Dear Tom -

As I intimated to you before I left for Ottawa that I would make enquiries regarding a room for you, during your stay in Ottawa sometime this winter - there is a small Hotel the "Bytown Inn", at which a room may be available at the time you would be here. The rates are \$3.00 to \$3.50 per day.

The "Bytown Inn" is an old Hotel. It has small rooms without bath, but it is a nice place and has an excellent dining room, where meals can be secured at relatively low cost. I might say "Tammy" Kirk of Yarmouth stayed at this Hotel during his first Session in Ottawa. If you would interested in this type of accommodation I would be glad to try and secure a reservation for you.

There is also, a register of accommodations kept by the Staff of the House of Commons, which contains the names and addresses of homes who have rooms available for Members and Senators. I note that these rooms are rented for \$40.00 to \$50.00 per month. This register is apparently kept up to date and if you would prefer this kind of accommodation I know that you could find something suitable on your arrival in Ottawa. I would be glad to make more detailed enquiries for you at any time.

The other evening Randolph Lusby, the Member from Cumberland, told me something that may be of interest to you. As you perhaps know, he is a brother of Tom Lusby, with whom you went on a trip down South a year or so ago. The Lusbys had a trip last year, covering some of the same ground as you did and spoke to me particularly

about the kindness and interest shown in them by Fred Hill, who was in charge of the Mariner's Museum at Newport News. I thought you would be interested to know that Hill is now retired and lives at Grand Village, Nova Scotia. If you are in that vicinity sometime you might like to call on him.
