# ANNUAL MEETINGS

"Is the Alumni Association playing a worthwhile role in the life of the university?" was the subject of the President's report and the question asked by this year's Board of Directors. John Grant briefly outlined the program undertaken by the Board in 1974-75 to increase its awareness as to exactly what this role is and what it should be. In conjunction with this undertaking, the Ad Hoc Committee on Information and Community Relations presented the Board of Governors with its well-researched report.

Mr. Grant reviewed the work of the various Alumni committees. A tour of the Life Sciences Centre and the Alumni-Students' Council dinner were the projects of the Program Committee. The Alumni Student Relations Committee undertook a program of liaison with undergraduate students from out of town and a career counselling program at the high school level.

The Women's Division reported another financially successful year. In President Janet Wintermans' report, it was noted that a new piano was purchased for Shirreff Hall. In addition, the following sums of money were awarded: \$1000. in scholarships, \$450. to the Awards Office for bursaries, and \$275. in prizes. It was also voted at the group's Annual Meeting that a room be furnished in Shirreff Hall.

The Medical Alumni Association held a number of activities this past year. They hosted a reception for the Internes' graduating class, sponsored and funded visits to Dalhousie of premedical student societies from other Atlantic universities, and helped fund medical student scholarships during the summer months.

In his report, he also made mention of the computerization of the Alumni and Fund Office records which is presently being undertaken. This system will aid considerably in the efficient operation of the office.

# CONVOCATION

1545 Dalhousie students received degrees or diplomas at six separate convocation ceremonies in May of this year.

Of this number, 850 graduated with bachelors' degrees in Arts, Science, Commerce, Education, Engineering Physics and Music Education.

Health Professions graduated 218 students in Pharmacy, Physiotherapy, Physical Education and Nursing. (In addition to BNs, diplomas were given in Public Health and in Outpost Nursing.)


213 Graduate Studies' degrees were awarded. These covered Masters' degrees in Arts, Science, Business Administration, Public Administration, Social Work, Library Science, Law and Physical Education, PHDs, and certificates in Public Administration.

Dentistry graduated 22 students, and Dental Hygiene – 19.

The Medical School granted degrees to 91 doctors, and the Law School to 132 lawyers.

# **CAMPUS NOTES**

# NEW PROGRAMS AT DALHOUSIE

Dalhousie University will offer a fouryear course leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science (Health Education) beginning in September. The program, the only one of its kind in Atlantic Canada, will be provided through the School of Physical Education in the Faculty of Health Professions.

The Department of Economics is presently offering a course in health economics. Rapid growth in the size of the health care sector, accompanied by major innovations with respect to the financing and delivery of health care services has led to an increasing interest in the economic aspects of health care. The course was first offered in the Spring of 1974.

A new program especially designed to give people employed in the Nova Scotia vocational schools an opportunity to earn a Bachelor of Education degree through part-time study is being offered by the University. To date, the program has attracted more than 40 candidates,

# DAL-MOUNT SUMMER SCHOOLS

The joint Dalhousie-Mount Saint Vincent six-week Summer Sessions are offering 121 full credit-equivalent classes covering both undergraduate and graduate level courses. In order to assist those persons engaged in part-time study as well as full-time students with summer jobs,

more than 2/3 of the classes are being held in the evening.

In addition, several special programs are being offered. These include Dalhousie's second language bursary program and the Canadian Mathematical Congress; and Mount Saint Vincent's Family Life Institute and special events related to International Women's Year.

Non-credit programs are also available. These include athletic schools, audiovisual and computer courses, drama workshops for teachers and secretarial refreshers.

### **APPOINTMENTS**

Dr. Armand Peter Ruderman, presently at the University of Toronto, has been appointed Dean of the newly established Faculty of Administrative Studies. In this capacity, Dr. Ruderman will be responsible for the School of Business Administration (formerly the Department of Commerce), the School of Public Administration (formerly a unit of the Political Science Department), the School of Library Service and the Maritime School of Social Work (both formerly under the jurisdiction of the Faculty of Graduate studies).

Dr. Robert Dan Foster has been appointed Director of Dalhousie's Government Studies Programme. This programme, established more than two years ago with a Ford Foundation grant, is aimed at providing the Nova Scotia

Government, as well as other governments, with a number of independent studies related to medium and long-range policy questions.

