Inequality of wealth and opportunity, malnutrition, spiritual slavery are only a few of the more glaring social evils under which the bulk of humanity suffers at the present time. To many this seems natural and right. Others will reply that the progress of science will in due time make all things well. Only when these fatalists and reactionaries realize that there has been little real progress since Adam can the forces be set moving which will remedy many abuses of the status quo. By "real" progress is meant spiritual as opposed to material progress. Awaits the visitation of a new day. When material progress becomes subservient to spiritual ends At Thy approach all trees and forthen, and then only, will evolve a society which will enable man to attain the full stature of his species.
