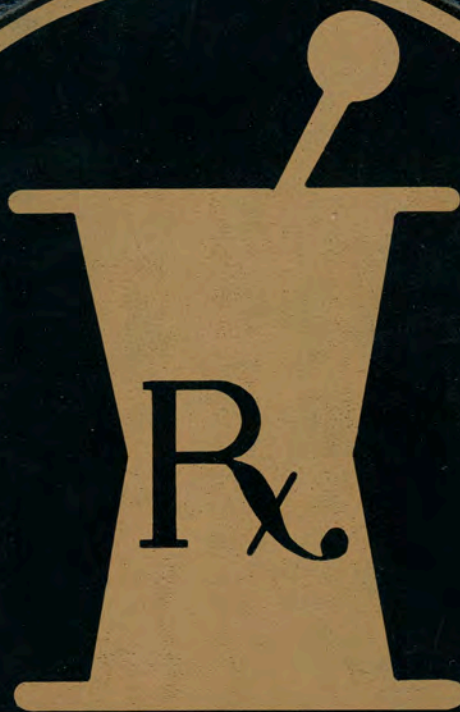


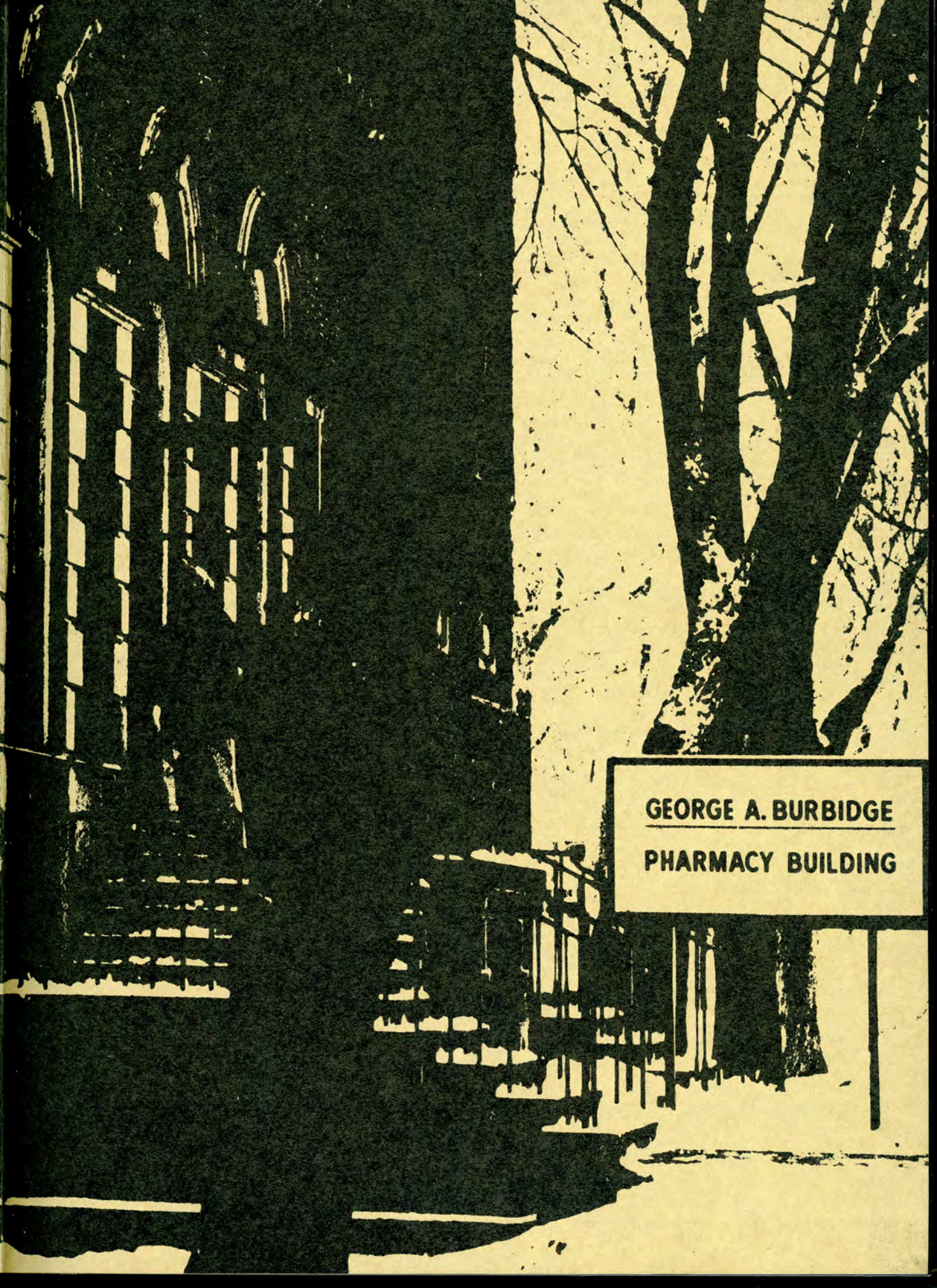

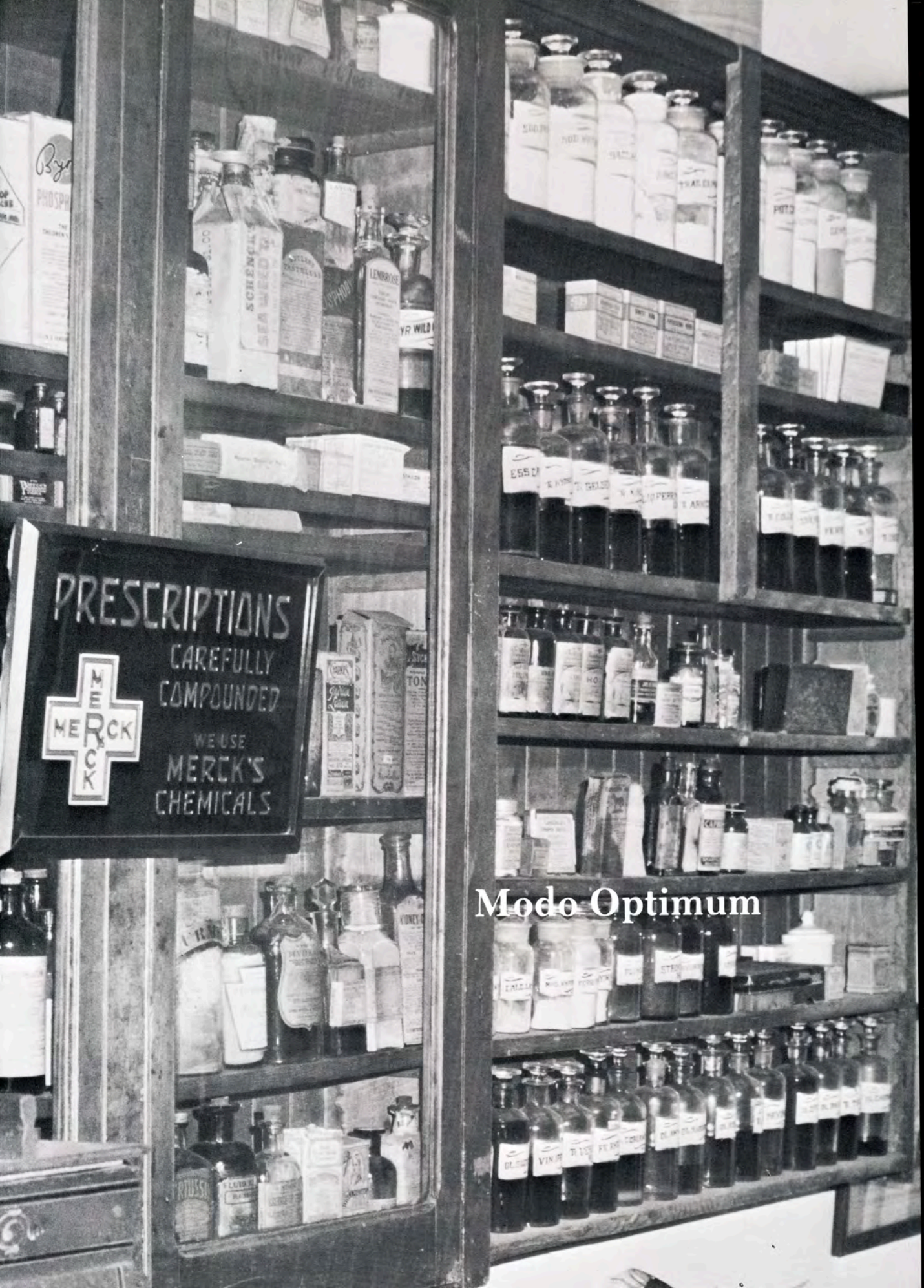

Director's Message

The first "Mortar and Pestle" was published when we moved into our present building four years ago. For this reason, I am particularly happy to learn that "Mortar and Pestle" is in print again this year. My faculty colleagues and I would like to take this opportunity to extend our best wishes and sincere congratulations to the Editor and her staff.

