Dear Mr. Raddall:

Prince or Wales College sponsors the "Samuel N. Robertson Memorial Lecture" which is given annually in memory of a former principal of the College, and which is delivered by a distinguished speaker from outside the Province. We have been considering the question of a speaker for the 1952 lecture which will be given in the spring and it was with much pleasure that we agreed on extending the invitation to you. I know the College would be much honored if you would consent to be our guest on this occasion and deliver the Robertson address.

The topic of the lecture would be entirely up to you. It could be on some aspect of history, literature, public affairs or education which would be of interest to both the scholar and the private citizen. The lecture is subsequently published by the <u>Dulhousic Review</u> and reprints are made for distribution. Lest year's speaker was Monseigneur Ferdinand Wandry, Rector of Luval University, and our guest the year before was Dr. A.E. Kerr, President of Delhousic.

The date of the lecture will be entirely at your convenience. The best time for us would be during the period February 15 to March 15. We would pay the travelling expenses of the trip, and we would like to have the honor of your company as a guest of the College while you are here.

Dr. Robertson, for whom the lecture is named, was one of the Maritimes' most distinguished educationalists. He was widely respected and the lectureship was planned as a fitting tribute to him as well as a means of bringing distinguished Canadians to the College and to Charlottetown.

I do hope you will be able to come. I recall with much pleasure meeting you when you addressed the historical society at Acadia University a year or so ago, and I know that your visit would be appreciated and enjoyed.
