

Institute of International Law of Peking University

(August, 1983)

I. Nature and Purposes

"Institute of International Law of Peking University" is an academic organ established by Peking University and approved by the Ministry of Education

The purposes of the Institute are:

- 1) to promote academic research and teaching in international law in China, and
- 2) to make contributions to the development of science of international law in China.

II. Organization

The Institute is composed of a President, a vice-President and several research workers. By the end of 1985, it will comprise 34 staff, including 24 research workers, 6 secretaries and 4 administrative personnel.

III. Activities

The Institute conducts:

- 1) research on specially identified subjects of international law;
- 2) lecturing on special topics;
- 3) graduate studies (LL.M. and LL. D);
- 4) training of teachers and research workers from other Chinese law schools and institutes;
- 5) providing lectures and materials to other Chinese law school and law departments of universities; and

- 6) exchanges of personnel and library materials with universities and institutes of foreign states.

IV. Research Subjects.

- 1) China and International law, mainly the practice of the PRC;
- 2) New Issues of Law of the Sea;
- 3) New Development of Outer Space Law;
- 4) International Organizations and International Law, e.g. the United Nations and other organizations
- 5) International Economic Law, eg. legal problems in the establishment of new international economic order and
- 6) Private International Law, starting with "the status of foreigners in China".

V. Library Facility

A "Centre of Library Books and Materials on International Law will be established to conduct the exchange of books and materials with libraries in China and abroad, and to provide books and materials to universities and institutes in China.

VI. Publications

The Institute will publish

- 1) monographs and reference materials of international law and
- 2) a "Materials on international law" regularly

VII. Financial Resources

The finance of the Institute will come from:

- 1) the budget of Peking University, and
- 2) financed assistance and donations from institutions and organizations at home or abroad

VIII. Perspective

THE INSTITUTE OF INTERNATIONAL LAW, PEKING UNIVERSITY

1. The Institute of International Law at Peking University is an academic organ established by Peking University and approved by the Ministry of Education. The purpose of the Institute is to push forward and promote the development of the science of international law in China.
2. The Institute comprises a president, vice-president and research workers. By the end of 1985, there will be thirty-four staff, including 24 research workers, 6 secretaries, and 4 administrative personnel.
3. The following activities will be conducted in the Institute:
 - (a) research on specially identified subjects; (b) lecturing on special topics; (c) graduate studies (LL.M. and LL.D.); (d) training of teachers and research workers from other Chinese law schools or law departments of universities; (e) provision of lectures and materials to other Chinese law schools (including law departments of universities); and (f) exchanges of personnel and library materials with universities and academic institutions of foreign countries.
4. The specially identified subjects include: (a) China and International law, focusing on the practice of the PRC; (b) new issues of Law of the Sea; (c) new developments in Outer Space Law; (d) International Organization and International Law - the United Nations and other international organizations; (e) International Economic Law; legal problems of establishing new international economic order; and (f) Private international, starting with the question of "the status of foreigners in China."

5. A "Center of Library Books and Materials on International Law" will be established to conduct exchange of books and materials with libraries both in China and abroad, and to provide books and materials to universities and institutes in China.
6. The Institute will publish monographs and materials on international law; a "Materials on International Law" will be published regularly.
7. The Institute will be financed partly by the budget of Peking University and the rest by institutions or organizations at home and abroad, in the form of financial assistance or donations.
8. The Institute will be expanded into a Institute of International Law and International Relations presently.

Memorandum

In order to strengthen cooperation and exchange between legal scholars of their two countries and to promote mutual understanding and friendship, representatives of the Ministries of Education and Justice of the People's Republic of China, Peking University, People's University, Wuhan University, Jilin University, the Beijing School of Political Science and Law, the East China School of Political Science and Law, the United States Committee on Legal Education Exchanges with the People's Republic of China, and the Ford Foundation convened a conference in Beijing from May 3 to May 5, 1983. The two sides agreed to conduct a three-year program of cooperation. The main focus of discussion concerned projects for cooperation in 1983 and 1984. The following understanding was reached:

1. A delegation of ten Chinese legal educators will visit the United States in October of 1983 for a period of three weeks to conduct a study tour of United States legal education. The Chinese side shall be responsible for the costs of international transportation to and from the pertinent CAAC terminus on CAAC. All other relevant expenses, including reasonable living expenses in the United States, shall be borne by the U.S. side.

