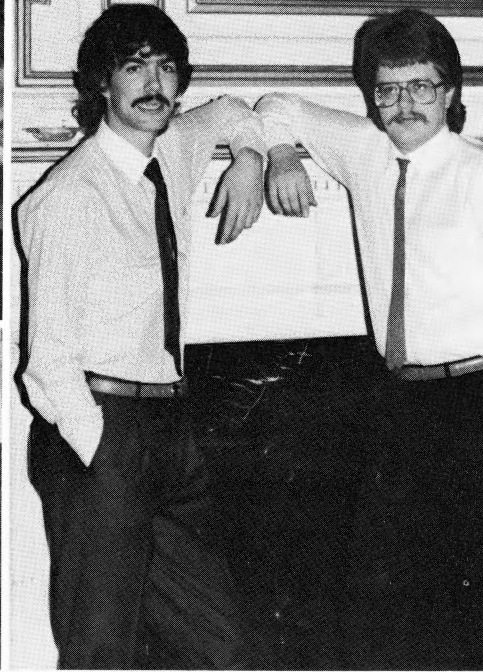
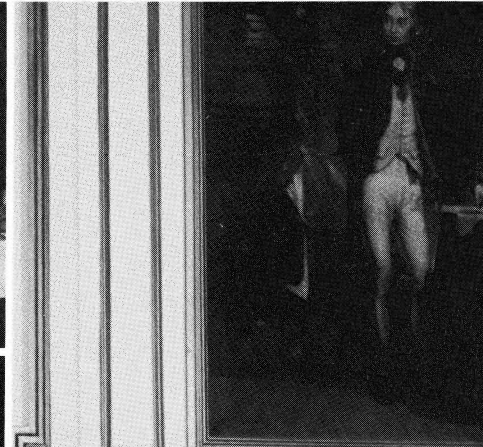
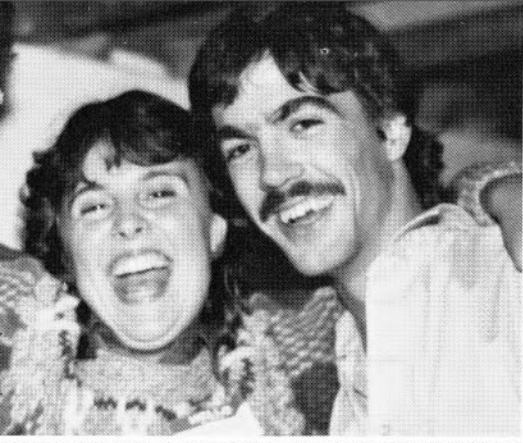


“Her pathway to success was serving humanity.”

The 1986 yearbook is dedicated to Dr. Jessie I. MacKnight who served as a faculty member of the Maritime College of Pharmacy from 1923-1961. Dr. MacKnight was responsible for the elementary pharmacy course and the teaching of dispensing. She stressed pride in ones' work and encouraged students to develop their awareness of being a good citizen as well as being a good pharmacist. Dr. MacKnight took great pride in the accomplishments of students and of pharmacists and following her retirement she maintained a keen interest in the College and its students.

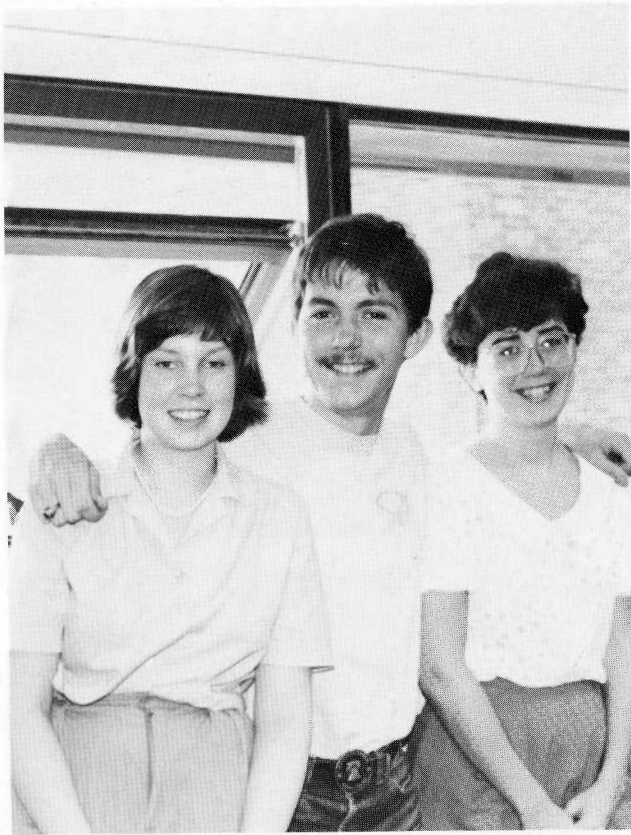
March brought the final banquet and as always it was a success. What better way to end the year than with the social event of the season: the annual Pharmacy Ball.

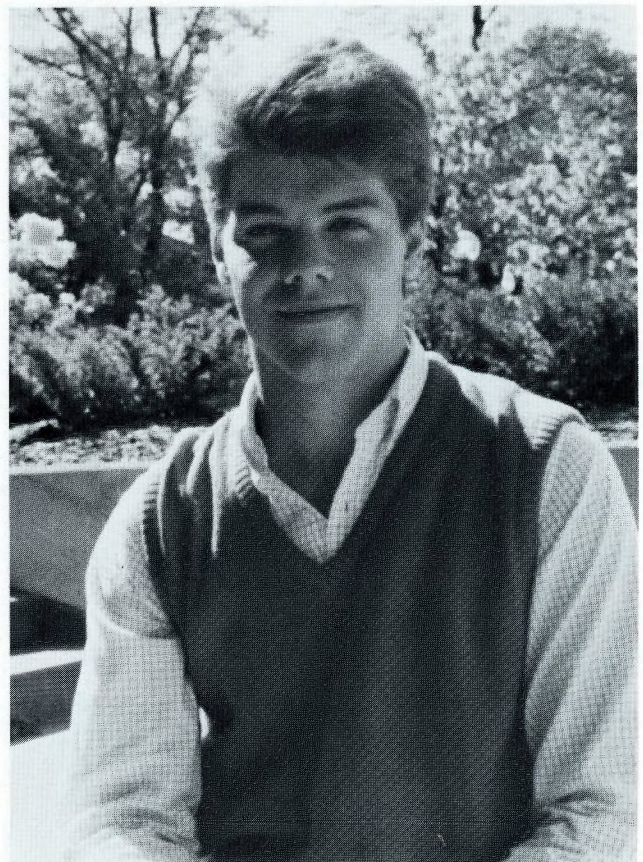
# STUDENT UNION
