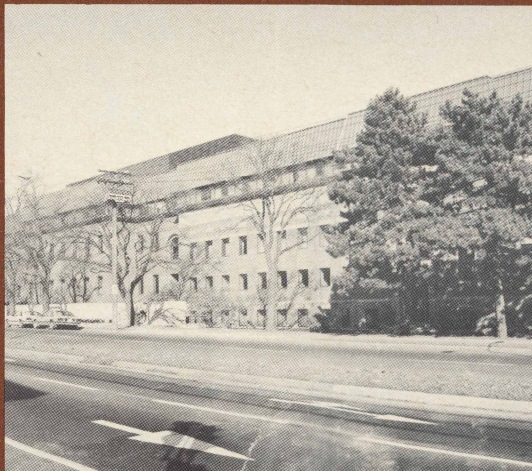

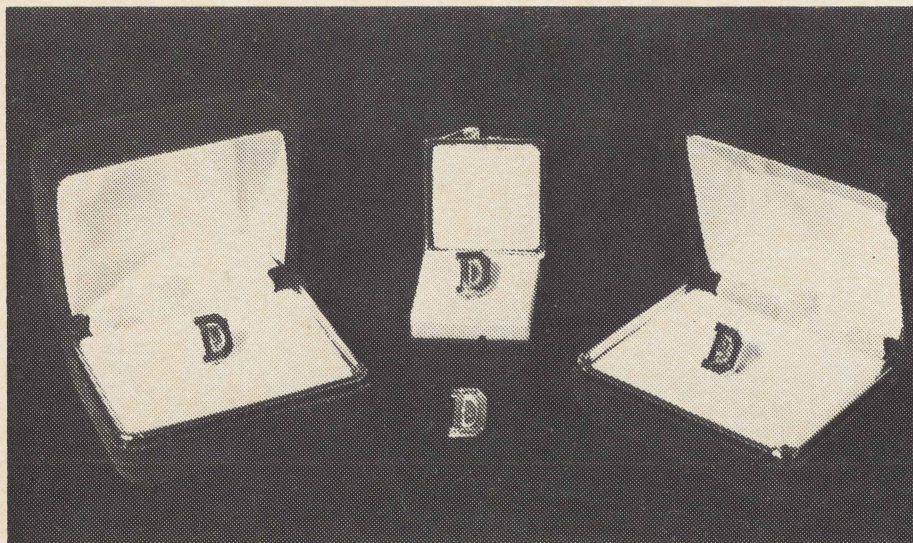

Dalhousie's Alumni Family

Did you know that Dalhousie's Alumni total 48,000 and of that number approximately 12,000 are lost? Lost alumni are those for whom the Alumni Office have no addresses. Known alumni are those for whom there are valid addresses. And did you know that of known Alumni, the breakdown reveals that 20,934 reside in Canada, 1,014 in the United States and 555 in other countries of the world?

The breakdown of Canadian Alumni reflects approximately 14,000 in the Atlantic Provinces, 10,000 approximately of that number reside in Nova Scotia and 7,000 of that number in Halifax and Dartmouth. These figures can increase about 2,000 per year with spring and fall graduations. Alumni, therefore, represent a considerable force in the Dalhousie family.

The Alumni Office makes about 4,000 address changes per year which indicates that about one in four alumni move each year.

One Dalhousie alumnus, who moved to England in the 1960's, is **Dr. Nancy J. Lane Perham**, Principal Scientific Officer in the Agricultural Research Council (A.R.C.) unit, Zoology Department, Cambridge University, England. Dr. Lane is also a Fellow and Lecturer, Girton College, Cambridge and tutor for graduate students at the same college.

Dr. Lane graduated from Dalhousie in 1958 with a Bachelor of Science degree, with first class honours in Biology. In 1960, Dr. Lane received her Masters of

Science degree in Zoology from Dalhousie. In 1963 she received a Doctor of Philosophy degree in Zoology from Oxford University; a similar degree from Cambridge University in 1968, followed by a Doctorate of Science from Cambridge University in May 1981. Dr. Lane's academic honours include an entrance scholarship to Dalhousie in 1955, Governor General's Gold Medal for highest standing in the graduate class from Dalhousie in 1958; Canadian National Research Council N.A.T.O. scholarship, 1963 and a Fellow, Girton College, Cambridge, 1970 to the present.

In addition to carrying out her own research and teaching in cell biology, Dr. Lane is responsible for the running of the electron microscopical facilities of the Agricultural Research Council Unit. This includes the administration of the use and care of such items of equipment as a Philips' 300 electron microscope and all ancillary apparatus, several photographic darkrooms and the Balzers freeze etching device. Dr. Lane is also in charge of three technical assistants as well as graduate students. In addition, Dr. Lane is responsible for guiding post-doctoral investigators, visiting scientists and other members of the Unit wishing to make use of the E.M. facilities.