2. For 1983 and 1984 the Chinese side will each academic year send a total of ten to twenty teachers to the United States for study (including both degree and non-degree programs in law) or to engage in research. The Chinese teachers going abroad for graduate level study are expected to be in residence for not less than one year (including two full academic terms) and not to exceed two years; the residence period of the researchers may be up to six months. Chinese faculty

going abroad for graduate level study must be able to speak, read, write and comprehend English effectively, and must pass an English test approved by the Chinese Ministry of Education for persons going abroad to study. Many U.S. LL.M. programs require a level of English language competence equivalent to a TOEFL score of at least 580.

The Chinese side will deliver prior to May 31, 1983 a list of nominees to go to the United States in August, 1983 to study; will communicate to the United States side as soon as possible the scores of the nominees on the English proficiency test; will deliver to the U.S. side prior to September 30, 1983 a list of nominees to go to the United States to engage in research beginning in January or February, 1984; will deliver prior to October 31, 1983 a list of nominees to go to the United States in September 1984 to study; will deliver prior to December 31, 1983 the scores achieved by such nominees on the English proficiency test; and will deliver prior to January 31, 1984 a list of nominees to go to the United States to engage in research during the academic year 1984-1985.

In accordance with the aforementioned deadlines, the Chinese side shall provide the United States side with forms setting forth the personal history, academic background and study or research plans of students and researchers nominated to go the U.S. It is also anticipated that representatives of the Committee shall have an opportunity, if desired, to interview Chinese nominees.

The United States side shall to the fullest extent possible make placement and financial arrangements for the above-mentioned students and researchers. Nevertheless, both sides recognize that admission of the nominees is entirely within the discretion of the individual law

schools to which they have applied. The Committee welcomes the Chinese side to exert its best efforts to send as many teachers as possible to obtain degrees. With respect to those Chinese teachers who will be commencing their graduate-level legal studies in August of 1983, the U.S. side will issue acceptance notices prior to the end of July, 1983. With respect to Chinese teachers who will be commencing their study or research in the academic year 1984-1985, the U.S. side will issue an acceptance notice more than three months prior to their time for starting study or research in the United States.

The Chinese side shall bear the costs of international transportation for Chinese students going to the United States for graduate legal study or research up to CAAC's U.S. terminus closest to their final destination.

The United States side shall bear the costs of reasonable housing and other maintenance expenses within the U.S. appropriate to the academic status and location of the Chinese scholar, tuition and academic fees (where applicable), domestic travel, medical insurance, and a modest allowance for books.

3. In the 1983 and 1984 academic years, the United States side may each year send two to four non-degree students to study in China for a period up to one year. Prior to July 31, 1983, the United States side shall deliver to the Chinese side a list of the nominees for study in China in 1983 and forms setting forth their personal history, academic background and plans for study in China (including their level of Chinese language proficiency) and prior to December 30, 1983 shall deliver to the Chinese side a list of nominees for study in China in 1984 and forms setting forth their personal history, academic

background and plans for study (including their level of Chinese language proficiency).

The Chinese side shall to the fullest extent possible make arrangements to enable the aforementioned persons to study in China. Moreover, during their period of study in China, the Chinese side shall be responsible for providing dormitory accommodations and waiver of tuition fees, but all other expenses are the responsibility of the students.

With respect to those persons commencing their studies in 1983, the Chinese side will issue an acceptance notice prior to the end of August. With respect to those persons who will commence their studies in 1984, the Chinese side will issue an acceptance notice three months prior to their time for commencing study in China.

