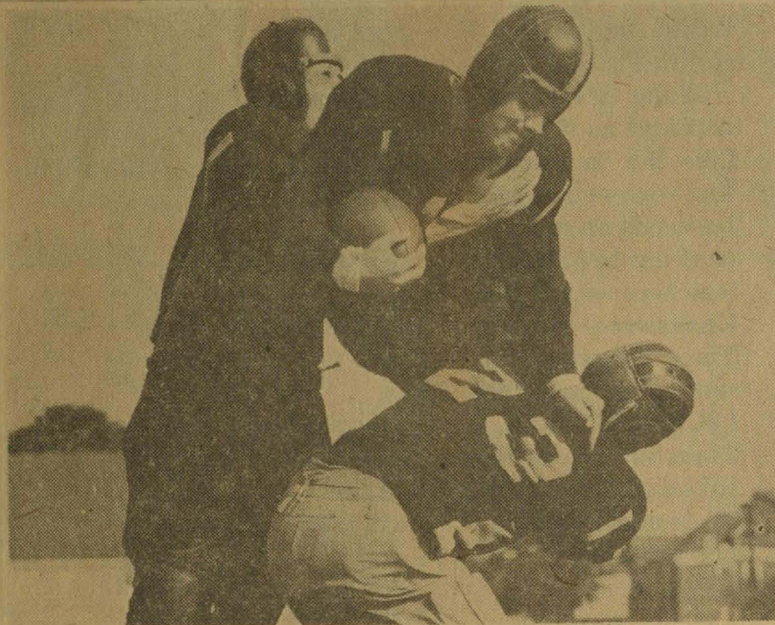


## TWO HOME GAMES THIS WEEKEND

### To Address Students At Convocation

To mark the opening of the academic year, the President will address all members of the University in the Gymnasium, Studley, at 12.15 p.m. on Thursday, October 11.

Members of the Board of Governors and of Faculty will meet at 12 noon in Room 12, Men's Residence, to take their places in the academic procession. Faculty members are expected to wear academic dress.

Students enrolled in the University for the first time will meet in the Common Room, Men's Residence and join the academic procession to the Gymnasium, where seats will be reserved for them. Other students will proceed directly to the Gymnasium.

Members of Faculty are asked to remind their classes and to request a full attendance.

### New Council Member Elected At Meeting

Margaret "Foo" Grant, fourth year Arts student, was elected Freshman representative on the Students' Council at the meeting of that body last Tuesday evening.

The position was vacated when Sherman Zwicker, former president of the Council, who was elected to that position, failed to return to the University. It was filled according to the Council Constitution which requires that a former member of the Council be appointed to such a vacancy.

Foo was a member of the Council last year when she was elected Junior Girl.

### Law Ball to be Held Friday, October 26

The Law Ball will be held this year on October 26. This was decided at a special meeting of the Law Society yesterday morning.

Several dates were announced as possible by the Secretary-Treasurer of the Society, Roger Cyr. After considerable discussion, it was decided to hold the annual function in the Nova Scotia Hotel on this date.

A committee was elected to be in charge of the affair. They are Don Goode, (Third Year), Kevin Griffin, (Second Year), and Sheila Parsons, (First Year).

Ex-Gazette Editor, Charles MacIntosh, was elected as Gazette correspondent for the Society for the year.

### Dalhousie To Meet Stadacona Saturday, Shearwater Monday

Dalhousie Tigers celebrate the Thanksgiving weekend this year with two home games. The new field which first came into use last fall will be the scene of a game against Stadacona on Saturday and against Shearwater on Monday. Blatant predictions have not been forthcoming from either the coach or the team but both have expressed confidence as to their showing in the games.

Pending a further decision, all students will be admitted to the home games for 25c on presentation of their Council cards.

The Studley field was only used for Dalhousie home games twice last year. Both were played on the Thanksgiving week-end then, too. This year with the introduction of a fifth team into the league, it became necessary to use the Dal field more often.

As a result there will be six home games played on the field this year. In addition to that, there will be two outside games played on the field, one between Stadacona and Shearwater, the other between Shearwater and Wanderers.