Dr. Lane has been invited as a visiting research investigator to Centro de Biofísica y Biofémica IV. IC., Caracas, Venezuela in January, 1982. In past years, Dr. Lane has attended as symposium speaker, international conferences of Cell Biology in Toronto, Canada; Titisu, Germany;

Glasgow, Scotland and Sappora, Japan, 1982. She has been guest lecturer in laboratories at Harvard University, Boston; Woods Hale Marine Biological Laboratory, Mass. U.S.A.; Department of Cell Biology, University of Liverpool, U.K.; Department of Neurobiology, Columbia University, New York and the Royal Entomological Society, London, England. Dr. Lane has published 85 papers and 21 abstracts and book reviews. She has discovered that a special kind of tight junction basis of permeability barriers does exist in invertebrates in spite of contrary opinions and that other junctions between cells allow limited exchange of ions and molecules.

Dr. Lane is married to Dr. Richard Perham, who has higher Doctorate of Science from Cambridge University; and is a Fellow of St. John's and a reader and lecturer of Biochemistry at Cambridge. Dr. Perham and Dr. Lane have 2 children, Temple, 11 years and Quentin, 8 years.

An alumnus doing research and teaching at Dalhousie is **Dr. Catherine B. Lazier**, who graduated with a doctorate degree in Biochemistry from Dalhousie in 1968. Dr. Lazier has been an Associate Professor, Department of Biochemistry at Dalhousie from 1977 to the present. Her experience includes Research Fellow, Department of Physiology and Biochemistry, University of Southampton, England 1968-71 and in the Microbiology Department, Dalhousie University 1967. Dr. Lazier's awards include Medical Research Council, Scholar 1973-78; National Cancer Institute of Canada; Research Fellow 1964-68 and a Dalhousie Graduate Award, 1963-64.

Dr. Lazier has been invited to symposium and workshop lectures in Bethesda, Maryland; Barger, The Netherlands; the Weizman Institute, Israel; workshop in Antioestrogens, Sydney, Australia; symposium on "Hormones and Cancer," Worcester Foundation, Shrewsbury, Ma., and to the 3rd Vitellogenin workshop in Kanderstag, Switzerland. The main emphasis of Dr. Lazier's research has been in virus replication and estrogen action, particularly in breast cancer. She has published numerous papers and abstracts on her research.

Dr. Lazier has 3 children; 17, 13 and 9 years of age. her husband works at the Bedford Institute of Oceanography.

Board of Governors Candidates

Gary Hurst, B.Com. '63, LL.B. '66, served on the Alumni Association's Board of Directors since 1972. He was also an alumni representative on the Board of Governors. Once a practicing lawyer in Halifax, Mr. Hurst is now a well known businessman. He is a member of the Royal Nova Scotia Yacht Squadron, Ashburn Golf Club and Waegwoltic Club.

honored her by naming her Honorary President.

M. Heather Robertson, B.A. '69, LL.B. '75, B.Ed. (Saint Mary's '71), is a lawyer with the Halifax law firm of Walker & Dunlop. Ms. Robertson has been a member of the Association's Board of Directors since 1979, she is also a member of the Law Alumni Association Executive, as well as a member of the Nova Scotia Barristers Society and the Canada Bar Association. Ms. Robertson has represented the alumni on the Board of Governors for the past two years as the Alumni Association President's appointed representative. Ms. Robertson is active in politics and sailing.

The Regional Board, which will eventually have representatives from all the Association branches, was established as a means of improving communication between Dalhousie alumni in various cit-

Max Ferguson, to address alumni dinner

Popular radio and television broadcaster and writer Max Ferguson, will be guest speaker at the Annual Alumni Dinner on May 6. Mr. Ferguson, more popularly known as "Rawhide" received an honorary degree from Dalhousie University in

1972 for his contribution to radio broadcasting, literature and entertainment.

Mr. Ferguson started his radio career in the Maritimes in 1946 when he joined CBC Halifax as a staff announcer. His famous "Rawhide" program began in 1947 which ran on network radio for 17 years.

"Rawhide" was followed by the popular "Max Ferguson Show", which he co-hosted with Allan McFee, running for 11 years.

Mr. Ferguson's television work included guest appearances as well as hosting such series as "Gazette", "Tabloid" and "Take 30".

He has recorded three LP's and has authored two books "And Now, Here's Max" and "The Un-Muzzled Max".

