Dear Tom:

We have a slight problem in connection with the photographs in FOOTSTEPS ON OLD FLOORS. Normally we print a book letterpress, and if there are photographs we print them separately and insert them in group of two, four, or eight photos." Because you wanted five phtographs to be used, we were considering printing the book offset, that is, running the pictures right in with the text and scattering them through the book, roughly one for each story. However, offsetting would raise the price of the book substantially, so I strongly urge you to delete one of the pictures: in that way we can print letterpress with a four page illustration insert and keep the price down.

If this is agreeable, please let me know which picture we should cut. We have a list of illustrations (copy enclosed) from Dave Manuel. Will you be supplying captions, or do you want us to run the illustration title under the pictures as captions?

True tales of mystery on land sea

and

1. "Addentures of H.M.S.Blonde". An interesting sidelight on the American Revolution, revealed for the first time. When news of the plight of Washington at Valley Forge reached Paris in the early months of 1778, the French frigate "Due de Choiseul" was sent across the Atlantic with a carge of cannon, muskets, ammunition, clothing and provisions, enough for 5,000 men. She was intercepted off the Nova Scotia coast by the British frigate "Blonde", and she ran ashore and after a hopeless fight surrendered. As passengers she had a number of French officers on their way to join Washington's army, one bearing a letter from American agent Silas Deane in Paris, addressed to Gouverneur Morris of the Continental Congress. It was the first proof of the hitherto secret alliance between France and the young United States. Subsequently two Yankee privateers made a bold attempt to carry off the cargo from the wreek, and actually got away with some of it.

2. "Murders aboard the Herbert Fuller". The macabre ax-slaying of an American captain, his wife, and his second officer, while asleep in their berths one night in 1896 on a voyage from Boston to South America. The only persons who could have done it were the First Mate and the helmsman of the watch, each of whome acoused the other. The story gives a detailed account of the murders, the subsequent wanderings of the ship towing the bodies in a boat astern, the arrests at Halifax, the court trials at Boston, and the way in which the real murderer escaped the death penalty and eventually won a complete pardon.

3. "Grey Owl". The first authentic account of an impostor famous in the 1930's, the Englishman whose real name was Archie Belaney but who posed

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as a Canadian half-breed Indian hero of War One. He fooled all sorts of people from Canadian army doctors to the King and Queen of England, had his portrait painted by the great Sir John Lavery, wrote books that sold by the hundred thousand, gave lectures in Indian costume all over Canada, Britain, and the United States, and kept up the hear with success until the day he died.

4. "Mary Celeste". The most famous of sea mysteries, the ship which was found abandoned almost intact in the North Atlantic in 1872. Her whole crew, including the American captain, his wife and baby, had vanished forever. Conan Doyle, then a medical student (and before he invented Sherlock Holmes) offered the first "solution" of the mystery. Scores of others have tried since. This account sets forth the whole story of the "Mary Celeste", from the time she was built in Nova Scotia until at last she was deliberately wrecked on a West Indian reaf for the insurance; and it gives the only possible solution of her famous mystery, the theory of the Nova Scotia captain who discovered her abandoned east of the Asores in 1872.

5. "Lost Gold at Kejimkujik". A poor Indian made a rich discovery of gold in the Nova Scotia forest, kept his secret for years in spite of every effort of white men to trace it, and finally lost it in an unexpected way. First hand information came to the author from an elderly Methodist minister, then living in Bermuda, who as a youth had befriended the Indian and became his confidant. Here published for the first time is the inside story of a mystery still current in Nova Scotia.

6. "Sadie Davenport". The adventures of a pretty harlot in a Canadian seaport who decided to become respectable, married a handsome young man of the Royal Navy, and then deserted him to resume the gay life. She died by suicide, an old woman, leaving a fat sheaf of government bonds. In the wrangle by claimants to her estate a clever young lawyer crossed the Atlantic, tracked down in a London slum her first and only legal husband, long believed to have perished in War

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One, and produced the old sailor in a Halifax court to win his case. Ripley, in his famous "Believe It Or Not" cartoon, declared it "the Enoch the Arden story of bits twentieth century."

Here are true tales of mystery by sea and land. Each touches on the Canadian province of Nova Scotia, where Thomas Raddall has spent his life, and the facts he reveals are the result of literary detective work for more than thirty years.

