Dear Dr. Raddall:

My co-author and I were disappointed at your father's response to our request to use "The Wedding Gift" in our book. I am sorry we did not take the time to point out how important his story is to our text. As a multi-cultural reader for English as a second language students, our text has works in original English from around the world. "The Wedding Gift" is our only Canadian piece; it also points out historical and gender role differences in a way that many Canadian stories that might otherwise be suitable do not.

We would respectfully ask that your father consider lowering the permission fee substantially so that students might benefit from reading his story. The fee you cited in your letter of 26 February is half of our total budget for some twenty works, so you will understand that we cannot include the work at that fee.

I hope we can reach a mutually satisfactory agreement.