Mr. Ferguson is the recipient of several awards: Stephen Leacock Award for Literary Humour (1967), ACTRA Award for best radio variety program (1975), ACTRA Award for integrity and outspoken broadcasting (1973) and the Order of Canada (1970). Besides receiving an honorary degree from Dalhousie, Mr. Ferguson has been similarly honored by Brock University, University of Alberta and the University of Western Ontario.

regular schedule and were heavily favorites to top the women's section and be near or at the top of the men's.

When you have the likes of Susan Mason, Carol Flynn, Louise Deveau and Dawn Suto swimming for you and Tom Scheibelhut, Andrew Cole and Arthur Rennie, your team should be first class.

MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

They coasted through the regular season undefeated in 12 matches (assumed as this was written) and faced their only tough competition in their own Dal Classic against Penn State and teams from Central Canada. Coach Al Scott's crew hosted the CIAU's in March '11-13 and hopes to improve on its sixth place standings of the past couple of years.

WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL

Coach Lois MacGregor's Tigers host the CIAU's in March and hope to be there as AUAA champs. They had their usual battle with Memorial for league honors. A tough exhibition schedule including tournaments in Calgary and Quebec City will prepare them for the CIAU's.

MEN'S BASKETBALL

The best season in years for the Tigers. Coach Doc Ryan has brought them back to respectability and playoff contention. More fans will have seen the Tigers than in any other year and Tiger supporters can anticipate a serious challenge for league supremacy within a year or two.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

The Tigers should be AUAA champions by the time this is read. They had won 41 games in succession in

league play up to January 15 and could have finished with 53 in a row in a four year period. Ranked in the top 10 all year, Carolyn Savoy was looking forward to leading her squad to the CIAU's in Saskatoon.

HOCKEY

An exciting Tigers club battled for first place all year with defending national champion University of Moncton. With an unsettled playoff picture, no one could predict in the unpredictable AUAA who would win and who would represent the league at the CIAU's in Moncton March 11-14. With potential all league players like defensemen Ken Johnston and Louis Lavoie and forwards John Kibyuk and Brian Gualazzi, coach Peter Esdale was working to lead his Tigers to the CIAU's.

For the first time in history, five Dal teams were ranked in the CIAU's top 10 in one week - December 7. The two volleyball, two basketball and hockey Tigers were all there. The same picture should be true much of the season with possibly the men's basketball Tigers missing the final top 10 — only because of the highly competitive situation in the AUAA and CIAU for high ratings.

The picture was bright all season and thanks to dedicated coaches and athletes working hard to keep Dalhousie's name at the top of the pack.

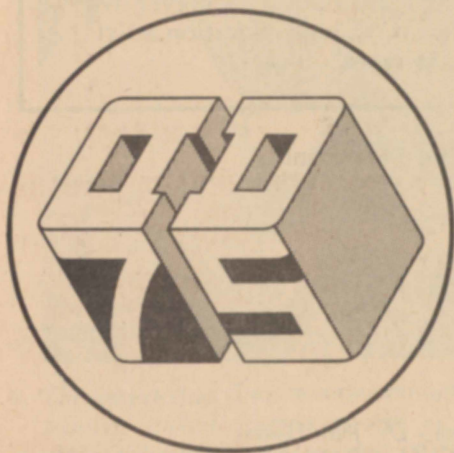

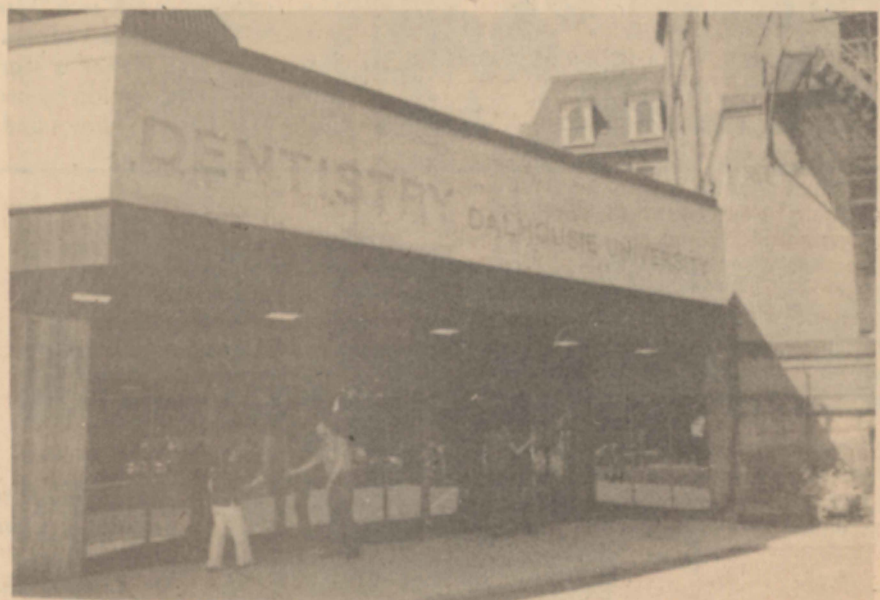

Innovative and service-oriented that's the record of the continuing education program in dentistry