This has been a good year. I believe this fact is mainly due to the effort of your exceptionally capable student society executives. These fine ladies and gentlemen have provided the College, students as well as faculty members, with a wide range of extra-curricular activities. Many of the activities are indicative of the type of students most of you are. Your Big-Brother and Big-Sister project and the Pharmacy Week programmes showed that you have deep interest in the welfare of your fellow schoolmates entering the College for the first time. Your involvement in the national and provincial pharmaceutical organizations demonstrated your seriousness toward the profession. Your continuous representation in the Curriculum Committee indicated that you care about the type of education you are getting.

C.A.P.S.I. Report

This year has been one of growth and self-examination for the national Capsi executive, as well as, for the individual student societies across the country. At the CPhA conference in Edmonton in August, students were allowed membership in CPhA, and CAPSI was given one vote plus one for every 500 members on the Council Of Delegates. This was the beginning of a new strength which has pervaded our national organization since August, and at the first mid-year meeting in Toronto, Feb. 5-6, we hope to reassess our goals.

At Dal. , our two main goals this term have been to get as many students as possible interested in doing something for pharmacy and for others, and to improve our relationship with our provincial pharmacy societies. The first big step was a constitution change which, effective September 1973, means that every pharmacy student at Dal. will hold membership in the CPhA, CAPSI, and the Dal. Student Pharmacy Society. This was followed by projects such as the Big Brother - Big Sister Program, prepackaging drugs for Med-Aid, Pharmacy Week, Student Placement, and the special project (A Second To Look) for the May CPhA conference in Halifax. Also, students have been invited as observers to the council meetings of the N. B. and N. S. Pharmaceutical Societies. The panel discussion held during Pharmacy Week created the first chance for open dialogue between students and representatives from the CPhA, N. S. , and P. E. I.

We would like to thank all those students and professors who, by their own interest and energy, gave meaning to these projects. We hope that what has been accomplished this year will be improved upon in the years to come.

Student Council Representative's Report

I don't think there is any doubt that this has been a most important year for the Pharmacy Society. However, since I am primarily concerned with representing our students on Dalhousie Student Council, I will confine my remarks to this area.

I have had a challenging and enjoyable year on Council and like to think that a few things have been accomplished during my term of office. I do feel the need for more feedback from Pharmacy students, however. There are many interesting jobs available to enthusiastic students who wish to contribute to the well-being of the University as a whole, but few make use of these opportunities. We aren't any different from the other faculties in this respect, but it would be so much better if we could be concerned with Dalhousie as a whole and not just our little Pharmacy clique.

It has often seemed to me that the Faculties situated on the Forrest Campus (ie. Medicine, Dentistry, and Nursing, as well as Pharmacy) are being - not ignored - but perhaps under-rated by the Student Union, who appears to be primarily concerned with the Faculties of Arts and Science. I think this state of affairs is changing, though, and hopefully will continue to improve.

Specifically, on October 2, 1972, Council voted unanimously to ratify a vote taken by the Pharmacy students that makes membership in the Society compulsory, as well as, including the \$14.00 Society fees in the cost of tuition. This, I feel is a major breakthrough for our students as there will no longer be a distinction between members and non-members and everyone can participate in the activities without feeling that any "prejudice" is involved eg. non-members getting in free etc.

Later in the term, the Grants Committee awarded our Society \$300.00 after we presented our budget to them. This was the first time that we have ever been able to obtain money from the Student Union and indicates, to me at least, the increasing awareness on the part of the Council that a Pharmacy Society (and an active one at that) actually exists.

A large part of this is due to the presence of a number of concerned Pharmacy students at both of the aforementioned meetings. They were able to answer questions directed to them by Council members - who were very impressed with the turnout. Personally I appreciated the backing these students gave me and would like to take this opportunity to thank them.

Before I conclude this report, I would like to mention a system which I would like to see implemented in the future. That is, Student Council Representatives should, if possible, remain in office for two academic years. I know from experience that at least the first half of the year is spent getting over initial hesitancy in "speaking one's mind" and by the time one is "getting into it" and really able to make a contribution to Council the term is over and another greenhorn begins the same cycle. It is in my opinion that during a two year term our representative would be able to make much more progress in Student Politics and thus represent the Pharmacy students better. I am not suggesting a Constitution change as obviously there will be people who for various reasons find it impossible to remain on Council for more than a regular term. I merely think it would be a desirable situation and one that should be given consideration on Election Day.

In concluding this report, I want to thank you, the students, for giving me the chance to see how this University is being run. It certainly has been an experience!!