The gate receipts committee will handle the gate. It is expected that members of the Freshmen class will be assigned to police the stone fence to make sure that no one tries to get in by underhand means.

Both games last year were well attended and there was no gate crashing. It is expected that there will be a large turnout for all the games this year.

There will be a pep rally tomorrow morning.

### To Pay Tribute To Lieut. Joe Levison



Dalhousie students will pay a tribute to an ex-Dalhousian on Saturday. He is Lieutenant Joe Levison, who lost his life in Korea last June, when a land mine exploded under the jeep in which he was driving.

Before the start of the football game, those attending will rise and observe one minute's silence for Joe who had played with the Tigers for several years.

Joe was always a keen Dalhousian. He played with the football team for three years. An active member of the International Students' Service, he was local chairman of that group on the Campus. He was also active with the Dalhousie Gazette as well as with the C.O.T.C., and he was an ex-manager of the hockey squad.

Joe attended Queen Elizabeth High and St. Mary's before coming to Dal. At the end of his last full year at Dal he was awarded a Gold D.

Last year he left Dal to join Canada's special force. He was with the Public Relations office when in Korea.

Last June he and another officer from the Office were driving along in a jeep when a land mine exploded. Both were killed; their British driver escaped with severe injuries.

His death was sorrowful news to all those who knew him. And the one minute's silence at the football game and again at the first Student Forum will be observed respectfully by all students.

### Frosh Enlisted For Policing Duties at Game

Decision to enlist the aid of the freshmen in policing the Dalhousie field at home games in the Canadian Football league was reached by the Students' Council Tuesday. Choosing of 20 students for the duty was left to Graham Muttart, newly elected chairman of the Gate's Receipt Committee.

Due to the difficulty of keeping unpaid spectators from the ends of the gridiron and the south wall which was found in last year's games with a nominal policing force, it was thought this number would be needed at each game. To avoid asking the same freshmen more than necessary it was decided to rotate through their number.

Identification of the group by armbands or other means was left to Graham Muttart, elected chairman of the Gates Receipt Committee by the Students' Council, Tuesday, when Bill Haley resigned from that position due to pressure of studies. The committee now consists of Graham Muttart, Bill Haley and Dave Bryson.

## COURAGE IN VAIN

The Biblical story of David and Goliath has a strange analogy these days, with the football season once more upon us. According to the story David succeeded in slaying Goliath. In this our analogy falls down, or may, as has been proven in past year, for the Lion of Israel is the tiger eleven of Dal; the Goliath, the Halifax Canadian Football League.

Without underestimating the courage and tenacity of our team and hoping not to be branded as defeatist, let us look analytically at the situation. This weekend the grid-iron season opens for Dal. The opposition we will be facing has several games behind them; we have none; they have had weeks of practice, we, a meagre two; they have a source of material for a team far greater than our own. Therefore, the giant is heavily favoured to win.

Is it fair that a team so consistently at a disadvantage should be in a senior league while such conditions exist? Is it fair to expose them to the unjust criticism they will face if they lose? The obvious answer is to erase the conditions or place the team in a league of equal competition.

If imports smack of scholarships another solution lies in more earnest support by the Faculty to facilitate creation of a strong team from within. The passivity of certain parts of the campus has been notorious for several years.

Whatever the final answer the adage of fighting fire with fire holds. A greater concentration should be made on our football aspirations if only for the reason of fairness to the team and the preservation of Dalhousie's name.

## D.G.D.S. Announces Plans For Forthcoming Year

With Initiation Week fading to its close and campus activities beginning to take on a more permanent air and to "get underway" according to the year's scheduled pattern, the Dalhousie Glee and Dramatic Society, under the presidency of Hugh Vincent, has issued its list of proposed undertakings for the coming year.