Dalhousie University's Department of Religion, which has been a one-man operation since its establishment two years ago, is to be expanded this summer. Joining Dr. W. Cantwell Smith, Chairman, are Dr. C. Thompson S. Faulkner, presently at the University of Chicago, and Dr. Ravi Ravindra of Dalhousie's Department of Physics. In addition to his new responsibilities, Dr. Ravindra will continue his work in Physics.

Dr. Alexander H. Leighton, presently at the Harvard School of Public Health, will join the Faculty of Medicine this summer as a professor of psychiatric and preventive medicine, and as a National Health research scientist. While his work at Dalhousie will be largely concerned with research in the social psychiatry field, Dr. Leighton will also do some teaching at the medical school. In addition, he will help further develop a training program in psychiatric epidemiology — a program that has been successful at Harvard but developed only to a limited extent in Canada.

The new Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Science is Dr. James Gray, professor and chairman of the Department of English at Dalhousie since 1972. Dr. Gray succeeds Dr. Guy R. MacLean, who has been Dean since 1969. Dr. MacLean was appointed Vice-President (Academic and Research) in October last year but has continued to serve as Dean since that time.

# SAVING TIME, EFFORT, SPACE AND MONEY

Dr. Robert A.L. Macbeth, for the last 15 years chairman of the Department of Surgery at the University of Alberta, has been appointed to three senior posts in the Faculty of Medicine at Dalhousie. Dr. Macbeth will be a professor in the Department of Surgery, associate dean of the faculty, and director of post-graduate medical education for New Brunswick. He will be based at the Saint John General Hospital.

CANADA COUNCIL GRANT TO DAL

The Canada Council has awarded a five-year research grant of \$852,000. to the University. The award goes toward a research program that will focus on an analysis of segmentation and disadvantage in work, examining especially the marginal work world, its relationship to the central work world, and its role in the Atlantic region. The grant will be administered by the Institute of Public Affairs, and the research team will be based at the Institute.

### **CLIPPINGS**

Two Dalhousie Students, William Ross McKinnon of Pictou and Peter Kenneth Stokoe of Halifax, were among the top 10 of the 119 honours physics students from all Canadian universities who wrote the National Physics Examination this year. The pair placed fourth and sixth and all of the Dalhousie students who took part in the exam placed in the top half. McKinnon and Stokoe graduated in

May and both plan to continue their studies — McKinnon at Dalhousie and Stokoe at Stanford University.

Dr. Donald John Ecobichon, Associate Professor of Pharmacology at Dalhousie, has received the Frank R. Blood award for the best toxicological paper to appear in the Journal of Toxicology and Applied Pharmacology during 1974.

Sales from Dr. Sonia Jones' book, What You Always Wanted to Know About Spanish Cooking, will again send three Dalhousie students to Spain for the summer. Dr. Jones is Chairman of the Spanish Department at Dalhousie.

A testimonial dinner was held early in May to honour Mrs. Evelyn Holmes on her retirement from the Dalhousie Art Gallery. Mrs. Holmes had a ten-year association with the Art Gallery as curator, assistant director and acting director.

Dr. John C. Pooley, co-ordinator of undergraduate studies at the School of Physical Education at Dalhousie University, has accepted an invitation to represent Canada and to be one of the founding members of an advisory council to the Institute of Comparative Physical Education. Under the auspices of the institute, last year Dr. Pooley studied in Moscow. This year he will continue his studies in Israel and Sweden.

The Alumni Association once again took part at Intro-Dal, the University's three-day open house. This year, volunteer alumni manned a Career Information booth.

### **SLOWPOKE FOR 1976**

Dalhousie is one of four Canadian universities that will receive a Safe Low-Power Critical Experiment (SLOWPOKE) Nuclear Reactor. The reactor will cost approximately \$200,000 and funds for its purchase will be donated by the Atomic Energy Control Board. Slowpoke will be used to discover trace elements in various substances and it will also provide short lived radio isotopes which are suitable for the treatment of cancer. Arrival is expected for the spring of 1976.



