GREAT PROGRESS HAS BEEN MADE TOWARDS UNIVERSITY FEDERATION

In last September's issue of this paper there appeared a synopsis of what had been done regarding the proposed University Federation to date. In concluding the article stated that a second conference would be held on October 24th.

At this Conference the Committee on Finance reported that a new University, mothering the existing Maritime Colleges, removed to Halifax, would involve a capital expenditure of \$1,000,000. and an annual outlay of \$450,000. The Committee on Constitution reported, endorsing the principle of federation, recommended the removal to Halifax of the existing institutions, while retaining each its own character and governing body and holding in abeyance its degree conferring powers, except in divinity.

Growing out of the discussion of the above reports it was resolved:

"That each of the bodies represented at this conference be asked to nominate two representatives on a committee to consider and report further on the constitutional, academic and financial aspects of the problems before the conference and to submit their report to each member of the conference at least two weeks before the next meeting of the conference."

This committee subsequently met and decided to invite the representatives of each of the various institutions involved to submit a plan of federation which in its judgement would be workable. This having been done, an endeavor was made to consolidate the various plans and the resultant scheme is the one that was discussed at a third conference held the 12th of this month at which important progress was made in the direction of Maritime University Federation when the Conference, representative of the Universities and Governments of the Maritime Provinces and the Dominion of Newfoundland, meeting under the Chairmanship of the Chief Justice of Nova Scotia, Hon. R. E. Harris in the Province Building, adopted a scheme of federation which represented a consolidation of all the schemes put forward as satisfactory by all the interests involved.

This approved scheme will next be placed before the Universities and the Government concerned for their formal action, and a report on the progress made, together with an invitation for further directions they may

ALUMNI NOTES

1867—Rev. Dr. Edwin Smith, B.A. '67, a member of the Presbyterian Church for more than thirty years, died in Vancouver on November 22nd.

1870—On November 8th, Dr. Thomas W. P. Flinn, Medicine '70-71, of 84 Morris Street Halifax, died very suddenly while presiding at a meeting of the Knights of Columbus Dr. Flinn retired from medical practise some years ago and was seventy-two years of age. In Dr. Flinn's death, Dalhousie loses one of its most loyal Alumni.

1875—The Treasurer of the Association has just received a contribution from Clifford M. Jack, Esq., who was a student at Dalhousie in the years 1876-76 and 1877-78. Mr. Jack is in business in Halifax and is one of the most consistent supporters of the Alumni Association.

1876—The death took place in California quite recently of Mr. Chas. A. McCully, Arts '76-77, formerly of Truro, N. S. Mr. McCully was manager of the Grand Circuit meetings held at Brighton Beach about twenty years ago, and arranged the memorable race there between Cresceus 2.02 1/4 and The Abbot, 2.03 1/4, which was witnessed by 30000 persons.

1880—The "News" has just received a subscription from the Rev. Dr. Edwin Crowell, B.A. '80, M.A. '91, Yarmouth, N. S. Dr. Crowell is the Clergyman in the Baptist Church and is also mathematical teacher in the Government Navigation School at Yarmouth.

1882—Hon. George G. Patterson, B.A. '82, M.A. '87, LL.B. '89, of New Glasgow, N. S., has found it necessary to relinquish the post of Lecturer on Evidence at the Dalhousie Law School. 1885—The paper read by Dr Chas. Morse, LL.B. ('85) before the Historical Association of Annapolis Royal August 1921, on the occasion of the celebration of the bi-centenary of the founding of the first Civil Court of Judicature in British North America, and printed in the Canadian Law Times last year, has been reprinted in the English Law Times in the issues of October 7, 14 and 21. 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wish to make will be submitted to the Carnegie Foundation, whose report on the educational situation in the Maritime Provinces initiated the present movement for confederation.

The scheme of federation adopted as a workable basis for the final scheme provides for the removal to or setting up in Halifax of the following institutions:

- Acadia University, Wolfville.
- King's University, Windsor.
- Mount Allison University, Sackville, New Brunswick.
- A Presbyterian College.
- A Roman Catholic College.
- A non-denominational College.
- A French-Acadian College.

One Central University

It also provides for the establishment of a Central University, embracing the faculties of Arts and Pure Science, Law, Medicine, Dentistry and Applied Science and charged with the work of organizing as rapidly as its resources permit, the Faculties of Agriculture, Pharmacy, Forestry, Fine Arts and Education.

Dalhousie University, which would form the nucleus of the new University, under the scheme adopted, reserves the right to enter the federation as a non-denominational college, or to merge with any other body or bodies wishing to set up a non-denominational college or to give her funds and property set apart for arts to a body or bodies wishing to form the non-denominational college.

Under the scheme adopted Dalhousie would turn over to the Central University all its professional schools at present in operation, and all its property and endowments not specially earmarked for its purposes. The other Universities and Colleges involved would turn over the libraries and scientific apparatus to the Central University but would retain their present properties and endowments. The constituent colleges would teach the first two years in arts, full courses if they wished to do in philosophy, psychology, economics, pedagogy and history, and a full course in divinity; but would hold in abeyance their degree conferring powers except in divinity. All examina-

tions would be set and conducted by the Central University.

Interim Board of Governors

The approved scheme provides for an interim Board of Governors and after six years from its inauguration a permanent board consisting of the president of the University, ex officio, one person appointed by the Board of Governors of each of the constituent colleges, six, elected by the associated alumni of all the constituent colleges, one of whom shall be a resident of Newfoundland and one a resident of Prince Edward Island, three persons appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia in Council, two persons appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick in Council, one person appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor of Prince Edward Island in Council and one person appointed by the Governor of Newfoundland, the appointments of the Governments of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland to be made only in the event of each making an adequate annual grant to the University. The approved scheme further lays down that all members shall be chosen to act on behalf of the public at large and shall be selected solely on account of their knowledge of, and their capacity to direct the affairs of an institution of higher learning.

Constitution of the Senate

The scheme provides that the Senate

having jurisdiction over all questions of academic policy, shall consist of the President of the University, the heads of the several constituent colleges and one member of the teaching staff of each college of full professional rank, the deans of the several faculties of the University, two members of the staff of the University teaching pure science and of full professional rank, and two members of the staff of full professional rank of each professional faculty of the University.

Under the scheme approved the constituent colleges shall erect their own residences in Halifax, shall fix their own rates for board and lodging and shall have full control of the discipline of their students in matters other than those of University importance.

Provision is also made for a minimum scale of salaries for members of the staff, that the present staff of professors and lecturers of the federating institutions shall be provided for as far as possible by reappointment or superannuation, and for the establishment of a permanent pension fund for the University and constituent college staffs.

The conference adjourned to meet at the call of the chair after passing resolutions thanking the members of the committee for their work in bringing down a satisfactory report, and the chairman for the able manner in which he had conducted the proceedings.
