BASICS

CKDU is the student-operated radio station of Dalhousie University, funded by the student union. In 1977, the station was licensed by the CRTC.

CKDU is located on the fourth floor of the student union building, with transmitters in each of the residences. This allows the station to broadcast to Howe Hall, Sherriff Hall, and Fenwick Place, as well as closed circuit in the S.U.B.

Membership is open to all Dalhousie students, and individuals from all departments of the university are encouraged to participate with the station, from behind the scenes to on-air. Because of the diversity of programming, people with interests and abilities in all areas are welcomed.

PURPOSE

In its capacity as Dalhousie's student-operated radio station, CKDU's main objective is to work together with the Dalhousie community to provide an alternative forum for student expression. Although its present audience is limited, CKDU works towards drawing the Dalhousie community together by providing the opportunity for a wide variety of programming. The station is also a valuable training ground for all aspects of radio production, and many CKDU personnel have gone on to careers in the professional media.

PROGRAMMING

CKDU Radio endeavours to provide a broad spectrum of programming in order to meet the diversity of tastes within the university community.

Almost all categories of music are aired, from "new wave" rock to classical. As well as its regular daily newscasts, CKDU broadcasts a half hour of in-depth news coverage, with emphasis on the Dalhousie community. Sports coverage includes all major varsity games, and two daily sport wrap-ups.

Members of the station are encouraged to experiment with many different aspects of radio and one important result of this has been a series of public affairs programs.

One of the station's objectives in programming is to serve as a communication center for the community. CKDU encourages the participation of all campus organizations in its daily programming schedule.

POTENTIAL

CKDU is now providing the best service possible with the funds available. However, with its present operation facilities, the station can reach only 18% of the Dalhousie community.

With continued growth and support, the station has many possibilities for increased quality, originality and experimentation in programming.

FM licensing would allow CKDU to become a valuable communications and information center for the entire Dalhousie community. Besides the obvious advantage of more extensive coverage, as an FM station, CKDU would also become an important tool for voicing Dalhousie's interests and perspectives within a much larger community.

FM would mean:

- Reaching a wider Dalhousie audience
- An open forum for the expression of a wide range of on-campus interests to the wider Dalhousie community
- A forum for the exposure of new music, thoughts and ideas
- The broadcast of lectures and seminars to the community
- A link to the outside community for Dalhousie musicians, writers and artists
- Increased coverage of on-campus news
- Increased coverage of Dalhousie sporting events, both at home and away
- A valuable public relations vehicle to the community
- Valuable practical, semi-professional experience for members