# SAVING TIME, EFFORT, SPACE AND MONEY

Beginning in June last year, the Systems Design staff began a detailed study of the Alumni and Fund Office's operation. The results of the study indicated a real need for computerization of records to help the staff cope with its daily housekeeping tasks.

The Alumni and Fund Office had a problem.

Its quarters in the Student Union Building were spacious when the staff moved there, from the Arts and Administration Building. But that was nearly eight years ago.

And, as Bruce Irwin, Director of Alumni Affairs, said: "A few years ago, when Dalhousie had a relatively small enrolment, it was not difficult to maintain the alumni file manually."

In the last couple of years, however, the second-floor office was literally being taken over by filing cabinets.

The staff was faced with a massive record-keeping system that involved 40,000 alumni cards. "Now, more than 1500 new alumni join our ranks each year, and we have had to find a more efficient method of acquiring and storing information on each one," said Mr. Irwin.

One file was growing at an annual rate of 10 per cent, another at five per cent. This meant an overburdening increase in manual tracing and filing.

So the office enlisted the aid of the university's Systems Design and Development Services staff.

The problems were identified, and recommendations to Alumni Director Irwin were accepted, and computerization is well under way.

"The computer will eliminate a great deal of the manual work and reduce the amount of space needed for the storage of information."

Once the recommendations had been approved, it was full steam ahead for computer analyst Bernice MacDonald who had made the initial study. Implementation was then the key to success and the central focus was training those personnel involved in records maintenance.

STAGE ONE: The why and the how of designing a form so that data could be loaded into the computer; the introduction of computer jargon into the general instruction process; and generally making the office staff feel comfortable with the new technology.

STAGE TWO: The staff were now rounding the corner in their training program. They learned to edit data once the computer cards had been punched, to read output, and pass corrections.

STAGE THREE: The creation and updating of a master file of records. The target is to have about one-third of the traceable cards completed by the end of May, with all active alumni cards on the master list by the end of this year.

What did computerization of records really do for the Alumni and Fund operation?

The most significant features by far are the speed of reporting and the sophisticated selection. This is best illustrated through the interface with the student record-keeping system which contains the list of potential annual graduates (and future alumni). What used to take three months to accomplish (getting these names on the Alumni lists) can now be

managed in one-two weeks. The only real time expended is in correlating and checking names.

Space had become a major problem in the Alumni Office. Where there used to be four or five cards for each name, there is now only one file per person. The master record will be housed in two filing cabinets displacing a total area of about 72" X 18" — a reduction of space previously allocated for filed information to one quarter of what it was.

Computerized mailing labels have also entered the picture. If you can envision the time and energy consumed in preparing mass mailings of alumni publications, notices and fund announcements to 17,000 alumni, you can appreciate how computerized mailing labels will help the staff.

Change is often difficult to accept and implement, but Alumni personnel are doing well. They are keen to learn and have been able to put together a working team. Everyone is trained to do everyone else's job; the jobs are interchangeable and each serves as a back-up to the other.

Pat Bewers, the director of Systems Design says that computerization provides a level of service through efficiency — "It's the economic way to go." At Dalhousie the Systems Design mechanism is a campus service with a useful facility at its disposal.

### UNIVERSITY ARCHIVES SEEKS ADDITIONAL MATERIAL

Are there any old class photographs lying around your house? Do you still have a program from an early Dalhousie production? Did you save your 1934 copy of Pharos?

If you do have some old material relating to Dalhousie, Dr. Charles Armour, the University Archivist, would be most happy to add it to the collection presently in the University Archives. Dr. Armour is particularly looking for early photographs relating to Dalhousie pictures of societies (eg. the Commerce Society); fraternities and sororities; sports teams; clubs (eg. the Dalhousie Gazette staff, the Student Union members, theatre groups, etc.); class photographs; graduation pictures; pictures of buildings, etc. In addition to photographs, papers of former graduates and staff members; programs of theatrical presentations, music recitals, special lectures, memorial or commemorative services; letters of famous Dalhousians; student handbooks; and copies of Pharos are wanted. The Archives already has an extensive collection of Dalhousie material but there are some gaps to be filled. For example, there are no copies at all of Pharos for the years 1934, 1947 and 1965.

