



1978 Rink razed; 1982 Rink raised

It was mid-evening Friday May 12, 1978. The flames licked skyward as the venerable Dalhousie Rink, erected in 1949 in memory of the Dalhousie students, faculty and staff who gave their lives for their country in World War II, was quickly decimated by fire.

All that was left on Saturday morning, as Dalhousie alumni, faculty, staff and students and South End community people gathered for a look, was a mass of twisted, smoldering steel.

THE RINK was gone.

It has taken four long years, but the NEW RINK is soon to be completed. In March 1982, should all go well, the rink will be ready for occupancy.

Ken Bellemare, Director of Athletics, recalls the fateful night. "I was attending the Physical Education and Recreational Students banquet and dance and had just left the Student Union Building. Someone told me the rink was on fire and I hustled right over. I could see the flames through the windows and within minutes, the flames were coming through the roof. It was an awesome yet mesmerizing sight."

Bellemare continued, "Our biggest concern was the embers going to the Phys Ed Building (Arts Annex). Staff was called to remove valuable papers and books to the Faculty Club. We checked the Old Gym and saw flames licking at the windows of the offices. It was amazing that the door

between the gym and the rink was charred on the rink side but the paint still remained on the gym side because the firemen continually sprayed it with water. It was the last bastion of defense in saving the Old Gym." With the old rink gone, first thoughts were replacement. Jim Sykes, University Planner, was on hand the night of the fire. "During the time of the fire, I stood with people talking about the relocation of the Rink. Dalplex was under construction and we were debating whether the rink would be best situated in the Dalplex parking lot, nearer the SUB or in the old location."

After much study and soul-searching, the old location was decided as the best spot. Sykes was not thrilled because he felt field expansion would be cramped. There were proposals that the rink be built where the Arts Annex is located and down the bank toward the field. Dalplex parking lot, of course, was suggested but was felt unsuitable because of the difficulties in placing the athletic complex originally.

Finally the decision was made to place it in the old location with a different look. Design work was begun. **Dr. Henry Hicks**, President of Dalhousie at the time, had visited University of Maine at Orono and was impressed with its rink design. Daniel Tully and Associates, designers of that structure, were called from their Cambridge, Mass. office and prepared drawings of a Dalhousie Rink proposal.

Burtt Barteaux, the architect who had labored so long with Dalplex, was hired to work with Tully and their joint venture began.

There have been the usual building problems — budgets, starting delays — but since construction started in May 1981, the project has been on schedule and the Rink is due for opening in late spring 1982. The Dalhousie Tigers hockey club will makes its first appearance in Fall 1982 but the Rink will get considerable use in late spring and summer.

Ted Brown, Chairman of the Building and Grounds Committee of the Board of Governors of the University, sees many uses of the new facility. "It is a sorely needed recreational facility. It will be used for varsity play also for interfac hockey and broomball, student, faculty and staff skating, and for public skating. There will be rental time available as well. The rink will get the same heavy use the old one did."

Brown is excited about the look of the Rink. "It will face on LeMarchant Street instead of South as previously. The roof design is unique. It is a series of 32 hyperbolic paraboloid wood shells on laminated wood beams. It is a combination of structure and aesthetics."

According to Sykes, who has seen many, "It is one of the best rinks in which I have ever been."

There are many economies being shown in the new rink. The changing rooms will be located in the Old Gym, as the two buildings will be connected. There will be no insulation and there will be dehumidification but not air conditioning. However, the concrete floor will be heated so exams may be written in the rink during the winter. Other exterior finishes and interior finishes have been cut back because of budget restrictions.

"The Rink will cost about \$2.2 million," says Sykes. "Of that amount, one million dollars is coming from insurance, 80% of the balance is supplied from government funding (provincial) and the University is responsible for the remainder (about \$250.000)."

There will be seating for about 1500 spectators, which is a disappointment to many university people who feel a winning hockey team will draw many more than that. However, the Forum and Metro Centre are there with larger capacities for major games.

One Dalhousie alumnus is heavily involved with the construction. **Peter Corkum of** H.W. Corkum Limited is construction manager. Peter played football and hockey for Dal in the late '50's and early '60's. He has worked closely with Tully and Barteaux to bring the building in on time. It looks like he will hit the target.

Dalhousie joins Mindpower campaign

That's the Canadian theme of a North American campaign launched in October to focus public attention on the contribution higher education makes to society and to encourage public commitment to education.

The mindpower campaign has been organized by the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE), a professional organization of people working in external relations in universities and colleges in the U.S., Canada and overseas.

The campaign will involve at least 1,000 institutions throughout North America, and it will be the first time that Canadian institutions have joined together to mount a national campaign for higher education.

There will be a national media campaign, using television, radio and print advertising, promoting the Canada's Energy is Mindpower theme.

At the University of Toronto, for example, the mindpower theme is being tied in with up-coming events - an alumni homecoming, a humanities media tour and anniversary celebrations.

Departments at Dalhousie are being encouraged to use the mindpower campaign theme for their seminars, conferences, forums and special events. The Information Office has offered to assist in any activities departments wish to undertake.

The Canadian campaign will culminate with an international higher education day celebration in July when the CASE assembly meets in Toronto.

Bellemare, who has been under pressure from all sides for ice time through his Athletics and Recreation Services Department, will be happy to see the doors open. "It is exciting to know we'll have our own facility again. The makeshift arrangement of finding ice wherever we could has been tough on everyone — from varsity to intramural — and has eliminated recreational skating. Our hockey team


has done well in the four years we've been without the facility and, in fact, we finished first in the Conference in our first year without our own rink. But it will mean added spirit on campus as the students find it easier to get to our own rink and will bring back many alumni because it will be the DALHOUSIE rink."

Brown estimated the building may come in about \$200,000 over budget but feels

the money can be raised somewhere. "We cut as much as we could and wouldn't permit the reduction of size of the building any further. We did that at Dalplex and it was a mistake. We'll build in the space we want and finish it later if necessary."

It will soon be mid-evening in March 1982. The lights will be glowing, the hiss of skates will be heard over the clean white ice, and the Dalhousie Rink will again be in operation.




