could hardly speak
he was so hoarse.

What happened
"I got talking" he
said

Saw thrasher shark
jumping right out
of the water & breathing
as whale.

Passed Pack's Harbour
at sunset on the
port side as we
chugged past Horse
bops Island in a
crimson sunset.

A neat looking,
well painted settlement
trim & colorful with
orange houses, fish
sheds & sandy looking
beach.

Entering Lactowight
Full moon and a shifting
shimmering curtain of
white northern light.

Running into Lactowight
we headed into the path
of the moon again.

The searchlight,
operated by Captain
Tucker, picked up
the dozens of small
boats swinging at
anchor.

We steadied, starboarded
& sidled into the jetty.
A B Patrick Hickey flung
a rope ashore. The
searchlight picked it
out and a boy picked

it up as it slithered
towards the quayside.
He retrieved it, a man
hauled on it & hauled
up the lowline. We
sided more to port &
tied up without even
a jar or a bump. at
9:15.

Visited Bell Telephone

Departed at 3:30 AM.

Monday.

Funchman's Island
8:45 AM 25th Sept.

Bright sun, calm

"You're not a ginker"
said the captain!

a pretty harbor, neat,
painted houses and a
great schooner, "Lenia
B Bontleui" loading
salt bulk codfish
for mainland ports
of Halifax.

The captain Rowland
Howell, said ~~that~~ he'd
be in Halifax by
Sunday.

35 cents a lb for salmon.

You're so lucky
there hasn't been

wonderful calm all
trip, and it's going
to be wonderful calm
today too."

Watched three sailors
scrupulously hock &
scub down the p'deck.

Mended my trousers
(needle & thread from
the C/P Engineer.
Made me reflect on the
importance of quality in
the North. It has to
be supreme. Shoddy
things don't last

boots break down,
wool wears thin,
wearing the same
clothes all the time
the finish has to be
first class. Zips
break: viz my own
& the old saying a
stitch in time saves
9 was never truer.

I sat on a nail on
the Rupert Island last
October & mended it
today — It had goun
into a T-shaped
rent — quite large
too — $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches long,

6:45 P.M. Entering St Anthony.

Stormy grey seas, white
caps whipped by a southerly
wind.

Grey sky, streaming rock
& the winking harbour
light of St Anthony.

Hopedale's nose rising
wavering & falling,
harrow channel into
harbour breached
the line of rock ahead
& we pressed into the
HQ of the Grenfell Mission
Graveyard near the
headland, white
crosses

White pink & yellow
houses, warehouses
of silver steel, the
schooner Gail

Lying at wharf no
2 with a deck cargo
of blue & red fuel
drums & barrels, the
two stout masts of
equal height.

A lone man in a
white dory rowed
across the harbour.

Sunsetting beyond
the wooded hill.

Ashore, Sir Wilfred
Grenfell's green house
was dark against
the autumn trees - nearby
the hospital, brightly
lit, a haven for so
many, looked luscious
in the sleepy evening
air.

The St Anthony's Inn

was half hidden
by the trees of its
garden. I plucked 3
leaves, one for
Rosemary, one for myself
& another. A boy in
a Killey hat spoke softly
to me, and said he
was a pupil at the
Grateful Mission School.

I had 20 minutes on
land, so we walked
back together. He'd
been to St John's
"a whole heap of
houses. It's not
like St Anthony," he
said.

An American doctor
at the mission said "They

're not like other people.
They're untouched by
greed. Civilization as
we know it, has not
spoiled them yet."

We sailed as dark
filled the hollow of the
harbour and only
~~the~~ lighted windows
were visible against
the hillside. The hands
on the clock stood at
P.M.

Tuesday 26th Sept
We called at Twillingate
early. Restless night.
First poor weather.

Rain & fog to Lewisporte.
Stayed aboard for the
day as a short trip
is coming up, and I
don't have to beat
work for a week.

A busy harbor with
great progress on the
pier. Tons of fill have
been poured in.

The salt heat, the
black bulk lay
shrouded in fog, like
some Dickens scene
in a novel.

It's the former

Calypso, a naval
training vessel from
Helson's day, fought
at Trafalgar and
was more recently an
RNR training ship.

How the ships collect
salt from it for the
cod fishery instead of
coming into the wharves.

Wednesday Sept 27
Arrived at St Anthony
with cargo of conduit
pipes and a boiler.