Dr. Armour assures readers that all material is welcome and will be used. He adds that should you have a photograph which you do not want to give up, the Archives is able to make reproductions of the photographs it receives. It is possible, therefore, to add to the collection without depriving the owner of a treasured photograph. Material should be sent to Dr. Armour's attention, c/o the University Archives, 5th Floor Killam Library, Dalhousie University. The office can also be reached at 424-3651.

In addition to supplying the Archives with material, you can be of assistance in still another way. Several of the people in the early photographs are not identified, and if you were to drop in to see Dr. Armour or his assistant, they would be most pleased to have you sit down with them to help identify some of these people. Pictures taken before 1927 are particularly difficult to identify; following that year, the publication of the yearbook aided greatly in the identification process.

Previous to his position as University Archivist, Dr. Armour, a native of New Brunswick, attended Mount Allison and Dalhousie Universities where he graduated with a BSC and an MSC in Chemistry, respectively. He later attended London University where he received his PHD. Since his arrival here in July 1970, he has been busily collecting Dalhousie material. The results of his efforts to date

can be seen in a special display now on exhibit in the Special Collections Area and in the Main Lobby of the Killam Memorial Library. The display opened in May and runs through the summer months.

The exhibit covers a general history of the University and includes such items as the special commemorative silver trowel which was used by the Earl of Dalhousie to lay the cornerstone for Dalhousie College on the Grand Parade Grounds on May 22, 1820; a copy of the first edition of the Dalhousie Gazette, published in 1869; and the special convocation invitation which marked the laying of the cornerstone for the Forrest Building, the first building on the present campus.

A special section devoted entirely to the Classes of '25, '35, and '50 was of particular interest during the May reunion period and attracted many visitors.

### HORACE READ -A GREAT TEACHER

The bulk of the display consists mainly of photographs and special papers. There are a number of pictures of the old Dalhousie buildings showing both exteriors and interiors. Perhaps one of the most interesting of these is a picture taken in the Old Law Building (now the Faculty Club) following the Halifax explosion in 1917. There are group photographs dating back many years and a number of class pictures. One of the largest groups of pictures is the Dr. Luther MacKenzie (MD'02) collection of football photographs. The earliest photograph in the collection shows the graduating class of 1870. Included in the picture is a shot of the college, a group shot of all the Dalhousie students of 1869-70, individual pictures of the teaching staff, and shots of the year's graduates - all four of them! A number of the early photographs in the collection are the work of Notman, Halifax's first photographer.

Included in the exhibit are some early histories of the University, notably those of John Albert Bell (BA'83) and Dr. Shurnan of the English Department. Some of the writings and correspondence of famous Dalhousians such as Archibald MacMechan and James de Mille are among the papers in the collection. As well, there are early programs and handbooks.

In addition to general Dalhousie material such as that mentioned above, the Archives consists of the business archives of the University (which, in fact, makes up the bulk of the Archives); the theatre archives; private manuscripts of persons connected with Dalhousie (in particular, former presidents and staff members); and other miscellaneous material.

Dr. Horace Emerson Read, O.C., O.B.E., Q.C., BA., LLB., LLM., S.J.D., LLD., Dean of Law (1950-1964) and Vice-President (1964-1969) of Dalhousie University, died in Halifax on February 26, 1975, at the age of 78.

"The full scope of Horace Read's achievement would fill a sizeable volume. Among his enduring monuments are his many published works on legal subjects, which are accepted authorities virtually all over the world. His profound scholarship and indefatigable zest for work led him into many other fields, in which he likewise earned distinction and respect." (Halifax Herald, March 1, 1975)

Dr. Read was born in Port Elgin New Brunswick. He enrolled at Acadia University in 1915, but interrupted his undergraduate education in order to serve in the First World War. He returned to Acadia and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in 1921. After graduation from Dalhousie University Law School in 1924, he attended Harvard where he earned his LLM in 1925.

Between 1925 and 1933, Dr. Read taught at Dalhousie and Osgoode Hall Law Schools. He returned to Harvard and received his doctorate in 1933, following which he continued his legal work in both the United States and Canada — teaching, writing and serving as an advisor on numerous government committees.

World War Two intervened and by 1945, Dr. Read had the rare distinction of having served in both World Wars and in all three branches of the Canadian armed forces as well as the American Air Force. For his work in directing a complete revision of Canadian naval regulations, he

was awarded the Order of the British Empire.

