

Deep in the bowels of the Dalhousie Arts Centre there is a teaching programme being conducted under the auspices of the Dalhousie Theatre Department, which is unique in Canada. The programme is the Costume Studies programme and the purpose is to train students as costumiers for the world of theatre.

After two years of study, graduates are able to look at a costume, sketch and produce it. Graduates from this programme are employed in theatres nationally and internationally. Many of the employees at the Shakespeare Festival in Stratford are graduates of this programme. Many students whose interest is more fashion oriented form their own clothing design firms.

Each year the staff and students combine to present a Fashion Show with a difference, to exhibit their work and to raise funds for the programme. This year's show is entitled ALL FOR LOVE and will feature a tribute to Charles Worth who was the founder of haute couture in Paris. Dresses will be made from the period]885 to]895. Everything the lady of the period would have worn from the skin out, including chemises, knickers, corsets, crinolines bustles, and dresses, will have had pattern drafted and garments produced by the first-year students.

Second-year students will be exhibiting ballet tutus made for the Halifax Dance Association and costumes produced for Dal Theatre Productions LOVE FOR ALL (original costumes designed by Robert Doyle.)

In addition, the works of a number of alumni of the programme, who are working in the contemporary fashion scene, will be featured.