In 20 minutes we
turned round. - barely
lowered the gangway!
Stormy sea today.
~~and~~ The wind was
fair - behind us - up
to St Anthony but we
went right into it coming
down to Burnt Point
to unload a hold full
of hay.

We passed the
schooner "Gail" en
route & I fired
off my last color
shots on a navy

blue sea, blue clouds
& foaming white crests
on the waves.

The Gail's masts rolled
& dipped wildly from
side to side as she
luffed through the
wind & waves. one
moment you could see
her deck & the next
moment the red of her
lower planking rose
high as she rolled
wildly to starboard.

Bunt Point. The
smell of hay was strong
as the hatch covers were
raised & the crew set
about pitching it up

in small nets to
be slung over the
side.

Three great horses
were warning the
unfenced field, unbudded
free and high as
shoe horses. — The hay
had been brought for
them.

The haul wood all winter
for Bowatus.

met Levi Wane, 75,
who rescued Dr U-J.
Grenfell from an ice
floe in 1908. April
21st

Grenfell had killed
3 of his team and

made a dogskin
coat, took off

At 4:30 P.M. I returned
aboard. — My fellow
passenger going up to
Burnt Point had
returned aboard to the
ship, and his wooden
case & moccas were
laid by the purser's
cabin.

William Boysey, 50ish,
had been advised to
go to Bowaters for a
job. spent \$30 to get
there ~~and~~ to work
in the woods for the
winter.

When he saw the foremanⁿ

he was told "no job"
& had to return to
Lewesport. His hopes
of a winter job crushed
after setting sail with
hope in his heart.

I left my dinner half
eaten, suddenly aware
of the great tragedy
of life for so many
ordinary, humble people.
He had 8 children,
no job, little money,
but he smiled and
said he would try to
find work at Grand
Falls.

Ken came off duty
at 8. His surname
is James. - How strange

if I married him &
became Barbara Jones.
Sea sick this evening
for the first time in my
life.

Dawson City

running into town from
"Tent Town" is raised
3 feet above the original
New duck boards

walked down the old duck
board trough — destined
to become a ditch
where men tread - quipping

In the Bonanza Hotel was a joke mirror in the lobby outside the gents lavatory.

wednesday

The Bank of Commerce appeared to be a heavy stone & cement construction, but on closer inspection it was built of hammered out biscuit boxes to form a facade.

Inside wooden benches a 1902 picture of Dawson City - a huge coffee "Wells, Fargo & Live Express".

The office was marked "GOLD DUST BUYING TELLER"

The mining process - Above the gold assaying room with furnace, retorts

crucibles, hydrochloric acid, mercury, & chemicals for purifying.

First the miners were paid on what they brought in before refining. The Bank of Commerce lost \$25,000 in the first month, so the refining was set up in the bank. Robert Sewie was a bank clerk in the building still standing on the banks of the Yukon.

At the Old Men's Home

Jim McDonald, Georgetown, P.E.I. ^(Killed 1910?) left by the Yukon arrived Dawson 1919.

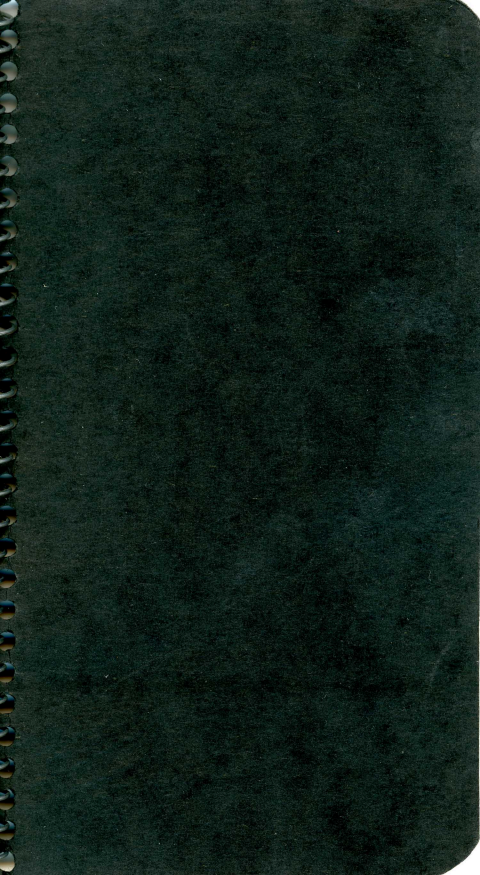
