night

- They stayed all night - rain & winds - 65 to 70.

Boats' hull plans were damaged.

Giles DUMAS turned up next day in the Cessna & flew the worst damaged plane home. Listing hard in a leaking float can't weather a storm like that without damage.

The prop was nearly hitting the water.

Back in Fort Brina, the Sunday was calm, clear & blue.

They landed the planes first on the lake,

(Gordon rang then) and at high tide took them to the river. They worked until

AND

REPAIR

midnight & when the tide came up this morning they flew them back to the lake.

All sloppy wet work. I was flying in hip boots - full of water squelch on this pedal & squelch on that.

Helped Gordon to polish off some liquor & I cooked a stew. The cook is away & the 3 pilots have eaten little except sandwiches in the past 3 days.

We found a roll of minced beef in the community freezer threw in old onions, spuds & turnip, kind heart & key fish. The 3 of them ate well Giles, Michel & Gordon. The 2 G's fell asleep after dinner leaving me with the controls of the cockpit Michel Boss, who fancies himself & is obliged to pay unnecessary compliments

# THEY'RE COMING.

I left an artificial flower on Gordon's chest & left him snoring.

Joanna was out - I figured she was out to meet George - with the baby.

Suddenly, I missed Gae's binoculars. As I was preparing to dash off to John Berthe's to find them, hook came

running in - They're coming. They're coming. I looked out into the night

The wind had dropped & a joyful procession of Eskimos came creeping in the moonlight, over the waves of blown sand carrying their trophies wild Canada Geese, rifles, high rubber boots. Happy & smiling gloriously glad to be home.

## MY FATHER'S NAME.

I left the family to celebrate & set off in search of George's binoculars.

at John Berthe's I met an angry Iskenio Jacob GORDON. He had T.B. His father was white. His name was EDWARD. He worked at the air base.

"There are too many GORDON'S," he said. "I want to change my name to EDWARD. But it is a trouble, you have to write to Ottawa but I would like to have my father's name and add myself JACOB EDWARD."

"This is a helluva place," he said. Asked my opinion I said it was difficult to answer. "You have to spend 2 or 3 months & look every day."

Lydia produced my binoculars from the case. I declined her

In the night I found George's  
binoculars in the bed. BILLIE  
Red house cleaned.  
TUESDAY SUNNY, CLEAR,  
FINE.

Rose at 6:30 AM

Alice was up making pots  
of tea, coffee & toast stacks.  
She announced she was  
going to dress a NITSHIK  
It was 7 AM.

I grabbed a weak, cool  
uncooked cup of tea, my  
2 cameras & dashed down  
to the shore to find her.  
She emerged from John  
Berth's house with  
her sealskin bag of tools.  
She rattled a bunch of keys  
& I followed her to a shed,  
It was full of Eskimo  
culture. Caribou skins,  
cathead motors, rifles,  
sealskins, sealmeat &  
fish & that unmistakable  
Eskimo smell of uncured  
sealskin.

I helped her to carry the  
seal to John Berth's house.  
I had a new flipper.  
Alice took a front flipper  
which kept slipping. She  
tried putting her fingers in  
its eye sockets, finally, Lydia

Koch sent instructions to collect my binoculars. I did & returned for breakfast.

8:30 Mr MacGyver called for me. <sup>Everyone stood around at banana corral</sup> We picked up Leah (who I had met in English Bay 5 D ago interpreting for DNA) & went to the dock.

The pilot was young. I said to Leah "I like an old pilot."

"And so do I" she replied

9 AM exactly we became airborne in a Beaver. A much more solid aircraft than a Cessna.

Below the land lay in ~~the~~ pools of pale green moss the lakes, limpid black hearted in their depths.

The pilot was young, French bushy haired.

He flew in brown cotton gloves.

Looked twice round the cockpit to check the situation - buckled belts

## BEYOND THE TREE LINE

Approached Leaf Bay where George ~~was~~ earned his award for courage in the highest tides in the world.

It lay crooked & broad & craggy into inland mountains & spilled into the sea — over broad beaches, pure aquamarine & where tide met current & churned in specks of white like whipped cream I had taken us  $\frac{1}{2}$  an hour by Beaver.

We had left trees far behind.

The weather closed in behind us a trifle.

The tide was going out & fast. Reefs of white foam spread round the shoals & islets.

We left the Gumpston Islands to the East & approached Hopes Advance Bay. You could see clear to the sea end.

# CAVU.

Spotted a flight of ducks below

We were flying at 100 mph  
7,000' x One N.

You could see below that  
the land was an assortment  
of rocks, bluffs, lowlands  
& boulder-strewn areas.

10 AM 3,400' Wind from the  
West. Trapped <sup>greenish</sup> lakes without outlets.

The first time you do anything  
the mind is occupied with  
sensations, emotions.

The second time, one has  
a little detachment & can  
observe, but it takes a lot  
of concentration to do it well.  
Passed above 3 buildings on  
a lake near Payne Bay.

Behind was a "Specialist"  
looking pier & a little  
dock flanked by oil drums.  
Here it is nearly the end  
of summer and snow still  
lying in gullies & banks.

11 AM Over some really  
lilly country at 3,500'  
It was lumpy up here  
1000. To the east the

On the shore whale bones  
lay around like pretzels  
at a party of mussel  
shells.

JOGANI — pilot on the  
canoe — 2 hours later  
he was sitting, carrying  
an INUK hauling an  
IVIK — man's water  
with a file lashed to the  
handle with whale ~~skins~~ <sup>skins</sup>  
to make a chisel

Put my watch back 1 hour  
The sea plane took off  
at 12:50 (or 1:50 British  
time) & I wandered by  
the graveyard of 26 white  
wooden crosses over the  
graves.

Like most of the others,

Jacob Gordon, his wife and children went to the movie at the RC Mission - a good cowboy & Indian film.

When they got home, the 2 boys, Gemmie & Isaac, aged 5 & 6, went to bed. The fire was out.

Jacob poured Naptha fuel in from a 5 gallon drum.

An ember or a match in the fire ignited the stream, it sputtered back, Jacob caught fire with the splashes & he lit so he ran

just as it exploded.

The interior of the house was sprayed with blazing Naphtha gas. Escape through the door was cut off. Jacob & family got out through the windows suffering burns & lacerations.

They realized the 2 boys were still inside & Jacob → on 3 weeks leave from a sanatorium went back in to save the two sons who had ~~just~~ caught fire.

Their heads were burned beyond recognition I'm told they looked like Edward & Simonee. Anyhow he already severed & cut Jacob Gordon got them out. It was pretty useless as their ears, noses & eyes & tongues were burned away.

NO HELP FOR THE  
ESKIMO.

The DOT refused to send the one fire truck to the outbreak.

The Council was meeting at the time and so again it was on George's shoulders the responsibility fell.

After he was refused help, Charlie, the water truck driver, & he went down with others.

They threw water on the fire. The house stayed up & probably the snake extinguished the flames. Choked on its own soup, as Max would say.

There is no ambulance & the 6 victims were taken to ~~the~~ the nursing station by van & truck. In the night the 2 boys died.

So we went to bed after a fraught evening and during a most wakeful night
