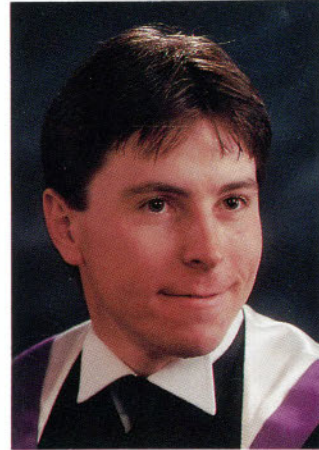


AMENA AHMED

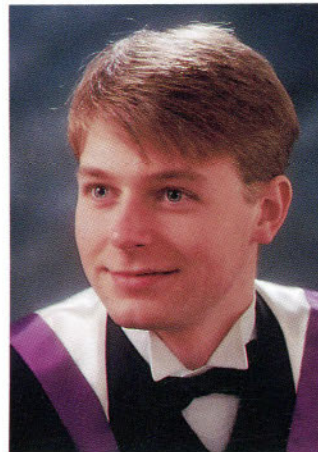
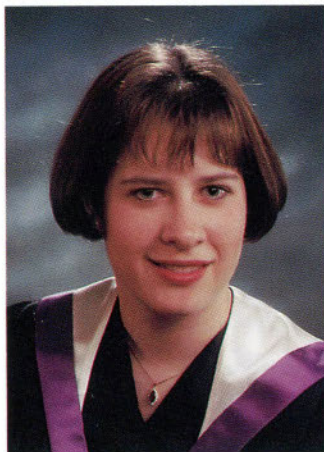