In early November Dalhousie's contribution to the Inter-University Drama Festival, "God Caesar" by Marjorie Price, will be presented, and toward the middle of the same month we will be given an opportunity to view Walter Hackett's brilliant three-act comedy "Captain Applejack". Rehearsals for both plays will begin almost immediately. First on the after-Christmas line-up is the Goldsmith comedy "She Stops to Conquer", which, because of its unusually large cast, will provide ample opportunity for all desiring to participate in Glee Club dramatic activities. Toward late winter the Gilbert and Sullivan satirical musical comedy "Tolanthe" will be presented, and in March, as the final 1951-52 offering,—the famed Connolly Shield competitions in which the various campus organizations yearly participate. (Awards are offered, too, for individual performances.)

All three plays will be under the direction of H. Leslie Pigot, who has most successfully produced so very many top-notch performances for Dalhousie audiences to date.

Canada's leading authority concerning the compositions of Gilbert and Sullivan, Prof. Harold Hamer, F.R.C.O., will direct the

musical comedy "Tolanthe". During the past twenty years, Professor Hamer has directed productions of almost every opera in the repertory. Chorus and solo work will begin immediately. Students who are able to play musical instruments are requested to observe notice boards and Gazette

notice lists for news of first rehearsals. The Glee Club has been fortunate this term in securing the services of Mr. Roy Smith for direction of the Dalhousie band. Mr. Smith, because of his very wide and varied musical ability and musical experience, will prove indeed an invaluable asset to the society. 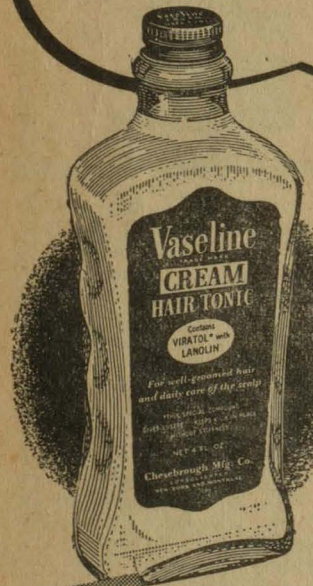
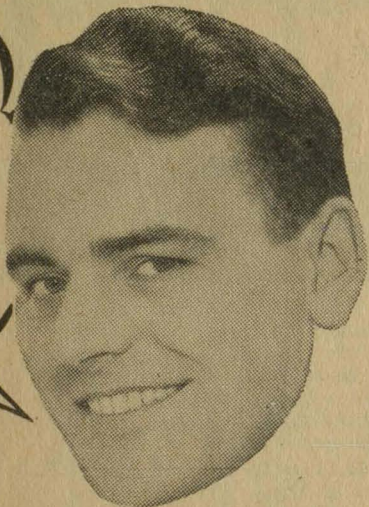