A participation course in Four-handed Dentistry demonstrates how practitioners can more effectively utilize new concepts. This is only one in a number of courses offered regularly at Dalhousie.

Continuing education is inherent in the term professional. The Faculty of Dentistry has responded to this concept by organizing and administering a program for dentists and auxiliaries in the Atlantic region.

Each year a number of courses are offered both at Dalhousie and off campus in conjunction with Dental organizations throughout the Atlantic region. A one-week clinical experience in oral surgery is an example of a response to a request for more participation courses.

The program has provided 125 courses in an 11 year period with registration topping 6,000. The participation rate among practitioners in Atlantic Canada is more than 60 per cent.



The first class in the two-year dental hygiene program graduated in 1963. The hygienist serves as a trained auxiliary for the dental profession and makes a significant contribution to preventive dental health education by promoting it through education activities in the schools, clinics and private dental offices.

We've been able to rewrite the clinical curriculum



The School can provide delivery of dental service to the handicapped.

Expansion of the dental facility has made an enhanced clinical curriculum possible. The layout of the clinic has allowed the creation of vertical student groups consisting of a 4th year student, a 3rd year student and a 2nd year dental hygiene student. These individuals have been assigned adjacent clinical operatories and work together to manage their patients. Second year dental students treat patients in a separate section of the clinic.

One goal of the new clinical program is to promote improved patient care. Continuing treatment or recall appointments are kept within the vertical group thereby ensuring continuity when one class graduates and new students begin their patient care activities.

A major component of the new treatment facility is its screening clinic. It serves as the interface between student and patient needs. Dental clinic patients understand they are contributing to the educational efforts of the students and at the same time have the benefits of good dental care. Other services available include preventive treatment, comprehensive adult care, children's dentistry, emergency treatment, and specialty care.

About 3000 patients are treated annually in the clinic yet ample space is available for graduate students and participation-type continuing education programs.



The computerized clinic management system monitors student progress as well as the patient's diagnostic and treatment information. It allows the student to manage a patient's care more effectively and identifies any deficiencies a student may have in his own training program.



A cubicle is home-base for the student who can do bench lab work, study, or treat patients. The cubicle contains an equipped dental cart, a modern dental chair and is connected to a voice-actuated communication system.



The Division of Instructional Resources provides patient photography, graphic, audio and television production services to support faculty teaching, research, and administrative work.

The oldest continuing university faculty of dentistry in Canada



This is the Robie Street entrance to the intermediate Dentistry Building which was opened in 1958. For more than 20 years it was home to dental students. It was here that the benchmarks for new programs to meet changing teaching and research needs were established.

The Maritime Dental College opened its doors in the fall of 1908 with Dalhousie University supplying the facilities. It became a Faculty within Dalhousie during the 1911-1912 academic year. From its inception the School relied heavily on local practitioners for teaching. As late as 1955 there were only two fulltime faculty. By the 60s there was a move to develop a more complete dental education program and a concerted effort was made to attract faculty with expertise in special disciplines.

Course content expanded to include such subject areas as oral biology, community and public health dentistry. A dental hygiene program was introduced in 1961. A graduate program in oral surgery was approved in 1970 and was followed by a post-graduate program in periodontics in 1978.

By the spring of 1981, the School has awarded degrees to 926 dental students, 298 dental hygienists, and 15 dentists in graduate programs.



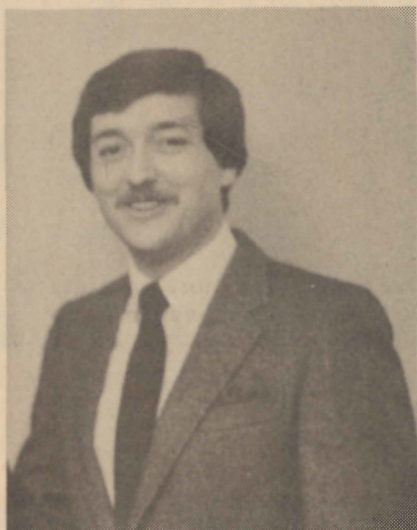
This atomic absorption instrument is used to identify elements of dental material samples used in fillings for dental cavities.