4. In 1983 and 1984, the United States side may each year send two to four researchers to China. Each researcher may remain in China for a period ranging from three to six months. Prior to July 30, 1983, the United States side shall submit to the Chinese side a list of the names of the persons nominated to engage in research work in China during 1983, together with a form setting forth their personal history, academic background and research plans. Prior to December 30, 1983, the United States side shall deliver to the Chinese side a list of the names of the persons nominated to engage in research work in China during 1984, together with a form setting forth their personal history, academic background and research plans.

The Chinese side shall do its best to make arrangements for the above-mentioned researchers coming to China.

All international travel expenses, as well as living and research expenses of the aforementioned researchers while they are in China, shall be borne by the United States side.

5. In 1983 and 1984 the Chinese side plans to invite a certain number of United States law professors to visit China to lecture. The schedule and content of the lectures shall be discussed separately. The United States side shall be responsible for the international travel expenses of the professors who visit China to lecture and the Chinese side shall be responsible for the costs of food, lodging, and transportation during the lecture period.

6. The two sides agree to discuss separately a plan for United States law professors to visit China to provide specialized pre-departure training for students and visiting scholars travelling to the United States.

7. The Committee, in promoting exchange in the areas of legal materials through its sub-committee of United States law librarians, will principally conduct the following activities:

- (1) Compile an appropriate list of the English language law books and periodicals to be provided to the participating Chinese institutions, in accordance with the needs of the Chinese side and the abilities of the U.S. side.
- (2) The principles governing the donation of legal materials to the six faculties and schools are:
 - (a) each of the schools and faculties shall receive one set of basic legal books, materials and magazines;

- (b) specialized books, materials and magazines shall be provided, in accordance with the desire and needs expressed by the six schools and faculties through this cooperative plan, for strengthening areas of academic concentration;
- (c) the library sub-committee will endeavor to obtain funds to enable the Chinese side to buy materials and equipment (including one microfilm camera, microfilm readers, printing machines, copy machines, library search equipment and other equipment conducive to improving library management);
- (d) the library sub-committee shall be responsible for shipment of books, materials, magazines and equipment from the U.S. to China;
- (e) for the purpose of training law library management personnel for the six schools and faculties, the sub-committee shall select qualified personnel to visit the United States as graduate students or visiting scholars; moreover it should try to provide a place for them to receive practical training at a United States university law library or other law library;
- (f) assist one or two Chinese centers (when selected from among the schools included within the plan for cooperation) in training Chinese law library

personnel (including persons from institutions of legal education not included within the plan for cooperation) and in conducting liaison work with the United States law library sub-committee.

- (3) The six Chinese institutions of legal education shall, to the fullest extent possible, send to ten U.S. law schools Chinese legal books, materials and magazines, in response to the needs of the U.S. side. The Chinese shall be responsible for shipment of books, materials and magazines to the United States.

8. In the second half of 1984 a week-long symposium will be held in China on selected legal problems of international trade and investment. The United States side shall choose seven participants and the Chinese side shall choose twenty-three. The United States side shall bear the international travel expenses of the seven persons it chooses to take part in the symposium. The Chinese side shall bear the expenses of meals and lodging during the symposium, as well as domestic transportation related to the symposium. If United States participants in the symposium wish to engage in recreational travel in China, they shall bear all expenses so incurred. If the host organizations agree, a number of other foreign representatives may participate in the symposium at their own expense. The details of the symposium shall be discussed separately.

9. The Canadian representative attended the conference as an observer, and indicated that, contingent upon securing relevant Canadian financing assistance, he looked forward to establishment of the same type of cooperation with the Chinese side.

10. A representative of the Institute of Law of the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences attended the conference. The United States side will discuss the question of cooperation with the Institute of Law of the Chinese Academy and Social Sciences directly with the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences.

11. The general principles and specific projects of cooperation discussed in the memorandum may be modified by mutual agreement.