LORI ANDREWS

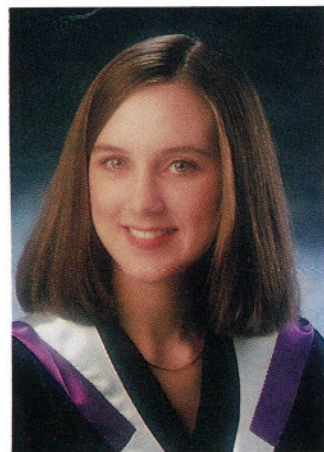
ERIC BAKER

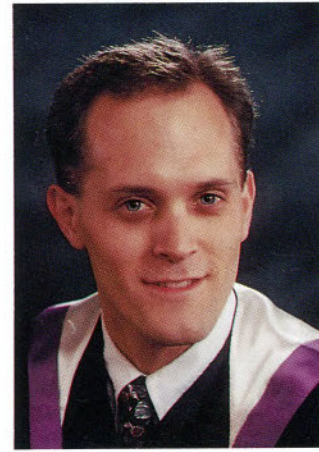


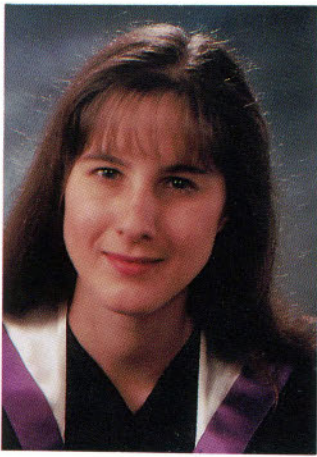
SHAWN BROWN

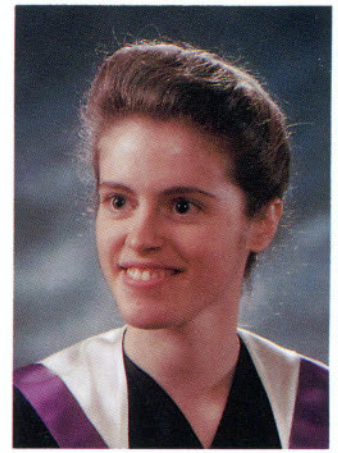


WANDA COLPA

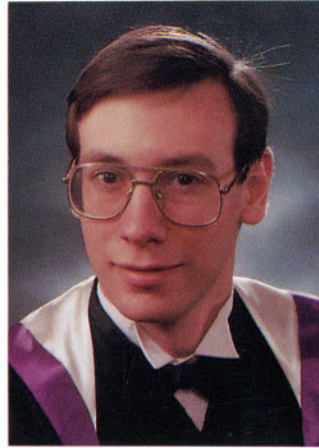
KELLY CONRAD

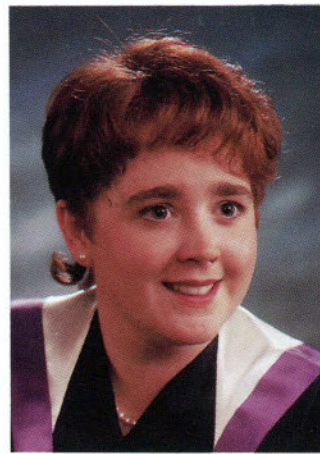


SARAH CUMMINGS

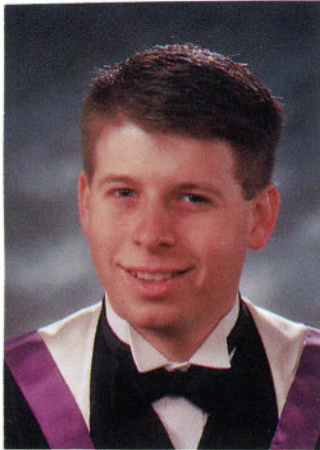
KIM DAUPHINEE

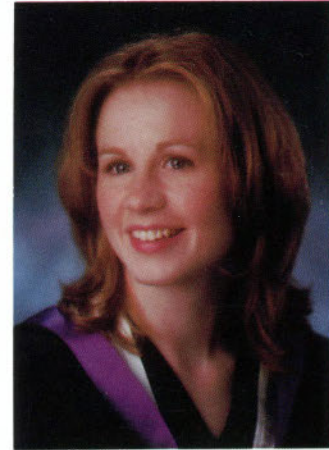


TIM DUNN

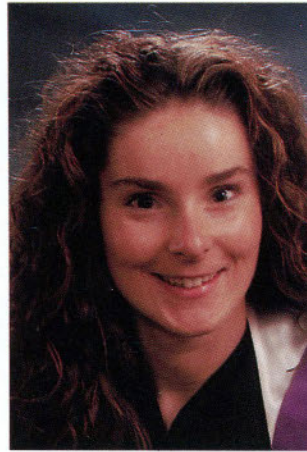


PERVEEN GULATI

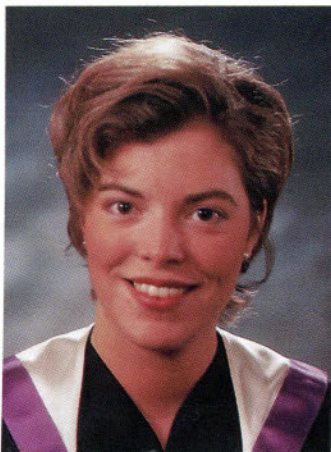


KATRINA KILLEN

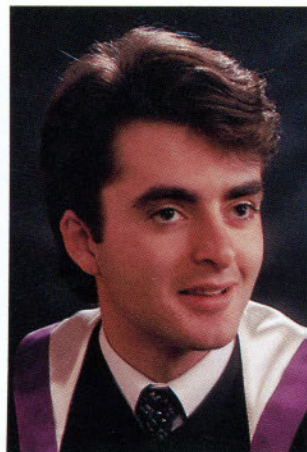
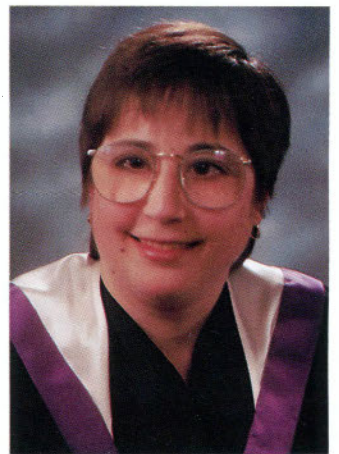


HEIDI LISTON

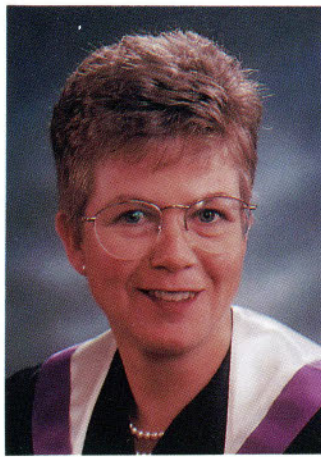


KAREN LAWSON

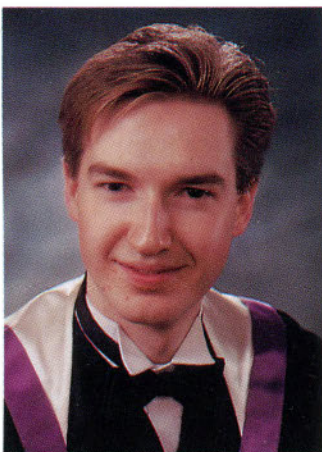
HEATHER MCDONALD

Skit night was held Friday Feb 9th. Social reps James Jonasson, Krista Dixon, and Kelly Miodowski did a fantastic job preparing this event.

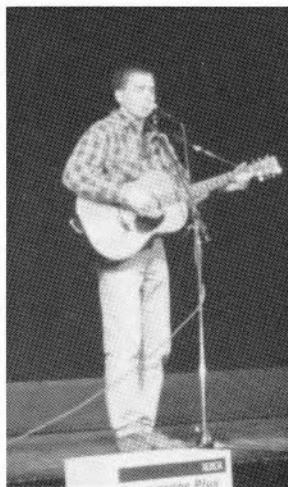
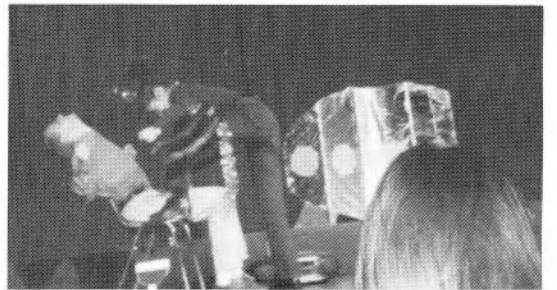
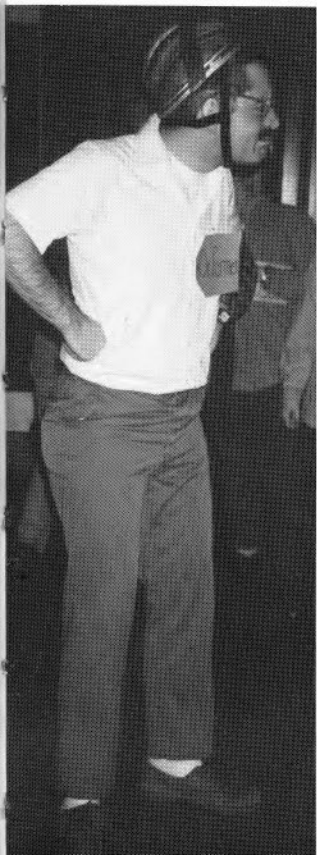
