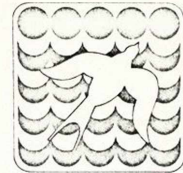

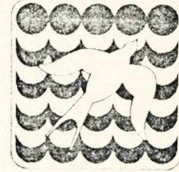

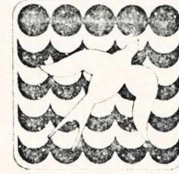
Are you coming to Geneva at all?

No, we have absolutely nothing to do with the Rev. Moon.


I am enclosing some background material on the International Ocean Institute, which will answer some of the questions you have on your mind.

Dear Mrs. Borgese:

Can you please tell me if there is any connection between your efforts and organization, and Rev. Moon, his Unification Church, his International Oceanic Enterprises, Inc. of Norfolk, Virginia, in any financial, political, social or any other connections?

Intl. Oceanic Enterprise's president is Bo Hi Pak. U.S. Master Marine's president is Michael Runyon. Both are high-level Unification Church members. International Oceanic Enterprises through a newly-formed Alabama corporation, the U.S. Master Marine, plan to build a complete seafood facility there. Apparently this means processing, ship building and fishing. It has become a controversial situation in Bayou La Batre where the corporation is operating its facilities.

Unification Church practices have often been deceptive, netting some well-intended and unsuspecting people into dealing with them without knowledge of their true identities.

Rev. Moon has similar ambitions to what I could learn about the Ocean Regime Enterprise, pertaining to a one-world structure. Since this type of totalitarian federalism has little attraction for me, I am anxious to learn more about it. Moon's meanings are both overt and obscured, depending on how much he finds it self-serving to reveal.

I am also concerned about the mounting focus on oceanic political and ideological activities in Washington, DC. I will state plainly that the appointment of Mr. Harlan Cleveland as head of the Weather Modification Board is disturbing, not to me alone. I am acquainted with his THIRD TRY AT WORLD ORDER and its implications for social, economic and political changes.

Page Two -

The changes required by his theories to "get it all together" that Mr. Cleveland calls The Planetary Bargain may sound lulling in the serene atmosphere of the Aspen climate but not at the grassroots level. Since such a proposition must depend on the good will and fairness of the Soviet Union as well as on our own and others,' one needn't theorize on the dim possibility of that cooperation vis-a-vis the current headlines. The USSR has not as yet decided to treat its own citizens with justice and humanity, much less the rest of the world.

It is difficult in the marketplace of ideas these days to know what you may be buying. Therefore, I am approaching you directly with these questions and concerns that may have no relevance to your Center. The Chicago office of the World Federalists provided your name for more information on the Ocean Authority Regime Enterprise.

Perhaps you have some literature that would clarify your meanings for me. The possible connection with you of Rev. Moon may seem far-fetched, but his tentacles reach into some unexpected areas, to surface suddenly. I will be interested to read the forthcoming books now in work on the subject of the Moon empire.

Thanks for any information forthcoming. If you visit Chicago one day, perhaps we can meet. I would look forward to it. Or perhaps the occasion may occur when I visit San Francisco and Los Angeles next September.

Further to my telex there are some further developments in the idea of getting S.334 in Oceanography for I.O.I. Firstly in talking to Dick Troost at UNESCO about it, he suggested that as the course units were only a small proportion of the total costs, that you might consider it advantageous to buy 5 to 10 copies of them.

The detail of £1,800 for the course is broken down as follows:-

UNESCO offers 10% discount on films, 25% on tapes & 35% on books, but these amounts are of one year for administration sounds impossible.

On talking to Fox Vanderbilt she has doubts (a) about 10% being able to afford the cost of the courses at the moment. (b) v. doubtful about buying video tapes now before the manufacturers have standardized. (c) Realizes the problem of importing video equipment into Malta. It can take a long time a cost up to 100% in import duty.

Re the "Open I.O.I" films I will be sending a copy of your proposed outline to Dick Troost. He is involved with the Tropical environments film for UNESCO & would like to co-operate if possible has expressed interest in your programme. I hope it is in order for me to do this.

Meanwhile here in Malta the opening ceremony missed you, though Fox managed extremely well despite having had to type out a summary of Mario Luivio's speech only minutes before the start of the ceremony. It was well attended with representatives of the Czech, USSR, Australian, French, German & UK embassies. It also won TV & radio coverage.

No doubt you'll be receiving more details for 70x later. There are some quite extrovert participants on the course this year so the discussions look as if they will get away to a good start.

Hope your alternative activities to 1.0.1. (was it in Jamaica?) are proving interesting & successful. Please let me know if you'd like me to do anything else about the O.U. course.