Following the War, Dr. Read returned to the United States where he taught at the University of Minnesota until 1950, at which time he accepted the offer of Dalhousie University to return as Dean of Law, Weldon Professor of Law and first Director of the Nova Scotia Centre for Legislative Research. He continued in this position until 1964 when he became Vice-President of Dalhousie University.

Upon retirement from the office of Vice-President in 1969, although he was 71 years old, Dr. Read returned to his real love — the teaching of law. In 1972 he still carried a heavy part-time schedule but gave up full-time teaching in order to complete a history of the law-school. He was working on the history at the time of his death.

In his lifetime, Horace Read was an advisor to governments both in Canada and abroad, an advisor to the United Nations, a representative for Canada in international conferences and on commissions, a member and officer of many learned societies, a recipient of four honorary degrees and of the Order of Canada, a renowned writer of legal works, and a public servant of the highest order. But it is probably as a teacher of law that Horace Read would choose to be remembered.

# FORMER ALUMNI NEWS EDITOR DIES

### TUITION AND RESIDENCE FEES TO INCREASE



Kathleen Roberts has been appointed Assistant Director of Alumni Affairs at Dalhousie. She replaces C.E. (Ted) Coldwell who held the position since January 1974 and who has started a new career as Staff Photographer with the Edmonton Planetarium.

A native of Montreal, Ms. Roberts graduated from Dalhousie with a BA in 1970. Since that time she has worked at the University in the office of the Director of Planning and Development, in the President's Office, and most recently as a trainee in the Systems Design Group.

In addition to her duties as general assistant to the Director of Alumni Affairs, Ms. Roberts will edit the Alumni News, impliment the program of the Association Board of Directors, aid existing branches and help establish new ones, and assist with the Alumni Office switch to a computer system.

Rev. George Farquhar, well-known Nova Scotian minister and journalist, died June 8, 1975, in Halifax at the age of 94.

Born in Wetherby England, Mr. Farquhar attended Dalhousie and received a BA in 1907. He graduated from Pine Hill Divinity Hall and attained his MA from Dalhousie in 1910.

For the next 15 years, he served in the ministry and in the war as a chaplain with the Canadian Army.

Mr. Farquhar returned to study law at Dalhousie, graduating in 1927. While studying, he found his way into journalism and wrote a regular column in the Halifax Chronicle. Following graduation, he became editor-in-chief of the paper, holding that position for 10 years. From 1938 until his retirement in 1955, Mr. Farquhar was a commissioner of the Nova Scotia Board of Public Utilities.

In his life, he had a long and close association with Dalhousie. He served for 16 years on the Board of Governors and edited the Alumni News for a number of years. In 1972, he was awarded an honourary life membership in the Alumni Association.

The Editor wishes to express her appreciation for the assistance given her by the Dalhousie Information and Public Relations Office. Special thanks go to Mr. Derek Mann, the Director, whose material has been much "borrowed" and to his assistant, Mrs. Pam MacWhinnie, whose cheerful help has made this job immeasurably easier.

Rising costs in all areas have forced Dalhousie University to increase tuition and residence fees.

Dr. Henry D. Hicks, the President, said that the increases, which range from 5% to 11%, were regrettable and had been reluctantly approved by the Board of Governors.

In 1975-76, all undergraduate students will pay \$40 more, an increase of just under 6% on the basic fee. This brings the new basic fee to \$720. Graduate and professional students — in the Faculties of Graduate Studies, Medicine, Dentistry and Law — will pay between 8% to 9.6% more. Their new basic fees range from \$675 to \$775. In addition, all students pay a \$50 Student Union fee and varied faculty society fees.

Residence fees at Howe and Shirreff Halls will go up \$138 — about 11% — for all rooms. The new range is \$1336 to \$1420. These fees include three meals a day, and \$86 of the \$138 increase will go to cover increased food service costs. Residence fees in Ardmore Hall and in the graduate houses will increase by \$52, making the new range \$596 to \$660. Meals are not included in these residences.

Higher maintenance, renovation and repair costs, more expensive equipment and supplies, salary increases in all sectors of the university, and particularly the University's fuel oil bill, which has almost doubled in the last three years, were factors in the increased budget.
