To the Class of 1966:

It is my pleasure to greet the Class of 1966, thanks to the invitation of the Editor of Pharos.

Last year I felt obliged to apologize for the crowding on the campus which all of you have put up with so patiently throughout your years at Dalhousie. Now, although the situation is no better, if not worse, we are beginning to see signs of some alleviation of our difficulties as the new Law and Medical buildings rise along University Avenue. You will be interested to know that plans are on the drawing boards for a Student Union building and for residence extensions for both men and women. Also, committees are doing the preliminary work for a number of academic structures to house a new library, and classroom and laboratories for the physical and social sciences and the humanities.

But this is not much comfort to you who are departing except that you will be able to tell of the hardships of your days at Dalhousie to the following generations!

I am sorry that the size of Dalhousie's population now makes it impossible for the President to meet personally more than a representative group of you. But I want to say that I am greatly impressed with the abilities and attitudes of those young men and women with whom I have had the privilege of working in the past three years I have been in this office.

As a consequence, because of this knowledge, I am not nearly as worried as are some about the future of our country and indeed of the world.

Good-bye for now. Please come back and pay us a visit some day. We will be glad to see you.

When the history of any great institution is recorded, its pages are filled with the stories of many great men whose contribution shaped its destiny. One man, the recently inaugurated President, Dr. Henry D. Hicks, whose life span parallels the entire resurrection of this institution has left an indelible mark in its annals.

Born in Bridgetown, N.S., March 5, 1915, Dr. Hicks later attended Mount Allison University until 1936 where he graduated with a B.A., first class honours in Chemistry. In 1937, he graduated from Dalhousie University with a B.Sc. He then attended Oxford University, where in 1939 he received a B.A. (Jurisprudence) and in the following year received a B.C.L. He was admitted to the Nova Scotia Bar Association in 1941.








His time as a practicing lawyer was interrupted by the Second World War when he served in the Royal Canadian Artillery as a Captain, Technical Staff Officer, Radar, in the European Campaign. He commenced his practice of law in Bridgetown on being discharged from the R.C.A. in 1946.

During Dr. Hicks student career he distinguished himself particularly in Track at Mount Allison and in rowing at Oxford University where he was the war time president of the Oxford University Boat Club.



In the fall of 1960, Dr. Hicks was appointed Dean of Arts and Science at Dalhousie University. In the following year he was appointed Vice President. 1963 was the beginning of a new era for Dalhousie University with the inauguration of Dr. Hicks as President of this institution.

Progress is the order of the day. His devoted energies have been successfully channeled; consequently Dalhousie has surged forward both in the world of academic and physical expansion. Surely this leader of the university community will continue to further the student's ambitions for a progressive and challenging future at Dalhousie.

The crowning of pretty Miss Betty MacLeod as Freshette Queen brought the week to a perfect end.



Treasure Van with curios from all over the world opened on October 25. Students from overseas were present in National costumes and a varied programme of dances and songs kept customers entertained.



Engineering students are a com-mon sight in the Autumn as they survey the campus. For those who do not think they are busy enough already, the Student Placement Office is willing to offer their services.



The elections in general were dull with only 47.9% of the students voting. Young and Crawford secured the top posts with stunning scores.

French Canada Week



Speaker Claude Ryan

French Canada Week got underway February 21 in the Dalhousie Men's Residence Library with an exposition of French Canadian art and literature. The opening address was delivered by Gilles Lamontague, Mayor of Quebec City.

Following his address, Mr. Andre Laberge, Secretary General of Laval University, spoke briefly.

Professor Michael Brunet, professor at the University of Montreal and author of several books was the second speaker of the French Canada week program.

Claude Ryan, editor of Quebec's newspaper, LeDevoir, told an overflowing audience that the Canada of the future will be a Republic with a Parliamentary system "closer" to the American Congressional form.

Ryan, a recognized moderate, of the "Quiet Revolution" in Quebec, spent most of his time outlining a formula that would make confederation a working agreement.

Pierre LaPorte came to Dalhousie bearing the image of the New Quebec. Urbane and convincing he preached the doctrine of special status for Quebec.


The enthusiasm and hard work of this year's executive led to a striking increase in participation and made possible a broadening of the range of D.G.A.C. activities.

Although the team did lose five games, some extremely close, the Dalhousian pride in it was the main sportingnote to evolve from this athletic year.






WOMEN'S VARSITY VOLLEYBALL TEAM


MARITIME INTER-COLLEGIATE CHAMPIONS






Basketball

Men's Residences




This year we had Sadie Hawkins week in Oct. and it was a great success with the slave auction and the Sadie Hawkins Dance as the highlights.

Before S.H. week we had a debate versus a team of boys on 'Resolved it is a man's world' (We lost).


We had a coffee party in January at the Hall at which about 200 girls who had never been inside its hallowed walls, got a chance to see where the Hall girls hide.


Canadian Officers' Training Corp

ARSOC's cultural activities included the sponsoring of poetry reading on the steps of the Arts and Administration building.



The latest figures of undergraduate enrolment in Commerce among the Atlantic Region universities show Dalhousie having the largest enrolment and the greatest percentage of increase. The increase in enrolment has been quite notable being thirty-one percent as contrasted with an increase of ten percent in the case of two other universities, a decrease of nine percent, of five percent, and of one percent respectively for the other universities.

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In addition to its day programme of courses leading to a degree, the Department operates an evening lecture programme for young men who are working and who are anxious to obtain a diploma of a professional association. Courses are offered in Accounting, Auditing, Commercial and Industrial Legislation, Economics, and Banking. The number of students enrolled in these courses totals 390.

Up to ten years ago, there were no scholarships specifically designated for Commerce students. Since that time, business firms and private persons have established twelve scholarships and prizes for award to Commerce students in various years of their course. Apart from the financial help they provide, the scholarships are eagerly sought because of the prestige attached to them by prospective employers.

Events for the year ended with the Annual Banquet and the presentation of the departmental prizes and Society "E" awards, in recognition of outstanding achievement.








The second exchange weekend with U.N.B. law students was held again in January at Fredericton. This affair proved to be even more successful than last year.





The Pharmacy Society was active in various inter-faculty sports and activities and held spirited general meetings throughout the year.