"Adventures of H.M.S.Blonde" relates for the first time an affair of the American Revolution, when France was smuggling arms and stores to Washington's army at Valley Forge. "The Murders Aboard The Herbert Fuller" gives the full account of a macabre voyage which startled the courts of the United States in the 1890's, and left justice blind from first to last. "Grey Owl" is the story, containing many facts hitherto unpublished, of Archie Belany Belaney. the Englishman who dressed as an Indian. claimed to be a spiritual descendant of Hiawatha, and hoodwinked the public in Canada, the United States, and Britain (including the Royal Family) until the day he died. "Mary Celeste" is the ship whose name remains the symbol of all sea mystery. The author follows her career from the Nova Scotia shipyard where she was born. to her discovery in midocean without a soul on board, and finally to her end on a West Indian reef in 1885; and he gives the only logical explanation of her most famous adventure -- that of the man who found her a derilect at sea in 1872. "The Lost Gold at Kejimkujik" is the story of Jim Charles. the Micmac Indian who discovered gold in the timbered wilderness of Nova Scotia -- and kept his secret too long. Many people think the gold is still there. Raddall tells the inside story. "Sadie Davenport", a seaport tart, became a mistress of her trade like the girl in the old sea seng. She settled down twice as a respectable married woman. After her death the money she left to the Salvation Army brought a strange case to the Probate Court. and fetched back from the grave a husband "dead" for more than thirty years.

Thomas Raddall was born in England, came to Nova Scotia as a boy, and has lived there ever since. As a youth he served four years as a radio officer in Canadian ships and shore stations. He wrote his first short story in 1928, became a full time author ten years later, and has since published nine novels, five collections of short stories, and four volumes of history. He has been honored three times with the Canadian Governor-General's Award, and has received the gold medal of the Royal Society of Canada for distinguished service to Canadian literature. 



> "Her name sounds like something out of Gilbert and Sullivan, but there actually was a ship in His Majesty's Navy named <u>Blonde</u>, and in the course of her affairs she put a mark on history."

So begins the first of six true tales of mystery (three of sea and three on land) which comprise "Footsteps on Old Floors" by Thomas H. Raddall, to be published by Doubleday on February 16th.

These stories are true, and each of them touches on the Nova Scotia scene where Mr. Raddall lives. He came on them in the course of other work, and because each had some mystery to be fathomed he put them aside for times when he had the leisure to seek the clues. Hence, "Footsteps on Old Floors" is the result of literary detective work pursued over many years. Through an impressive demonstration of historical sleuthing Mr. Raddall has reconstructed the only plausible explanation in each case.

The most familiar (and most difficult to unravel) of Raddall's six historic mysteries is the story of the <u>Mary Celeste</u>. She was discovered dead in the water off the Azores, ten days after the last routine entry in her log, dated November 24, 1872. Save for the sails nothing was askew, but there was nary a trace of her crew. The main clue for Captain David Morehouse, who discovered her (and subsequently for Raddall) was that her cargo consisted of casks of alcohol -- dangerous not as an intoxicant in this case but as a highly flammable substance on a highly flammable vessel. In the end Raddall provides an ingenious and credible solution and tells the rest of the story, from the construction of the ship itself, to the misfortune that dogged her to the day she died -deliberately rammed onto a Caribbean reef in a shabby insurance fraud. "The Murders Aboard the <u>Herbert Fuller</u>" is a suitably gory account in which the captain, his wife, and the second mate were hideously ax-murdered. There is an interminable trial, yet justice is never done. In "The Lost Gold of Kejimkujik" a poor Indian named Jim Charles had the misfortune to discover gold which ultimately drove him insane. "Sadie Davenport" lived and died a waterfront whore and left an incredible legacy to the Salvation Army. "Grey Owl" was the name taken by Archie Belaney, an audacious Englishman who posed as the epitome of the Noble Savage and perpetrated the funniest and most successful hoax of the 20th century. "H.M.S. <u>Blonde</u>" was minding its own business, blockading the Maritimes during the Rebellion of the American Colonies, when a neutral French frigate responded to her routine challenge with a broadside and proceeded to deliberately run herself aground. That was only the beginning of a colorful and surprising Revolutionary mystery.

Thomas H. Raddall is a winner of the Canadian Prize Novel Award. He has also twice received the silver medallion of the Governor-General's Award -the highest honor Canada can bestow upon an author. Born in Kent, England, Mr. Raddall came to Nova Scotia as a child and has lived there ever since. A prolific writer, he is the author of "The Governor's Lady" (1960), "Halifax: Warden of the North" (1965), "Hangman's Beach" (1966), and other books in addition to numerous scripts and documentary films for the Canadian Broadcasting Company.
