"THE BOUNTIFUL SEA AROUND US --- WHO WILL CONTROL IT?"

Is the deep sea the common heritage of mankind, as stated in a 1970 UN resolution, or should its impressive resources belong to those countries which are rich enough and technologically able to develop them? The continental shelf, national and international fishing zones, scientific exploration, pollution problems, transit rights for merchant and military ships -- all are subjects of concern to the UN Law of the Sea Conference. Now in its sixth year, the conference has witnessed some of the most significant international negotiations in history.

Dr. Daniel Cheever, of the University of Pittsburgh's Graduate School of International Affairs, will moderate the panel discussion and give a summary of progress to date. The conflicting points of view of the developing countries and of industry will be presented in a specific discussion of deep sea-bed mining, with Dr. Manjula Shyam, Assistant Professor of Political Science at George Williams College, representing the developing countries. James L. Johnston, Senior Economist with Standard Oil Company (Indiana), will present his perspective on the proposed treaty. From 1972-75 Mr. Johnston served with the U.S. delegation to the UN Conference on the Law of the Sea. The final panelist, Dr. Elisabeth Borgese, an official observer with the Austrian delegation, will reflect on progress of the conference toward the establishment of a new regime of international law.

Miss Carson died in 1964 at the age of 56.

Dear Mrs. Borgese:

I am sorry it has taken us so long to respond to your letter of August 15th. Our program chairman, Peggy Rea, who has been communicating with you, has asked me to write, since she is currently out of town.

We are delighted that you will be the key speaker and a member of the panel discussion for our Pittsburgh Wellesley Club benefit on November 30, 1979. We had hoped that Senator Claiborne Pell would also join us, but he was unable to give a firm commitment for that date. I have enclosed a copy of the newsletter sent recently to the 350 members of our club, which describes in some detail the program we have planned.

Insight '79 is the fifth in a series of benefits sponsored by our group--all designed with a dual purpose--to bring increased knowledge and understanding of a specific challenging subject to the community, ~~had~~ to raise money for our alma mater, Wellesley College. Our goal really is to further scholarships~~s~~ in a variety of ways. We are indebted to you for your willingness to speak for a fee which we realize is not as high as you would normally charge.

In the past our audience (from 300-500 people) has been broad-based, considering that it is a benefit and is priced accordingly. We expect that our 1979 subject, "The Sea--Common Heritage of Mankind?" will appeal to an even wider group than usual, with international law, the economic and energy potential of the oceans, and the environment of the sea, as significant sub-topics. Chatham students will be admitted free of charge.

In regards to your participation on the panel: after Dan Cheever provides the historical perspective and summary of progress to date of the UN Law of the Sea Conference, representatives of industry and of the Group of '77 will present their very specific views and positions on the subject of deep seabed mining, discussing some of the economic, political, and environmental implications of such. We would then ask you to comment, from your perspective as an official observer to the conference, on the impact the conference has had toward the establishment of a new international order. There will then be some time for informal interplay among the panelists, followed by an audience question and answer period--all of this dependent, of course, on Dan's particular style of moderating.

Your magnificent book, The Drama of the Oceans, was impossible to track down at our local libraries (someone became enamored of it and never returned it?) but several of us read excerpts available in periodicals, and decided to order a copy from Harry Abrams. The ideas presented in your final chapter seem well suited to the topic for the evening, "The Fragile Sea Around Us--Who Will Preserve It?" (We really mean "How will we preserve it?" as well as "Who will be responsible?"). Whatever specific direction you choose to go will be satisfactory to us, but if you have any questions about this, please don't hesitate to write.

We have explored transportation from Halifax, and realize that if you are traveling from there, you will have to arrive in Pittsburgh on the 29th. We will try to set up an interview with our educational TV talk show "Lyceum" and/or with our local TV "Good Morning Pittsburgh" show, unless you indicate that you would not like to do this. If there are people in Pittsburgh with whom you would like to meet, and we can help you arrange this, please let us know. Unless you specify otherwise, we will be responsible for planning (hopefully not overplanning!) your morning on November 30th. Does sightseeing appeal at all? Please feel free to say that you would like to stay in bed and do nothing!

We can reserve a hotel room for the nights of November 29th and 30th, or we can offer you the hospitality of Dan Cheever and his wife, May, who would very much like to have you as a guest in their home. Please let us know your preference.

We suggest that you make your own airline reservations and then forward the details to us so that we can reimburse you. You will, of course, be met at The Pittsburgh International Airport.