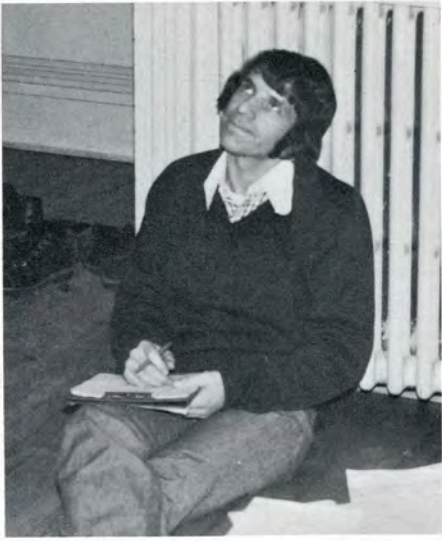

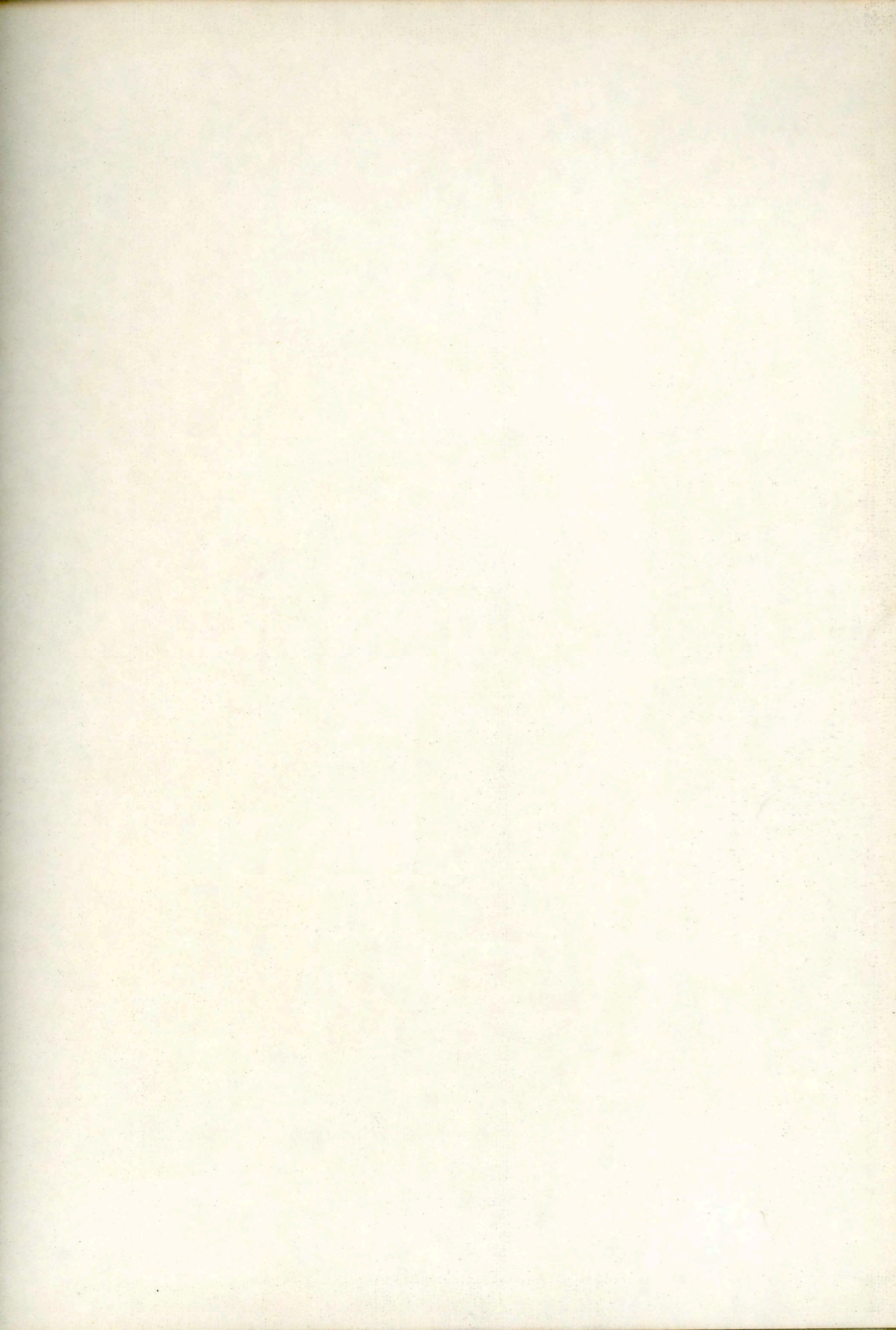
