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A Note from the Director

From the fertile imagination and real-life experiences of Quebec's most famous playwright comes Carmen, an unusual candidate for Saintedom. Her dream is to be a country and western singer.

In Tremblay's earlier play, FOREVER YOURS, MARIE-LOU, we meet her abusive, alcoholic father and sexually repressed, religiously obsessed mother. When Carmen's parents and young brother are killed in a car crash, she escapes and finds refuge on the Main, a strip of Montreal's boulevard St. Laurent not unlike any sleazy microcosm of any big city. A place where you can buy anything you want. Carmen starts on the bottom rung, but when we meet her she is about to become the Queen of the Main, the penultimate event of her life.

Imagine for a moment that you are in the shoes of one of the citizens of the Main. By doing that, you will have some idea of what these young actors, the DTP Acting Company, have been confronting for the past five weeks. It's a ride through a naked city that doesn't allow for any detours.

The process of creating this production of SAINTE-CARMEN OF THE MAIN has been an exciting challenge, and promises to be a fitting introduction to a season of "Theatre for the Mind".

Some of Mr. Diamond's recent credits include two world premieres for the Canadian Opera Company: DREAMPLAY and THE UNBELIEVEABLE GLORY OF MR. SHARP; the chamber opera TOMORROW AND TOMORROW for CBC TV's SHOWCASE: FIDDLER ON THE ROOF, and GUYS AND DOLLS, as well as numerous other productions during his tenure as Resident Director of Theatre Collingwood; the Toronto premiere of SEX TIPS FOR MODERN GIRLS; and co-direction of a two-night version of THE GREEKS for Equity Showcase Theatre.

For the past five years Mr. Diamond has been on staff in the Theatre Department of York University, teaching both graduate and undergraduate actors, and directing productions of OH WHAT A LOVELY WAR and his own play, UBU UNLEASHED. He has directed Gilbert and Sullivan's THE SORCERER for Edmonton's Grant MacEwan Community College. Other teaching credits include CAST (the Centre for Actors' Study in Toronto), Toronto's George Brown and Seneca Colleges, Theatre Ontario and the Opera School at the University of Toronto.

SAINTE-CARMEN OF THE MAIN marks Mr. Diamond's third visit to Nova Scotia this year. He staged THE GYPSY BARON in concert for Symphony Nova Scotia, and ARIADNE AUF NAXOS for Opera East. Immediately following SAINTE-CARMEN, Mr. Diamond will direct Mavor Moore's THE MAGIC MOZART for the Canadian Opera Company, and AMAHL AND THE NIGHT VISITORS for Ottawa's Opera Lyra.

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

The Dalhousie Theatre Department offers the largest and most comprehensive range of theatre programs in the Maritime region. B.A. programs are available that lead to degrees specializing in acting, technical scenography and theatre studies, and diploma and certificate programs are offered in costume studies. Graduates of the department are successfully pursuing careers in all aspects of the professional theatre, including acting, scenography, costume design and execution, stage management, directing, etc., as well as related fields like teaching, criticism and dramaturgy. The program has established itself nationally, and our graduates work in all the major theatre centres in Canada, as well as the U.S.A. and Britain.

There are two types of students served by the theatre department: those committed at the outset of their university studies to pursuing a career in theatre and those who wish to pursue it as a discipline in a liberal arts program. The department strives to serve both groups on the premise that exciting creative work demands an aware and intelligent audience, and, conversely, an aware audience will demand exciting work of the artists they see. This mutual dependence and interchange of all the programs in the department is a large part of what makes work here stimulating.

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
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