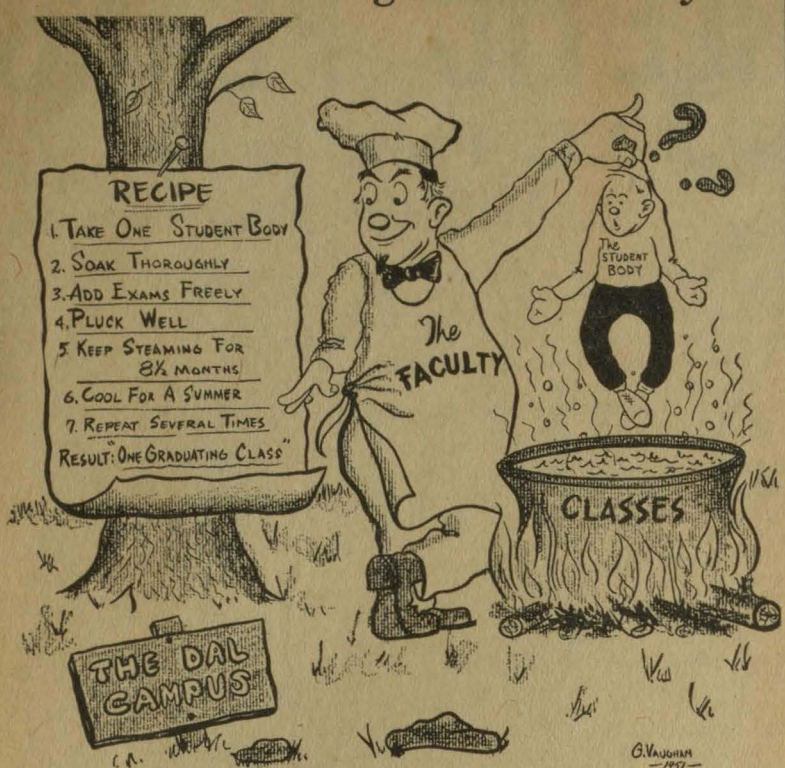

**Exchange Scholarships Feature Of NFCUS Activities**

The National Federation of Canadian University Students in its September conference once again has established exchange scholarship opportunities for Canadian University students.

The scholarship allows for a qualified student to transfer from his University to another college for one year, providing that he returns to his original college for his senior year. His course must be approved by the Faculty concerned in both his college of origin and the college of choice. The tuition and fees, payable by the student, will be those existing at that University he is registered in at the time, regardless of tuition variations between the separate colleges.

It is the intention of the plan to facilitate the students' opportunities of studying under specialists in their chosen field and to broaden their knowledge of Canada's Universities and the nation as a whole.

The mechanism is initiated by the local office of each University member supplying the Ottawa central committee with their respective calendars. Ottawa then redistributes the calendars so that each local committee has on file a calendar of the entire fifteen University members. Applicants should apply through their local committee utilizing these calen-

dars and the scholarship forms available there. The applicant should be in his sophomore year. The application is to be signed by the Registrar of his University, the Dean of his faculty and the President of the Student Council. It is then remitted to the University he wishes to attend for the corresponding signatures where same is lodged with the local NFCUS committee there.

**Dr. D. H. Barnbrook Joins Med Faculty**

Dr. D. H. Barnbrook and his Austrian wife came to Halifax in mid-August, when he was appointed to the Medical School as Associate Professor of Anatomy. The Barnbrook's first reaction to Halifax was surprise at the non-industrial appearance. "It had a very definite university atmosphere."

Dr. Barnbrook was born at West Bromwich in the English mid-lands, and completed his grammar and high school training there. He then went to Birmingham to take his M.B.Ch.B. and on to London for his M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P. and F.R.C.S. Before coming to Dalhousie he practiced surgery for seven years in England.

**NFCUS Conference Raises Issues of National Interest**

The annual conference of the National Federation of Canadian University Students was held at London, Ont., this fall. Eric Kinsman and Ron Robertson attended on behalf of Dalhousie.

Jean de Margerie of Laval was elected President for the coming year, the rest of the executive being Geoff Turner, U. B. C., Catherine Swift, McMaster, Don Lawrence, Bishops and Bill Haute, Acadia.

The perennial question of relations with the Communist dominated International Union of Students arose. Denis Lazure of Montreal attended the conference at Warsaw as an unofficial observer for N.F.C.U.S. and reported that the I.U.S. wished to have a re-approachment with the West. The conference was highly sceptical of the whole affair, but agreed that a delegate be sent to a conference next year for one last attempt. U.S.N.S.A. is going to attend this conference as well as other Western Unions of Students and if this fails a Western International Union will be formed. Dalhousie moved that the delegate be sent only if it would not cost N.F.C.U.S. anything. This was accepted.

N.F.C.U.S. made one great stride forward with the appointment of a permanent General-Secretary, Yves Pylon, to be stationed at Ottawa. At the National Office, which will co-ordinate the Federations activities, a travel agency is to be set up which will help university students obtain cheap transportation to Europe. The British Union of Students, which was represented at the conference, offered to co-operate.

The question of summer seminar was re-examined. After two years of failure trying to organize one, it was decided to prepare a very careful and well-planned brief on the seminar project and study all the problems thoroughly during this coming year. Then it will be possible to start working immediately on the finances for a seminar at the end of the second year. Trying to do too much in too little time seems to have been the fault in the past.

A report was made on the inter-regional scholarship plan and it was found to be working satisfactorily in most cases. The western universities are making considerable use of it, but the Maritime ones do not seem to be taking full advantage of it. However, a Toronto student is planning to come to Dalhousie on it and a Dalhousie student has gone to McGill under it this year.

