Dear Mr. Raddall:

I have just had the pleasure of reading your book "Roger Sudden" based on the early settlers of Halifax.

As one of the descendents of those first settlers, I have been seeking some information on the Giffin family. About the oldest tembstones I can find in St. Faul's Cemetery are those of Simon Giffin, his widow Jane and a brother John, and the late Dr. Martell showed me the card index of these in the Archives here.

I have always been told that they were passengers on the "Sphinx", but the Archives here, while they have a record of these who came in the transports, but when it comes to the Sphinx it just says: Lord Cornwallis and his suite".

I am wondering if you had obtained from the Colonial Office in London, the mess of those who came over on the "Sphinx" with Lord Cornwallis, and if there were any diffins among them.

I have read the Will of Simon Giffin and also that of George Giffin in the Probate Court here. The descendents of George Giffin moved to Shelburne County. They built schooners and sailed them to the Labrador. On the way back on one trip they took shelter in what they called Isaac's Harbour, maned after the only settler they found there, a negro by the name of Isaac. They liked the place so well that two of George's sons moved to that place and were the first white settlers there.

Any information you can let me have as to how they first came to Halifax would be greatly appreciated.
