THE SUICIDE, by Nicolai Erdman

Stalin's Russia: Semyon can't find a job and suicide seems as logical a solution to his problem as any other. But word gets out, the community wants input, and before he knows what happens his life is out of his hands...banned by Stalin in 1930, this provocative farce takes a swipe at all bureaucratic pretension: no one escapes!

THE ART OF SUCCESS, by Nick Dear

A dark, satirical portrait of William Hogarth's England, and of the great artist himself, which contains disturbing tones of our own world. Through poverty, corruption of all kinds, censorship and coercion, Hogarth struggles to be a businesslike artist without losing his integrity. On the leading edge of the new wave of British playwrights, Nick Dear has received international acclaim for this fantastical collision of artistic, sexual and political bodies.

RUNAWAYS, by Elizabeth Swados

Kids who run away from home often become invisible and voiceless, caught in a crippling cycle of emotional ecomomic poverty. This musical, written by Swados in collaboration with homeless kids, gives their perspective on the city, and gives them a voice which is surprisingly wise about tragedy.

A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM, by William Shakespeare

Courtship, that strange and palpitating ritual which occurs among faeries and mortals alike, often meets with impediments, but none so strange as those devised by William Shakespeare in his most popular and delightful comedy.

THE LOVE OF THE NIGHTINGALE, by Timberlake Wertenbaker Love has many faces which, sometimes incredibly, share the same name. Two sisters of ancient Greece are separated when the elder is placed in a political marriage a great distance away. Her husband is afflicted by Venus with a terrible obsessive love, and the sisters' bond is threatened by an ideological hostility more permanent than marriage, distance, or death itself. Timberlake Wertenbaker is the highly acclaimed author of OUR COUNTRY'S GOOD.

RED NOSES, BLACK PLAGUE, by Peter Barnes

How would you react in the face of imminent death? In an all too familiar parable about a chaotic medieval world devastated by epidemic, Barnes suggests that laughter is the only remaining act of individual freedom. A rich, intelligent play that forces us to re-evaluate our own prejudices and yet never ceases to entertain.