Research

Some illustrations are:

- * the relationship between physical and chemical properties and clinical serviceability for a range of biomaterials
- * studies related to deformities and deficiencies occurring due to genetic factors
- * work on maxillofacial prosthodontics for cancer patients is being carried out in collaboration with staff in the Faculty of Medicine.

Pat Donahoe, new Dean of Men, invites alumni to "drop in"

Two of the first things Pat Donahoe did when he arrived on campus was to write the dons and students of Howe Hall and to visit the Alumni Office to extend an invitation to alumni to visit him at Howe Hall.

The Dean's first major student undertaking in his new role was to encourage a "good neighbour policy." In his letter to students he said: "One does not have to be on campus very long to realize that one of the main issues of concern for Howe Hall has to be our public image. This prompts me to urge you with all earnestness to encourage the men in your

Houses to think constructively about being good neighbours. If we can be good neighbours, we can certainly improve a variety of our contacts both within and outside the university. Obviously that can only be to our advantage". The letter went on to say: "What is entailed in being good neighbours to people in other houses and those across the streets and beside the residences should be pretty straightforward. If we can agree to let them sleep at night, and not litter their lawns, I think we'll make a great impression."

To Donahoe the students are people first - they (the students) are "amazing" and the dons are of "high calibre". The Dalhousie students "are no more rowdy here than at other universities!"

A naive attitude you might think for a very young Dean of Men (Donahoe is in his very early 30's). Not so, Donahoe feels. Of his 30 or so years, 13 of them have been spent in residence (nine more than the average student). His first residence experience came at Saint Dunstan's University in P.E.I. where he completed his Bachelor's degree at the University of P.E.I., followed by residence at the University of Calgary where he completed his Master's degree in English Literature. During 1973-74, while doing coursework toward his Ph.D. at Dalhousie, Donahoe was a don in Cameron House of Howe Hall. Later, after more graduate work at the University of London, England, he

went on to become the Director of Residences at Brandon University in Manitoba.

From a Ph.D. in English Literature to a Dean of Men? While living in residence, Donahoe often experienced anger and frustration at the way students were treated. He thought perhaps he could do something about it and he is. His interests and concerns are helping to nurture a mutual respect between the residence staff and students. He says "with a bit of encouragement people will develop a sensitive family atmosphere."

On the subject of co-ed residences Donahoe thinks that it is "probably a direction we should thoroughly investigate," though he respects that the time honoured traditions of Howe Hall should not be "thrown to the wind."

As part of his "good neighbour policy," Pat and his wife Susan, invite alumni, who once lived in Howe Hall, and all alumni in the area, to drop in to see them and revisit old haunts.

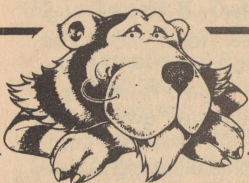

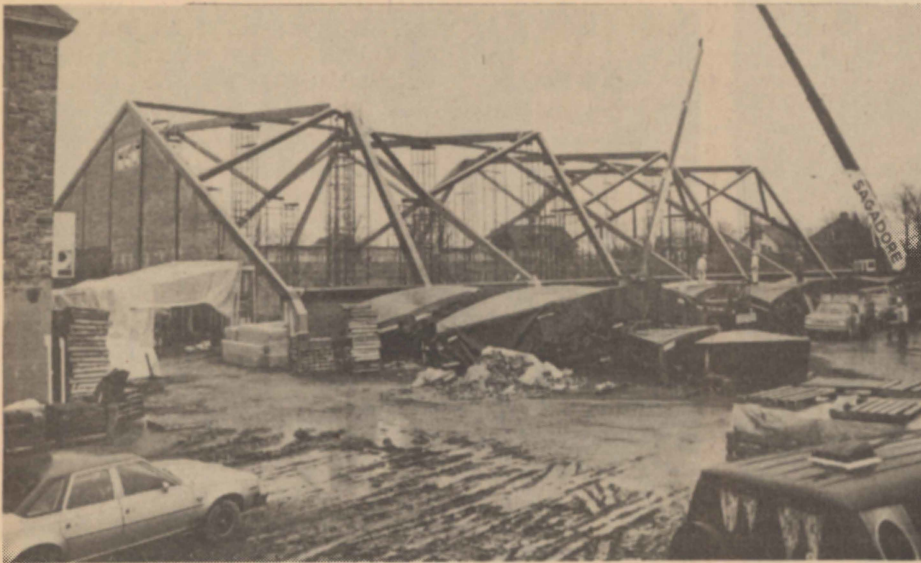
