CKDU-FM launches its second annual public funding drive; it will run from Feb. 27 to March 8. This year's goal of \$20,000 is twice that of last year. This funding will improve the station's service to the community.

CKDU-FM, broadcasting on 97.5 to the Halifax-Dartmouth area, is a non-profit community organization operated by 10 part- and full-time staff and more than 100 volunteers.

Funding comes from three main sources: students from Dalhousie, government funding, and sponsorships. "The money obtained from the fundraising drive amounts to about 15 per cent of the total funding for the station," said Mark MacLeod, station manager.

Active community support is the key element of this overthe-air funding drive. Listeners will be asked to dial and donate by calling 424-8812 during the 10-day drive. PUBLIE

FUNDING

CKDU-FM relies on the direct support of its listeners. "We call upon our audience, who benefit from our unique programming, to match the volunteer effort here at CKDU-FM, by financially supporting the station," said MacLeod.

Last year's successful campaign raised \$15,115, which was 50 per cent higher than their \$10,000 goal. CKDU-FM became more financially secure and according to MacLeod, "Listenership is up and programming has improved."


MacLeod approaches this year's drive with enthusiasm. "As the station grows, it will be able to better serve the community. Another successful funding drive will allow us to provide regular program guide and we'll push for our main goal — to increase broadcast power."

CKDU-FM creates a unique blend of music and public affairs programmes. "Our listeners tell us they really enjoy what we are doing. Their encouragement and financial support make all our efforts seem worthwhile," said MacLeod.

"Through generous contributions from our community, CKDU-FM will continue to provide the diverse programming that has established us as a popular alternative to commercial and public radio in Halifax-Dartmouth," he said.
