The Council of the Champlain Society will be meeting later this month, and I shall report that you are willing to edit a Perkins volume for us, provided that the work can be fitted into your very busy writing schedule. I shall tell the members that the earliest possible date is the summer of 1956, but I shall also tell them that I hope very much indeed that you may be able to undertake the job for us at that time.

We are recommending that the editorial fees paid to people who prepare volumes for us should be raised to a modest extent, and if the change is approved I shall feel slightly less guilty about asking a professional writer to do a job for us.
