tigers. Not usually known as being a bright spot in varsity sports, this year each coach Pierre Page brought his Tigers through the league schedule with 12 wins and 6 losses and a berth in the AIAA playoffs. Season play saw the Tigers drop two games to Saint Mary's 7-3 and 3-1, two games to Acadia 4-2 and 7-3, and one each to St. Francis Xavier 5-4, and the University of Moncton 5-3. On the plus side of the scoreboard, the Tigers won two games against Memorial 5-0 and 6-5, University of Prince Edward Island 6-2 and 5-4, Saint Thomas University 10-2 and 10-2, University of New Brunswick 5-1 and 5-2, and Mount Allison 4-3 and 3-2; and one game each against St. F.X. 4-0 and U de M 5-2.

The bright spot in the men's varsity sports is found in the ranks of the soccer Tigers, coached by Tony Richards. These Tabbies racked up one win (5-0 against Saint Mary's), one loss (1-0 to St. Francis), and a tie (2-2 with SMU) in their last three games of their schedule to finish the season with 4 wins, 2 losses, and 2 ties. In the championship tournament the Tigers downed the University of New Brunswick 2-1, and Mount Allison 1-0 to take home all the marbles. (See story on page 4.)

Women's Varsity, as of February 21:
The Tigerettes had a good year no matter what they played. The basketball Tigerettes put together a 10-2 win-loss record this season to place second in the league. Their ten wins were against St. Francis Xavier 54-53 and 67-48, Saint Mary's 54-40 and 56-43, Acadia 45-34 and 46-22, University of Prince Edward Island 59-47 and 81-54, and Mount Allison 80-39 and 80-42. Their two losses were to University of New Brunswick 74-57 and 77-63, who also defeated them in the championship final.

The story of the field hockey Tigerettes has a different ending. After winning their first five league games, the Tigerettes continued their winning streak by defeating St. Francis Xavier 1-1 (won on corners), Saint Mary's 2-0, and Acadia 2-0 to finish their game schedule with 8 wins and no losses. In the AWIAA playoffs held in Fredericton, the Tigerettes downed the University of Prince Edward Island 1-0 and St. F.X. 1-0 to bring home the Championship cup. (see story on page 4.)

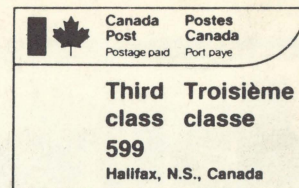