The conference was pleased to note that most of the briefs pre-

resented to the Massey Commission by the Dalhousie committee on behalf of NFCUS was adopted into the final report of the commission.

The investigation into text-book prices across Canada is to be carried on in order that local committees will be able to find out if prices on their campi are unreasonably high. One of the federation's offspring, the Canadian University Debating Association, was found to be suffering from growing pains. After a prolonged discussion, a new financial setup was agreed upon. Dalhousie was given a mandate to revise the CUDA constitution.

The report was also made on the possibility of Canadian-American exchange scholarships. United States National Students' Association was represented at the conference and reported that a scheme was not feasible at the moment. However, the New York region of USNSA, which was represented as the conference as well, and the Ontario region of NFCUS are going to experiment with a type of exchange in order to see if some scheme can be worked out for the whole of Canada.

An investigation is going to be made into the possibility of obtaining federal government income tax exemption for tuition fees of students. An examination is to be made of the possibility

Last spring in a disagreement over basic ruling policy Dalhousie removed themselves from the Maritime Intercollegiate Athletic Union. Consequently, this year Dal will handle its own athletic programme under the direction of the D.A.A.C. Every student who is a member of the Students' Council is eligible for varsity competition. This means an increase of four to five hundred students as potential participants in athletics who otherwise would be declared ineligible under M.I.A.U. ruling.

Under the league rules only 24 players will be dressed and as the team takes the field Saturday in their new gold and black uniforms there will be a few new fellows in the ranks playing their first varsity game. The starting lineup will pivot on the old veteran Pete Mingo at centre with Guy MacLean assisting in this position and a heavy line composed of almost all last year's varsity. Bud Gregory, Don Goode, Bill MacCreedy, and Spence Stewart will hold the guard slots, with the tackle spots going to varsity linemen Bob Ingles, Husty MacLean and two newcomers Tom Kennedy and Al Jakeman. Three ends, freshman Chuck Johnson, Marcel Plourde and Jim MacEwan will receive the servings of versatile Andy McKay and starry Mike McCulloch, who will operate the team from the drivers seat at quarter back. The half backs, all varsity players of last year will include Dave Bryson, Don Harrison, Scott Henderson and Ed Kinley, with the flying wing position aptly controlled by Reg Cluny and John Nichols. The fullback slot will be run by Fraser Mooney, a refugee from English Rugby and Dave Jannigan, both capable performers.

Co-operation and team work will bring success to this team. Let the students themselves show co-operation by backing the team at its first and every game. Let us have that 'guts' spirit.

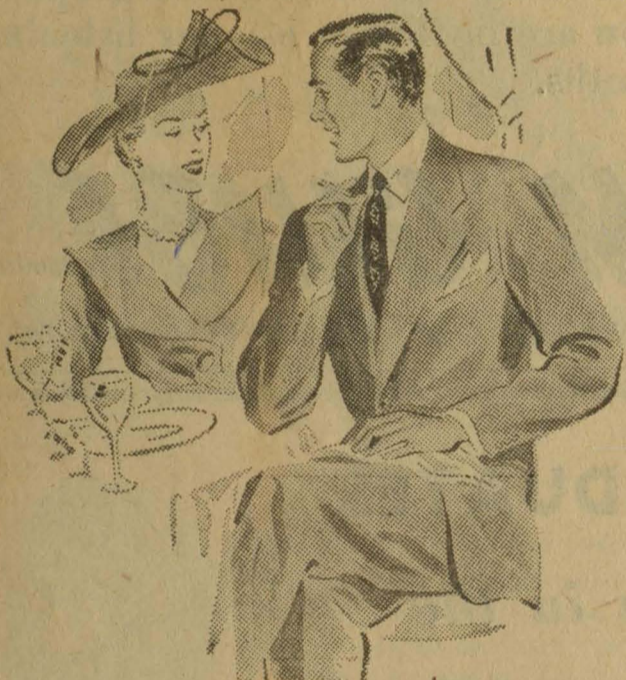
